NOT GENERALLY KNOWS. - Martic. Van Buren is the only man who held the office of President, Vice President, Minister to England, Governor of his own State, and member of both Houses of Congress Thomas H. Benton is the only man who held a seat in the United States Senate for thirty consecutive years. The only instance of father and son in the United States Senate at the same time is that of the Honorable Henry Dodge, Senator from Wiscons'n, and his son, Augustus . Dodge, Senator from Iowa General James Shields is the only man who ever represent-ed two States in the United States Senate. At one time he was Senator from Illinois, and subsequently from Minnesota. John Quincy Adams held positions under the Government during every administration from that of Washington to that of Polk, during which he died. He had been Minister to England, member of both Houses of Congress, Secretary of State, and President of the United States. He died while a member of the House of Representatives.

AN INCIDENT OF THE ERIE CATASTRO-HE.-Wm Summers of the Syracuse Standard, who was among the pas-sengers on the ill-fated train, but escaped uninjured, relates a very affecting incident, that of a young woman with a beautiful child of three years, who after riding for some mi'es in the same car he was in complained of being unwell, and was urged to go into the sleeping car; she went there a few moments before the fatal crash, and although escaping serious injury herself, her lovely babe was instantly killed. The agony of the bereaved mother was fearful to witness. She upbraided herself; and in her mental anguish called upon the spectators to witness that she was not blameworthy, for she had never before ventured to travel without her husband, and that now, when from home without h m for the first time, their only child was killed.
