AUSTIN COURT.

The Republican speaks of the court just adjourned in that city as having too limited time (4 weeks) to do a fair amount of business, having accomplished less than 10 per cent. of its duty.

The following piece of legal, outrageous, hair-splitting news, reported in the Republican, gives a clue to the apparent inefficiency:

The case of the State vs. O. Wilcox, resulted in the acquittal of Wilcox, we understand, principally because of a want of connection in the evidence—the man who did not bring green to be the same man who was shot.

The District Court of this district will have cleared out from the docket nine tenths of the rubbish accumulated in the past fifty years, and there are cases involving a million of dollars among them. At the close of the regular term, we would suggest our court be borrowed by the Austin folks.

Texas Commonwealth Convention. We may expect the Convention to be convened to meet on or before the 15th of May, or we may expect some military commander to be called to account for neglect of duty. The 15th of May is the limit on which (60 days) the Convention must be convened, after the election. The twenty thousand dollar blunder of Hancock did not accomplish its object, we discourage the registrars from taking their returns in person to New Orleans, and as Johnson's man Friday expected, defeat the election.

Gov. Davis. This distinguished personage arrived in Baltimore on the 23rd ult., direct from Havana.

Ex-President Davis's efforts to rebuke the Confederacy in New Orleans in conjunction with Gen. Hancock, failed owing to the interference of Gen. Grant. Mr. Davis has followed his friend Hancock to Baltimore, where it is hoped he and the 2nd Washington, with the assistance of Mr. Johnson, may have better success.

General and Guadalupe. The march of the Express has touched up the rebel fustle of Gonzalez and Guadalupe, and they burn like a piece of old punk. We will give a few of their retorts tomorrow. We are informed that their usual arguments: "You lie! you lie! YOU LIE!"

OUR REMEDY.

The Herald becomes serious in replying to our proposed remedy against the Ku-Klux Klan, and informs us that the Government and laws have opposed at the North as well as at the South, and asks if they "all should be shot down like dogs"? So long as the Copperheads confine their opposition to the Government by words, so long are they not shot down like dogs.

The Union men in the North would not wait for you to take your victims out on a public square and butcher them publicly before they commenced retaliation, and thus let you kill them all off in detail, as you are doing in Texas.

Without any public notice, advertisement, or other announcement, the number of steamer days has been reduced to two. Two miles per week from New Orleans and the rest of the world, are all that we are to have until it shall please his mightiness, General Quarles Morgan, to give us more.

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A boat is to leave Brashear City, two belians, on Sundays and Thursdays, with passengers and mails from New Orleans and Galveston after 6 o'clock on Sunday morning will lie over there dormant until the following Thursday morning and arrive here on Friday. That is to say it will lay over in New Orleans just the time that it takes it to come from New York. This is a pleasant prospect for business men.

A few days since the Brazos boat was withdrawn, cutting off that trade from Galveston, to the serious injury of our merchants, some of whom had large orders ready for shipment.

The prospect is certainly not very encouraging for San Antonio, with two steamers a week from New Orleans, and our inefficient mail arrangement between here and Galveston.

Thousands and thousands of dollars were spent for the midnight mail between Philadelphia and New York, in addition to several daylight mails, but here we are forced to content ourselves with two in the week.

New York, April 3.—Gold, 137 1/2. The demand for Cotton is good, and prices have advanced to 28 1/2 to 29.

London, April 3.—Consols, 93 1/2. Bonds, 72 1/2. Liverpool, April 3.—Cotton buoyant; sales large, at 11 1/4 to 12 1/4.

Berlin, April 3.—Speakers in the North German Diet praise the new treaty. Bismarck said it met with universal approval, and added it was clear on all points.

Washington, April 3.—Proceedings to-day intensely interesting. It is noticed that in test votes in all legal questions the minority is more than sufficient to prevent impeachment, and that the best legal talent always vote with the Democrats.

Advice to the Treasury Department represent that nearly all Custom House officials at Brownsville, Texas, have been arrested. The Special Deputy Collector has been suspended by the Secretary of the Treasury.

Business in a very unsettled condition on account of frauds. Two of the most prominent candidates for Collector of Internal Revenue at New Orleans now are Col. A. L. Gurney and Capt. Lacy.
