Power conferred by the City Charter-State Law in regard to Irrigation property, &c.

ANTICLE 28TH, SECTION STR. CITY CHARTEN To re-open the old irrigating ditches within an bayond the present limits of the city, "and to regulate all matters connected with the lame, water gates," and distribution of water for irrigation. Provided, That their ordinances shall not conflict with private and former established rights. THE DITCHES.

The subject of our irrigating ditches one of great importance to our city. While irrigable lands are enhanced in production of vegetables. But like almost all other things pertaining to our city government, our ditches have been wrongielly managed. The public in general have been heavily taxed to keep us a system of irrigation, which has in the mais innured to the exclusive profit and benefit of a few land-holders. The present administration have been so over-wacked by the informanagement of past administrations that they have been contented, up to this time, to take the contented, up to this time, to take the castom of their predecessors as the cor-rect rule—at least in the munagement of the ditches. The custom has been for the city to employ Ditch Commissioners each year, to superintend the cleaning of the disches and division of water; also to employ labor to do the work. This ditch-cleaning has become a heavy expense to the city. During the present administration two thousand five bundred dollars have been paid out for ditch cleaning and Ditch Commissioners. The city receives nothing back for this labor. cleaning and Ditch Commis which is performed for the sole benefit of those living on and owning irrigable land. The city owns five days' water on the San Pedro ditch, and, like every other owner of water on that ditch, should be liable to help keep it in re pair. This practice of paying from the general fand the expense of repairing and keeping in repair these irrigating disches, has been wrong from the beginning and has been an injustice upon the general community. The charter of the city does not warrant the city anthorities in taking money from the common treas-ury to clean and repair these ditches; the laws of the State do not warrant it.

NEW PELEANS: | INT. CO.

Elsewhere we publish the section of the city charter conferring upon the city authorities the power to reopen and regulate irregution ditches, and also the the same matter. Following the section from the charter is the State law bearing upon the same subject. The power con-ferred is to order, regulate and control the time, mode, or errecting, eleming, guarding the ditches, and the protecting the dams, ditches, roads and bridges belonging to irrigable property. The power to assess and collect fines for vioation of any regulations established by the city or the owners of irregable lands The power to order meetings of owners of irrigable lands for the election of commissioners and other officers, etc. To fine any person refusing to pay his or her proportion of the expense in and on said ditches. Said fine to be collected by the public renting of the property, if necessary. To open new ditches or stop up old ones when the health of the community demands it. And, finally, any person amenable to the irrigation laws who may refuse to work on any ditch or acqueduct can be summoned before a Justice of the Peace and fined.

During the many years of misrule the old Spanish custom, which is in force still in our county management of ditchs. was abandoned; persons owning property entitled to irrigation were relieved of the necessity of keeping the ditches in order, and the money of the common tressury was used for the purpose.

Men, like Maverick and Devine, could own hundreds of scree of irrigable lands with impunity so long as the merchant, the mechanic and the day laborer paid for the cleaning of the ditches, and even paid salaries to Ditch Commissioners to lift the flood-gates, and regulate the water bours.

The present administration are now determined to frame an ordinance in strict accordance with the old usage, the ony charter, and the State law.
