[Communicated.] DIVISION OF THE STATE. To the Candidates for the Con-vention.

Having shown that the division of the State is feasible, and given a brief outline of the plan; we new offer a few of the reasons why it should be done by the proposed Convention:

The annexation resolutions contem plated that, at some future time, the State should, and would be divided into at least five States.

Those who framed and adopted these resolutions, were among the greatest statesmen of their day. The longer division is delayed, the more complicated and difficult, the greater the diversity of interest, and the greater the spirit of antagonism and sectional feeling.

If delayed until there are three or four millions of inhabitants, how difficult wift it be to define the liabilities, and equalise the interests of each new State? How could the railroad interests be seperated? How could the school funds, and vacant lands be disposed of? Now, they are matters of such small importance, as to interpose no serious objection.

There is comparatively no school fund, and the vacant lands, can be donated to the several States in which they may be found, and the railroad interest be disposed of in a similar manner; and the public debt be assumed by each new State, in proportion to her population and resources. Thanks to the wisdom of the past, we have no ragmoney to redeem, or banking corporations to dispose of.

The advantages of small States (not nations) in a confederation like that of the United States are many; you know your public men, you can control the means and develop the resources of your State with greater expedition, certainty and success. Witness the superior internal Government of the small States of Rhode Island, Delaware, New Jersey, Connecticut, and Massachusette, as contrasted with the large States of New York, Pennsylvania and California.

Our State comprises about five times as much territory as the State of New York. So large that one time also was considered as one of the nations, whose claims to greatness were not to be overlooked. She has territory sufficient, to maintain in comfort ten millions of pecple. She is the United States in epitome. We have the grain and stock region of the North west, the iron of Pennlumber of Maine and North Carolina; the cotton and rice of South Carolina and Georgia, the live oak of Florida, and the diversity of climate of Virgina and Florida combined:

It is therefore needless to argue, that in the course of human events, Tex- the Covernment. as will teem with a dense population.

Why Sir's! So large is our territory that if by a miracle, a million of immigrants were to be rained down from the louds some dark night, and equally distributed over its surface, that, probably, but few of the present inhabitants would know anything about the extraordinary increase of the population, un-til warned of the fact, by the sudden and unexpected diminution of the quantity of seeds preserved in their own juice against the "ravages of the weevil."

It will be seen, that the small State east of the Trinity River, embracing the counties of Grayson, Collin and Dallas, would contain some thirty eight counties; and that acording to the census of 1860, within its limits were comprised about two fifths of the population and taxable property of the entire State.

Our railroad from Sabine Pass, or tide water on the Neches River, by way of Tyler (the capital) to a point between Dallas and Red River, intersecting the Kansas and Galveston, or Houston central road, would fully subserve all the all the interests of this little State.

Sabine Pass is one of the safest Har bors on the Gulf, and nature furnishes more facilities for building the road, than can be shows in behalf of any road in the State. emirio le line

To state the proposition, is all that is secessary to satisfy those who know anything of the country, through which the road would pass.

Now, if it were possible to build the road, you would have to "log-roll" in the Legislature for years, to obtain the ne cessary assistance, and contribute to the building of a number of other roads not half so important and much more costly. The same may be said in respect to the railroad interest of every new State, as it is presumed that each State will border on the Gulf, or that not more than one will be in the interior.

The Southern Pacific Railroad on or near the line of 32 N. L., at some day will traverse all of them, and thus con plete the connection, socially and commercially.

We are not wedded to any particular size or boundaries, except that Austin is, in any event to semain the permanent capital of one of the States. That is

with us, a sine-que-non We want not only the present interest and convenience consulted, but the great developements of the people to be considered. That nogdivision could be made without bettering the condition of the people of the present unwiedly, and sparsely populated State, is beyond a reasonable doubt

Without forshadowing anything of a political character, we samme that the framers of the Constitution of the United States, intended as far as practicable, that the representation of the States in the United States Senate; should and would bear something like a fair preportion to the number of the inhabitants, size of territory &c., and such has, bee the case, almost without exception in the admission of States other than the old thirteens. The above named five small States, are represented in the United States Senate by ten Senators, while this huge State of ours, with her prospective millions of people, and unexampled greatness and variety of interests is entitled to but two. Why Sir's! It's a grave question whether this State with her grand proportions, and large expectations, would accept the addition of gither of these States for a "potato patch," yet in one important branch of the Government they are politically equal. There would be none of the new States, that would not contain twice the area of territory of either of them. This inequality of political power, is too palpable to be defended.

And if we look at our civil and political condition within the present State, we find many inconveniences connected sylvania, the tar pitch turpentine and with the making, administration, and execution of the laws, that would to a grave extent bestemedied by a division. MEXICAN GULF AND SAN AN-TONIO RAILROAD.

The mention of the above corporation of late has become so thorough ly a term of ridicule, that many who were in the country in 1856, at the time of the incorporation of the company that proposed to work out the destiny of this region, by bring ing to our doors—through the railinto Mexico in little rivulets, as it were, (every little by-road being s route by which more or less trade moves towards the Rio Grande,) have forgotten the history of the railroad corporation and the odium of its failare, that so justly belongs to the oriof late upon the communities along the route. Hardly a day passes but more or less is said against us on account of the apathy and want of enterprise so apparent to the unini-

The facts are difficult to obtain, but the records of the courts show enough to assure any one of criminal incapacity or down right villany on seed to pick the least tester and let on the part of the projectors of this enterprise, and to establish the liberality and public spirit of the people.

When the company proceeded to open up their enterprise, the city thorities subscribed fifty thousand dollars city bonds, and the various citizens on the line of the road gave according to their means, mostly in lands, and the records show in the neighborhood of a hundred and fifty suits, brought by the railroad com pany against the contributors."

It is hard to think, even, that a public enterprise was turned into a private swindle, but the result seems to have instilled a feeling of distrust into the minds of the community towards the company. While we are in hopes a negotiation may be effected with the "English Company," we do not feel safe in reaching out a belping hand ourselves. It is evident that this mutual distrust, works to the injury of both company and community, and unless a re-organization of the company is effected that will throw out of it those who, in saving perhaps ten or fifteen thousand dollars, have injured the country millions, and take into it those who have the confidence of Western Texas, and have shown a capacity to attend to their own business; we should

nearly an hundred, and the numberless suits against individuals have brought want to their doors and distrust to the minds of all who are familiar with the facts.

The active men at present trying to build up the road are believed to be victims of, rather than accomplices in these mismanagements. Let them show their innocense, seek the co-operation of people along the pro-posed route and not as has been their policy heretofore, defy the public.

Our public spirited men are determined, as soon as political quiet is restored, to have these indespensible enterprises put through. The government has expressed its de'er mination to move Headquarters unless railroad facilities are guaran teed to San Antonio. If this is done the loss will not alone fall upon this city. Another Point would have Galveston as its base, and the whole region now contributing to Indianola and Lavaca, would, by the enterprise of Galveston, be irresistably drawn in that direction. Commerce knows no law except the energies of men, and a Galveston railroad would effectually dam the valuable trade of this region from Lavaca Bay.

REBEL REMOVALS

The many changes heretofore made in public offices have been made upon the appeals of loyal men who have represented themselves persecuted, and have felt the humiliation of being compelled to transact business with men who did all in their power to destroy the Government, even to murdering its supporters and robbing their families. These persons removed were disbonest and their manner of doing business infamous. Yet the appointment -as an illustration of Governor Wells, of Louisians, not only did not bring a reformation, but continued the old regime, if any odds, worse than ever. A remedy was sought, and his remova was believed to be that remedy. General Sheridan did it, and Flanders was installed. The same fault existed, and the total dissatisfaction exhibited by the whole loyal element induced this officer to resign, when a man of Conservative antecedents was appointed by General Haucock.

The question is, why did Wells and Flauders (both Radicals) so completely fail? The answer is simply this : In stead of making a clean sweep, deputies and underlings dishonest as their superfors were retained, " because they anderstood the office." Thus the very outrages sought to be obviated were con inged in a worse form than ever.

The City Council of New Orleans saw this difficulty and proceeded to oust the anderlings who opposed every change from a rebel to a loyal rule; for which the rebels induced General Hancock to remove the Council. A Committee was immediately sent to Washington, and General Grant on learning the facts restored the Council, who will now prois recagved, if the least particle remains it is the sure foundation of its return in a worse formed to son box and

Without a radical change, without going to the root, the reformation will never be complete.
