CORN FOR STOCK.—Corn, for fattening animals and maintaining animal heat, during cold weather, excels all other grains. It requires strong digestive powers when fed in quantities; and for feed to all kinds of stock, at every age, is ill adapted. As food for young and growing animals, requiring a rich diet, in forming bone and muscle, it is bad economy, unless for market. Oats, peas and beans promote growth and for this reason should form the grain feed for growing animals. Oats and horses can be made to perform much more labor, and cows will yield more and richer milk, on a generous diet of corn-meal; but in the long run, it affects their health. The horse needs richer food than the ox, and will bear it; yet, under all circumstances is not the grain. Some of the ill effects of a course of high feeding the horse upon corn are seen in a dull eye, dry skin and rough coat. To roadsters, particularly in warm weather, when liable to be overheated by exertion, it gives a tendency to greater heat, and to laying on fat; when a diet is needed simply to repair waste muscle, oats, dry hay and carrots are the most appropriate for fast-driving horses. For draught horses, whose motions are slow, the bad effects of a meal are not so apparent; still a mixture of other grain, ground with corn, is much better.

WHAT BESCHER WILL DO WHEN HE IS POPE.—When I am Pope, I propose to promulgate some new articles of faith:

1. Every man shall be married by the age of twenty-five, or show good cause for neglect of duty.

2. Every man shall annually tax himself one-tenth of his income, until the sum reaches the amount of—, to procure Books, Journals, and Newspapers.

LAVACA, April 6th, 1868. DEAR SIR:—When not very long since a colored man was chased for several hundred yards, in Lavaca, and overtaken and his bowels cut out. It was only a "d-d nigger" killed. The humanitarians who done the deed, are living about twenty miles up the country, one of them was arrested at the time and the case examined before a rebel court, but as the principal witness was a "nigger," of course his testimony was no evidence.

HARTFORD, April 7.—Democratic majority is 1500. The Republicans have increased their majority on joint ballot thus securing the election of a Radical Senator.

Washington Items.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—In the case of the steamer Battle, captured at Mobile, the Supreme Court decided that the capture vitiated the license.

The Supreme Court also decided that a contract interrupted by war must be completed on the return of peace.

The Fortress Monroe brig Harriet, from Matanzas, experienced heavy weather north of Cape Hatteras. She lost her sails and rudder.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—In Connecticut except in thirteen towns, English's majority is 1294; legislature, Radical.

European.

LONDON, April 6.—Bancroft has been authorized to negotiate a Commerce and Navigation treaty with the North German Confederation.

It is reported that at a meeting of the Cabinet yesterday, the Ministry resolved to resign if, after the recess of Parliament, the opposition return their large majority.

PARIS, April 6.—The Etandard says the affairs of Paraguay are known to be less desperate than Brazilians represented.

Michigan.

New Constitution of Michigan defeated. Seventy towns including Lansing, gave 8000 majority against Constitution.

Sandusky, Ohio, yesterday gave democratic ticket by 200 majority.

Democrats carried Keokuk, Iowa, which went Republican last year.

Gun Powder Plot.

SAVANNAH, April 6.—At a Republican meeting at Valdosta, Georgia, last night, a disturbance was caused by the discovery of a keg, containing a small quantity of powder, under the Speakers' desk, the meeting dispersed amid considerable excitement.

Canada.

MONTREAL, April 7.—Dr. Arcy McGeec, member of Canadian Parliament, was shot dead at Ottawa to-day, assassin escaped.

Havana.

HAVANA, April 6.—There is great activity in dock yards and fortifications. Jamaica advises say British anticipated trouble growing out of Alabama claims. Vents very severe at same port and at Porto Rico.

Mexico.—A bill before Congress forbidding English Merchants to export specie until England apologizes for recent smuggling. Fresh conspiracy discovered. Attempts for pacification of Yucatan and Linaloa are not very successful.

We were pained to learn this week that Dr. A. Seitz, a German physician, living on the Colleta in this county, met his death (as is supposed by his own hands) on Saturday last.
