OUR GALVESTON LETTER.
Congress—Probable Results—Our Mil-
itary Commandant—The Division of
the State—A New Republican Paper
—Items.

GALVESTON, Texas, March 6, 1868.
Editors of the San Antonio Express:

The nation waits with anxiety the re-
sult of the trial for high crimes and mis-
demaneors of Andrew Johnson, Vice-
President and acting President of the
United States. Congress has all along
acted with regard to impeachment with
that moderation and dignity befitting the
legislative power of this great Government.
When Mr. Johnson, on the 23d of
February, 1866, degraded his high office
by an unseemly drunken speech to the
public of Washington, inveighing against
Congress, its honorable Senators and
Representatives; and when later a junk-
eting tour was made over the country,
in which the name of a dead statesman
was degraded, and in which the ears
and sight of patriotic and intelligent
Americans were profaned and saddened
by the spectacle of a drunk President
making vile speeches and "swinging
around the circle;" yet Congress but
warned the man who had disgraced
Americans as no other high official ever
did before, to desist from his evil course
and obey his sacred oath of office. Dis-
regarding the admonitions and violating
the laws of a co-ordinate branch of the
Government—the acting President,
bent on a system of anarchy and violence
for the South and on the destruction of
those sacred principles of constitutional
liberty so dear to the heart of loyal
Americans—has brought on himself the
just wrath of an indignant, suffering peo-
ple, who, in the majesty of their omnip-
otence, have declared that Andrew John-
son must no longer pollute the Presi-
dential place; but that for his base acts
and treacherous deeds he be consigned
to that infamy and oblivion he so richly
merits.

There can be no doubt as to the result
of the trial now pending in the Senate;
that we will soon breathe freely, relieved
from the dreadful incubus that has so
long been crushing the life-blood of the
South and disseminating poison in the
vitality of the North; we have the ut-
most assurance. Probably ere this letter
reaches you, "My Policy," with its at-
tendant evils, will have become among
the things that were; and the nation
entered under new auspices to its glori-
ous career.

General Hancock, it is understood and
known, will not remain long in com-
mand of the Fifth Military District.
Within three weeks we will certainly
have Sheridan back to assist us, by his
firm hand and loyal administration, in
placing Texas among the galaxy of the
Union. I write Texas, but I ought to
say, the three loyal and Union-loving
States that is proposed to be made from
Texas. For as certain as that we have
a vast territory with boundless resour-
ces, just so sure will we have a division
of this State; that such a measure will
develop our vast prairies and fertile
hills and valleys, no one can deny; and
that with the blessings of God we are
destined to have a population num-
bering millions, it needs no prophesy to
decry.

A new paper, to be called the GALV-
ESTON REPUBLICAN, will be issued here on
Monday next. As its name denotes,
the paper is to be the exponent of the
Republican party in this State, and, like
its cotemporary, THE EXPRESS, it will
give forth a sound betokening the true
ring of Republicanism. The new paper
will supply a want which has been long
felt by Union men of the State; and
now that the principles for which rebel-
lion was conquered and precious blood
and countless treasures were spent, are
to have sway, the REPUBLICAN of this
city will no doubt prove an entire suc-
cess.

Our rebel and pro-rebel City Council
propose electing a Chief of Police and
other officials shortly, under the form
of the Charter—so-called—i. e., by them-
selves. Perhaps when this is attempted
our Councilmen will find themselves an

impediment. *Attendans et non sperans.*
The steamer Josephine arrived here
yesterday General Hancock—that official find-
ing it more convenient to remain in New
Orleans just now.

Hon. James P. Newcomb, of your
city, passed through here en route for
home; Mr. N., though suffering physi-
cally from an indisposition, is very cheer-
ful of our future, and returns home with
new vigor for his grand work for Justice,
Freedom and Political Equality.

The Supreme Court will probably ad-
journ the coming week.
As to when our Convention will be
called, no one knows; but of course
within the sixty days prescribed by law.
March thus far has been perfectly
laub-like—the weather being very fine.

SUMMER.—The summer has come in all its vigor; flowers are in full bloom, and vegetation is in a very forward condition.

COURT MARSHAL.—The officers of the General Court Marshal, to have convened yesterday, have not all arrived. It is thought all the members of the court will be present by Wednesday.

HON. J. P. NEWCOMB, member of Constitutional Convention, and "one of us," returned from his New Orleans trip yesterday. Mr. N. attended a meeting upon the Division question at Houston and found the citizens of that section favorable towards the separation.

MAILS UNLAWFULLY OPENED.—We heard it stated that through San Antonio packages of mail are examined at points below here by postmasters who wish to be accommodating. This may account for the irregular arrival of our exchanges.

TRAVEL.—The Glover gang on the Columbus route and Beck Taylor's gang on the Victoria route, have stopped stages and killed horses with a view to rob and murder. The withdrawal of the soldiers from Gonzales is a grand triumph for the rebels, and opens up splendid opportunities for the Knights of the road.

SOBBER DEATH.—We received the news yesterday that Mr. Knapponback, the delegate elected to the Convention from New Braunfels, died suddenly Saturday night. No particulars are given.

CIVIL LAW.—The sergeant in charge at Gonzales had showed his order to the Mayor relieving him from duty, and had informed said Mayor that the order prohibiting the carrying of firearms was suspended.

The citizens showed their gratitude to Gen. Hancock by making a general attack upon the soldiers the day civil law was restored to them.

GRASSHOPPERS.—Yesterday's Express stated these pests had disappeared. In the morning two small boys had a copy of the paper reading it over and commenting on its contents. Coming to said article one of the boys remarked, "that's a d-d lie." We apologize and give Saturday's Herald as our authority.

NEW PAPER.—The Republican, a new paper started in Galveston, made its appearance on our table yesterday.

The Republican is a neatly printed paper, of the Radical school, and, judging from its first utterances, we predict a successful future.

THE NEWS.—Until after the 23d instant no news of importance can be expected. On that day Mr. Johnson will appear by proxy before the Committee of Impeachment. There is hardly any doubt that the criminal will be found guilty, and of course deposed.

The time for our Convention is not yet determined, although there can be no reasonable excuse for further delay. General Hancock has ordered away from the interior the troops. Unless they are replaced by State Militia, the loyalists must either leave or the Gonzales affair will be re-enacted daily.

Newcomb, Esq., editor of that sterling Republican paper, the San Antonio Express, and delegate elect to the Constitutional Convention. Mr. Newcomb has just returned from New Orleans, whither he has been to convey the election returns of Bexar county. He informs us that about one hundred counties had been returned to Gen. Hancock when he left the Crescent city, and that the others were coming in rapidly. THE MARYLAND SENATOR ELECT.—The Hon. G. R. Vickers, who was yesterday elected as a Senator from Maryland, vice Thomas, rejected, is a native of Chestertown, Kent county, where he has always lived; a lawyer by profession and in full practice, and in politics an Old Line Whig, so long as a vestige of that party remained. He is represented by his friends to have been an acknowledged Union man and supporter of the late war, and represented his native county in the State Senate the term before the present, and was in office at the adoption of the new constitution, that being the only public position ever held by him. At home he is called General Vickers from a connection with the State militia some years ago. He is about sixty years of age, hale and hearty, affable, and a man of decided ability.—Chronicle.

WILFUL MURDER.—The Crockett Sentinel brings us tidings of another brutal and cold blooded murder. Ed Wingate, who should have long since lived in Hantaville, or some from here to dust, has dipped his foul hands in innocent blood. He has murdered Mr. Henry T. Driskell, in Crockett, Houston county.

Have we a government? If so, where is it? Congress blows, Johnson prates, while innocent men are being murdered, as though creation delighted in murder, and defied law. We demand of the U. S. Government protection to life, or it should declare its incapacity to comply with its constitutional obligation to protect it.

How long? how long will the Government, what or whoever it may be, suffer Hancock's procedures to engender crimes that the devil in hell would not tolerate? Yet we hope the people will not take law in their own hands, but safely secure him, and bring him to justice by some legal procedure.—Hantaville (Texas) Union Republican.

Several instances of longevity are reported in our exchanges. Mrs. Deborah Cass Sullivan died recently in Santa Cruz county, California, in her 88th year. She was a sister of General Lewis Cass. An Irish priest died a few days ago, at the extraordinary age of 107 years. He was Rev. 2 Malachi McMahon, born in 1790, who had been parish priest of Sacroff county Kildare, 57 years. On the Saturday before his death he sat in the confessional for several hours, and performed his duties almost to the last hour. Even under very sad and painful circumstances, people live long. A lady, writing of poverty in her district of London, tells of a man who has lived 72 years in the attic in which he was born, and lives there still, feeble, old, and cold. There is nothing more sad in England than old age, poverty-stricken, neglected and miserable. M. Anber attained his 87th year on January 29, to do honor to the composer, the band of the National Guard of Paris gave him a serenade, and the veteran musician warmly thanked them. The pieces played were the overture of "La Muette" and a march composed by Anber when only fourteen years of age.

OFFICIAL. LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress. [Session No. 12.] AN Act to establish and declare the railroad and bridges of the New Orleans, Mobile and Chattanooga Railroad Company, as heretofore constructed, a post road, and for other purposes. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the New Orleans, Mobile and Chattanooga Railroad Company is hereby authorized and empowered to construct, build and maintain, bridges over and across the navigable waters of the United States on the route of said railroad between New Orleans and Mobile, for the use of said company and the passage of its engines, cars, and trains of cars, passengers, mails, and merchandise thereon; and said railroad and its bridges aforesaid, when constructed, completed, and in use, in accordance with this act and the laws of the several States through whose territory the same shall pass, shall be deemed, recognized, and known as lawful structures and a post road, and are hereby declared as such: Provided, however, That the said company, in the construction of its bridges over and across the waters known as the East Pascagoula river, and the bay of Biloxi, and the bay of St. Louis, shall construct and maintain draw-bridges in the channels thereof, which, when open, shall give a clear space for the passage of vessels of not less than eight feet to the channels of the East Pascagoula, and of the bay of Biloxi, and of the bay of St. Louis, and of not less than one hundred feet in the channel of the Great Rigolet; and said said company shall at all times open the said draw-bridges, and shall provide reasonable and necessary facilities for the passage of all vessels requiring the same, except during and for ten minutes prior to and after the time of the passage of the mail and passenger trains of said company.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the right to alter or amend this act, so as to prevent or remove all material obstructions to the navigation of said rivers, growing out of the construction of said bridges, is hereby expressly reserved.

Approved, March 2, 1866.

OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Third Session of the Thirty-Seventh Congress.

Passed at the third session which was begun and held at the City of Washington, in the District of Columbia, on Monday, the first day of December, A. D. 1862, and ended on Wednesday, the fourth day of March, A. D. 1863.

Abraham Lincoln, President. Hannibal Hamlin, Vice-President, and President of the Senate. Solomon Foots was elected President of the Senate, pro tempore, on the eighteenth day of February, and so acted until the end of the session. Columbus A. Brown, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

CHAP. LXVII.—An Act to prevent and punish Frauds upon the Government of the United States. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That any person in the land or naval forces of the United States, or in the militia in actual service of the United States, in time of war, shall make or cause to be made, or present or cause to be presented for payment or approval to any person or officer in the civil or military service of the United States, any claim upon or against the Government of the United States, or any department or officer thereof, knowing such claim to be false, fictitious, or fraudulent; any person in said forces or service, who shall, for the purpose of obtaining or aiding in obtaining the approval or payment of such claim, make use, or cause to be made or used, any false bill, receipt, voucher, entry, roll or account, claim, statement, certificate, affidavit, or deposition, knowing the same to contain any false or fraudulent statement or entry; any person in said forces or service who shall make or procure to be made, or knowingly aid in the making of any false oath or statement, or certificate, affidavit, or entry, for the purpose of obtaining or aiding to obtain, any approval or payment of any claim against the United States, or any department or officer thereof, for any deposit or service who, for the purpose of obtaining or enabling any other person to obtain from the Government of the United States, or any department or officer thereof, any approval or allowance, or the approval or signature of any person in the military, naval, or civil service of the United States, or to any false, fraudulent, or counterfeit claim, shall forge or counterfeit, or cause or procure to be forged or counterfeited, any signature upon any bill, receipt, voucher, account, claim, roll, statement, affidavit, or deposition; and any person in said forces or service who shall utter or use the same as true or genuine, knowing the same to have been forged or counterfeited; or any person in said forces or service who shall enter into any agreement, combination, or conspiracy to cheat or defraud the Government of the United States, or any department or officer thereof, by obtaining, or aiding or assisting to obtain, the payment or allowance of any false or fraudulent claim; any person in said forces or service who shall steal, embezzle, or knowingly and willfully misappropriate or apply to his own use or benefit, or who shall wrongfully and knowingly sell, convey, or dispose of any ordnance, arms, ammunition, clothing, subsistence stores, money, or other property of the United States, furnished or to be used for the military or naval service of the United States; any quartermaster, agent, paymaster, quartermaster, or other person in said forces or service having charge, possession, custody, or control of any money or other public property, used or to be used in the military or naval service of the United States, who shall, with intent to defraud the United States, or willfully to conceal such money or other property, deliver or cause to be delivered to any other person having authority to receive the same any amount of such money or other public property less than that for which he shall receive a certificate or receipt; any person in said forces or service who is or shall be authorized to make or deliver any certificate, voucher, or receipt, or other paper certifying the receipt of any ordnance, provisions, clothing, or other public property, or used to be used who shall make or deliver the same to any person without having full knowledge of the truth of the facts stated therein, and with intent to cheat, defraud, or injure the United States; and any person in said forces or service who shall knowingly purchase or receive, in pledge for any obligation or indebtedness, from any soldier, officer, or other person called into or employed in said forces or service, any arms, equipments, ammunition, clothing, or military stores, or other public property, which shall be, or be deemed to be, the property of the United States; and any person who shall be guilty of a criminal offense, and shall be adjudged to be a criminal offender, for the purpose of the Government of the United States, or of the militia when called into and employed in the actual service of the United States in time of war, and to the provisions of this act. And every person so offending may be arrested and held for trial by a court martial, and if found guilty shall be punished by fine and imprisonment or such other punishment as the court-martial may adjudge, save the punishment of death.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That any person in the military or naval forces of the United States, or in the militia called into or employed in the service of the United States, who shall do or commit any of the acts prohibited by any of the foregoing provisions of this act, he shall forfeit and pay to the United States the sum of two thousand dollars, and in addition, double the amount of damages which the United States may have sustained by reason of the doing or committing such act, together with the costs of suit; and such forfeiture and damages, when assessed by the court-martial, and every such person shall in addition thereto, on conviction in any court of competent jurisdiction, be punished by imprisonment not less than one nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one thousand dollars, and not more than five thousand dollars.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That the several district courts of the United States, the circuit court of the District of Columbia, or any court therein to be established having general jurisdiction in civil cases, the several district courts of the Territories of the United States, or any court therein to be established, shall have jurisdiction in such cases as shall be provided in this act.

CHAP. LXVIII.—An Act to amend an act entitled "An Act to provide a temporary Government for the Territory of Colorado." Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the second section of the act to which this act is an amendment be altered so as to read as follows: The executive power and authority in and over said Territory of Colorado shall be vested in a Governor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the President of the United States. The Governor shall reside within said Territory, shall be commander-in-chief of the militia thereof, shall perform the duties and receive the emoluments of superintendent of Indian Affairs; he may grant pardons for offenses against the laws of said Territory, and he shall enforce against the laws of the United States, until the 1st day of the President's term, such laws as shall be provided in this act.

CHAP. LXIX.—An Act to amend an act entitled "An Act to provide a temporary Government for the Territory of Colorado." Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the second section of the act to which this act is an amendment be altered so as to read as follows: The executive power and authority in and over said Territory of Colorado shall be vested in a Governor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the President of the United States. The Governor shall reside within said Territory, shall be commander-in-chief of the militia thereof, shall perform the duties and receive the emoluments of superintendent of Indian Affairs; he may grant pardons for offenses against the laws of said Territory, and he shall enforce against the laws of the United States, until the 1st day of the President's term, such laws as shall be provided in this act.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That the person bringing said suit and prosecuting it to a final judgment shall be entitled to receive one-half the amount of such forfeiture, as well as one-half the amount of the damages he shall recover and collect, and the other half thereof shall be forgoing to and be paid over to the United States; and such person shall be entitled to receive to his own use all costs the court may award against the defendant, to be allowed and taxed according to any provision of law or rule of court in force, or that shall be in force in suits between private parties in said court; Provided, That such person shall be liable for all costs incurred by himself in the case, and shall have no claim therefore on the United States.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That every such suit shall be commenced within six years from the doing or committing the act, and not after wards.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That no officer or agent of any banking or other commercial corporation, or any member of any mercantile or trading firm, or person directly or indirectly interested in the pecuniary profits or contracts of such corporation or firm, shall be employed or shall act as an officer or agent of the United States for the transaction of business with such corporation or firm; and every such officer, agent or member, or person, so interested, who shall so act, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than two thousand dollars nor less than five hundred dollars, and by imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with or repugnant to any of the provisions of this act are hereby repealed, saving, however, and excepting any and all suits or proceedings now commenced pending, and all rights of suit or prosecution under any prior act of Congress, on account of the doing or committing of any act as hereby prohibited; and all rights and claims which the United States, or any person or persons, now have, growing out of such prior act; all which pending suits and proceedings shall proceed and be determined, and all which rights and claims shall remain and be as valid and effectual as if this present act had not been passed; nor shall this act be construed as in any way to impair or affect the obligation, duty, or liability of any person who now is or shall hereafter become the surety of any person, contracting with the United States, or any officer or agent thereof; but every such surety shall be liable and answerable for the default of his principal in the same manner as if this act had not been passed, save to the extent to which the principal has performed the contract, or if damages have been so recovered, to the extent of one-half of the damages so recovered and paid; which last amount may be shown in reduction of damages in any suit brought against the principal and surety, or principals and sureties, on their contract.

Approved, March 2, 1863.

CHAP. LXX.—An Act to amend an act entitled "An Act to provide a temporary Government for the Territory of Colorado." Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, in addition to the four major generals and nine brigadier generals for the regular army, and the forty major generals and two hundred brigadier generals for the volunteer service, authorized by the existing laws, there may be appointed thirty major general and seventy-five brigadier generals for the service of the United States in the regular army. Provided, That the officers to be appointed under this act shall be selected from those who have been conspicuous for gallant or meritorious conduct in the line of duty.

Approved, March 2, 1863.

CHAP. LXXI.—An Act to amend an act entitled "An Act to provide a temporary Government for the Territory of Colorado." Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the second section of the act to which this act is an amendment be altered so as to read as follows: The executive power and authority in and over said Territory of Colorado shall be vested in a Governor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the President of the United States. The Governor shall reside within said Territory, shall be commander-in-chief of the militia thereof, shall perform the duties and receive the emoluments of superintendent of Indian Affairs; he may grant pardons for offenses against the laws of said Territory, and he shall enforce against the laws of the United States, until the 1st day of the President's term, such laws as shall be provided in this act.

Approved, March 2, 1863.

commission all officers who shall be appointed to office under the laws of said Territory, and shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed. [TO BE CONTINUED.]

CHAP. CIII.—An act to give greater efficiency to the Judicial System of the United States. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That whenever the judge of the supreme court for any circuit, from disability, absence, the accumulation of business in the circuit court in any district within his circuit, or from his having been or being interested in any case pending in such circuit court, or from any other cause, shall deem it advisable that the circuit court in such district shall be held by the judge of any other circuit he may request, in writing, the judge of any other circuit to hold the circuit court in such district, during a time to be named in such request; and such request shall be entered upon the journal of the circuit court so to be held. And thereupon it shall be lawful for the judge so requested to hold the circuit court in such district, and to exercise all the powers of the judge of such circuit within and for such district during the time named in such request.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the judge of any circuit may order any civil case certified into any circuit court within his circuit from any court of the United States, to be certified back to the court whence it came, and in such case such case shall be proceeded in by such court, in all respects as if the same had not been certified from it. Provided, That if from any cause it shall be improper for the judge of such court to try any such case so certified back, the same shall be tried by some other judge holding such court, pursuant to the provisions of this act. Whenever, by reason of death or resignation, the clerk of any circuit of the United States may make the request herein provided for, which shall be operative until such circuit shall be assigned to another judge. In case of a vacancy in the office of marshal or district attorney in any circuit, the judge of such circuit may fill such vacancy, and the person so appointed shall serve until an appointment shall be made by the President, and the appointee has duly qualified, and no longer; and the marshal so appointed shall give bonds as if appointed by the President, and the bond shall be approved by such judge. The appointment so made shall be in writing, and such writing shall be filed in the office of the circuit court, and a copy thereof shall be entered on the journal of such court. The clerk of every circuit shall give bond in such sum as may be fixed by the court, and such bond may be required whenever the court shall so direct. A certified copy of such entry shall be prima facie proof of the execution of such bond, and of the contents thereof.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed. Approved, March 2, 1863.
