THE IMPEACHMENT.

(Special to the New Orleans Times.)
WASHINGTON, March 6th.—Both branches of Congress assembled at the usual hour to-day. But very little interest was manifested in the proceedings in the House; the galleries there were completely deserted. A steady stream of people commenced at an early hour moving towards the galleries of the Senate, and by the time that body had assembled, all the galleries were closely packed, except the diplomatic gallery. No person was admitted who could not be provided with a seat, and extra policemen were stationed in the halls to keep them from being filled up, and thus prevent passage to and from the Senate.
