### IS THE DIVISION OF THE STATE A POLITICAL QUES-

There seems to be a nervous anxiiety on the part of many zealous advocates of the division of the State. for fear that it will become a politi-cal question. The admission of a State, the division of a State, the establishing of new State lines, are purely political questions. The material and personal interests which may appear, may influence but not decide them. Let us go to the bottom of this division question. If Congress makes the division it will be done by a Republican Congress, and the credit or blame, the benefit or evil will belong to the Republican party. If the Reconstruction Convention decides the question of division, the Convention is overwhelmingly Republican, and the blame or praise will belong to the Republican party. Every act of that Convention, however free from party or political interest, will be judged and considered an act of the Republican arty. If the question is to be left to the people, then we have arrayed grainst division all the rebel press of the State, and the rebel party stand ing in antagonism to division, and it will devolve upon the Republican party to fight the battle as a party me in spite of all attempts of persomily interested parties to make it a neutral issue.

Such a position would be similar to the ostrich with its head in the sand, and its body exposed to the arrows of the bunter.
