The Memphis, El Paso and Pa-cific Railroad.

The project of building a road to the Pacific by way of El Paso, is again being agitated in Congress by a memorial from the Executive Committee of the Directors of the existing corporation organized under an act of the legislature of Texas, approved February 4, 1856, consisting of John C. Fremont of New York, B. H. Epperson of Texas, William Schnoele of Pennsylvania W. G Snethen of Maryland. The State endowed this company with 10,240 acres per mile, making 8,325,120 acres for the whole line of eight hundred and thirteen miles in length, from Jefferson on Red

River, to El Paso en the Rio Grande. This was the favorite route before the rebellion, and but for slavery and the rebellion, would to-day have been the Main Pacific road through the United States territory. The success of the Union Pacific road has relieved the nation of the necessity of a more southern road to the Pacific, and the next road built to the Pacific, must consult the wants of commerce. The shortest, the most feasible, the best paying route is the one next to be chosen for a Pacific railway, and that route is only to be found through Texas and Mexico to a point on the Blas. Such a road would have the layer for insulting the brick-layer's advantage which no other route would, of passing through a fertile, rich, papulated country, abounding in material to build with and labor to build; it would also have the advantage of several hundred miles in shortness, and it would sommand the direct trade of China and the whole South American coast, to better nautical advantage than any port on the California coast. The iron and matrial for constructing such a road could be supplied from point to print along the entire route, by river or railroad transportation, and not subject the rolling stock at each end of the road to be worn out in the building of the road, as is the case with the Union Pacific, and would be the case with the Momphis and El l'aso road. The Memphis and El Paso road would penetrate a wilderness, and for hundreds of miles a desert, devoid of population and building material, and while it would enjoy immeasurable advantages over the more Northera route, it would not be the road for commerce

Besides the many advantages of the road through Mexico-it could be built for half the money it would take to build the El Paso road.

Looking at the matter in a nationa point of view, a railroad penetrating Mexico, and binding it, as it were, to the United States, is one of the needs of the times. Our necessity as a republic requires that we exercise a decided influence in the affairs of our sister republic, and no more powerful agent can be us d
