Visit to the Central Railroad Works—Houston upon Division—Press Courtiers, etc.

We neglected in our former letter to mention a very interesting visit we paid in company with Mr. Hutchins and Mr. Page to the machine shop and car works of the Central Railroad Company. We found these establishments in full blast and everything in splendid order; these gentlemen do business fight.

HOUSTONIANS UPON A DIVISION OF THE STATE.

We chanced to be invited to attend a meeting of the citizens of Houston called to take action upon the question of the division of the State. Judge Fayle presided and Mr. Tracy of the Telegraph and a colored man, Shade Craine, acted as Secretaries, there were also some colored Vice Presidents. Judge C. B. Sabbin addressed the meeting reviewing at length the question of a division of the State in a most able manner, at the conclusion of his remarks the Judge presented the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the greatest interest of Territory of Texas renders the administration of the laws difficult and imperfect, and at the same time render the institution of common schools very difficult if not impossible among a sparse and scattered population and the adverse local interests in a territory of over 237,000 miles in extent, constitute a serious drawback to the development of the material resources of the State, and firmly believing that public and private interests are more substantially advanced and protected by smaller and more compact States than by bulky and unwieldy ones, therefore be it resolved:

1st. That our delegates in convention be urged to give their attention to the creation of at least three organized States and one territory out of the present limits of Texas, and that the convention about to assemble be respectfully requested to urge the same upon Congress.

2nd. That the Congress be respectfully requested to establish some institutions of learning, one or more, in each state, when teachers may be fitted and educated for teaching, not only the common branches, but also some of the higher branches of learning.

3rd. Resolved, that these resolutions be printed, and that a copy of the same be furnished to the President of the convention and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, for the consideration of those bodies respectively. The meeting was not large on account of the inclemency of the weather and at notice given, but the Republican party—the victorious party of Houston—Harris county was represented and the party is fully in favor of the division movement, no matter how much the rebel may froth at the mouth here, or how much their short-sighted cowardly newspapers may ridicule and beat the idea of division. Houston welcome in as a competitor for the cap of the middle State.
