More Atrocious Murders—Six Men Killed at Perryville.

We learn of an unfortunate difficulty in the neighborhood of Perryville, in which, within the past week, five persons have been killed. The statement as to the number killed may be somewhat exaggerated. We take the rumor current in town. But there is little doubt but that there has been bloody work in that neighborhood. We are informed that the killing is the result of old neighborhood feuds. Perryville is near where the three corners of McLennan, Coryell and Bell counties meet. When will such work cease?
Since writing the above we learn that the attacking party first killed a man by the name of Sessums, they next went to the house of Shackelford calling him out and killing him, on their departure from the house the party was fired on and a man named Jackson, formerly of Gurley's regiment, was killed. But the party proceeded on to the house of Schornover and called out and killed three brothers of that name. This is what we learn from citizens who have seen parties representing themselves to be from the neighborhood of the scene.
We learn that the parties attacked and killed were accused of being horse thieves, and that the attacking party had resolved to rid the country of them by such terrible means. We make the above statements as they pass around on the street, without vouching for their truthfulness.—Waco Register, April 29.

NOT GENERALLY KNOWN.—Martir.

Van Buren is the only man who held the office of President, Vice President, Minister to England, Governor of his own State, and member of both Houses of Congress. Thomas H. Benton is the only man who held a seat in the United States Senate for thirty consecutive years. The only instance of father and son in the United States Senate at the same time is that of the Honorable Henry Dodge, Senator from Wisconsin, and his son, Augustus C. Dodge, Senator from Iowa. General James Shields is the only man who ever represented two States in the United States Senate. At one time he was Senator from Illinois, and subsequently from Minnesota. John Quincy Adams held positions under the Government during every administration from that of Washington to that of Polk, during which he died. He had been Minister to England, member of both Houses of Congress, Secretary of State, and President of the United States. He died while a member of the House of Representatives.

AN INCIDENT OF THE ERIE CATASTROPHE.—Wm Summers of the Syracuse Standard, who was among the passengers on the ill-fated train, but escaped uninjured, relates a very affecting incident, that of a young woman with a beautiful child of three years, who after riding for some miles in the same car he was in, complained of being unwell, and was urged to go into the sleeping car; she went there a few moments before the fatal crash, and although escaping serious injury herself, her lovely babe was instantly killed. The agony of the bereaved mother was fearful to witness. She unbathed herself; and in her mental anguish called upon the spectators to witness that she was not blameworthy, for she had never before ventured to travel without her husband, and that now, when from home without him for the first time, their only child was killed.

MILITARY CHANGE.—We see by our exchanges that there is to be a change in the command of the troops stationed at Natchez. From a quarter that we deem to be reliable we learn that General N. A. M. Dudley goes to Natchez to assume the command of that post. We congratulate the citizens of that beautiful city upon the fact. A truer friend, a better man, a braver or more gallant soldier is not upon the rolls of the army. His old friends, in and out of the army, residents there, will give him a hearty welcome. We have not heard to what post Captain Biddle has been assigned.—Jackson (Miss.) Pilot.

It will be recollected that one Mercer, a Bostonian, took out to Washington territory, a year or so ago, a couple of hundred of the "anxious and aimless" single females of New England. The report that the expedition had proved a failure was erroneous. The dear creatures were landed safely. Mercer married one of them himself, and the one hundred and ninety-six others have been promptly taken by retail marriers. Only three remain on the market.

OUR DESPATCHES--CLOSE OF THE IMPEACHMENT TRIAL.

Our despatches are very voluminous. The closing sentences of Mr. Bingham's speech will send a thrill of pleasure through every loyal heart in the land.

Impeachment will be finally voted on, on Tuesday. Conviction seems certain. A bill for the admission of Arkansas has been introduced.

The change of time of the meeting of the Texas Convention is no doubt due to General Grant. All things look bright.

WELL TOLD.--The next morning the judge of the police court sent for me. I went down and he received me cordially, had heard of the wonderful things I had accomplished by knocking down five persons and assaulting six others, and was proud of me.

We don't know what route the President will take when he goes back to his home in Tennessee; but, unless he is ready to go to his final home, it is safe to say he will avoid the Erie.

Virginia Republican Convention.

RICHMOND, May 6.--The Republican State Convention met to-day in the Metropolitan Hall; a full attendance. All the counties were represented; the two races were about equally represented.

The Convention is still in session. About one hundred and fifty delegates to the Conservative Convention, which meets to-morrow, have arrived.

Impeachment Proceedings--Conclusion of Mr. Bingham's Speech.

WASHINGTON, May 6.--House.--Mr. Stevens was called to order by the Speaker, in his Alta Vela explanation.

The House went into Committee of the Whole with the understanding that the speakers avoid discussing impeachment.

Senate.--The Impeachment Court drew a crowded house.

Mr. Bingham concluded his masterly effort as follows: He might be pardoned for quoting the words of England's great historian, that "had the case against James failed, the tree of liberty would have crumbled."

Great applause followed the conclusion of Mr. Bingham's speech. Such enthusiasm has seldom been exhibited in the Halls of Congress.

Mr. Chase ordered the galleries to be cleared.

A motion to adjourn to Saturday was lost by a vote of 20 to 29. The doors were then closed.

A resolution to admit official reporters was lost.

Summer's resolutions were discussed to adjournment.

A resolution to have the debate in retirement published, was carried by a vote of 28 yeas to 20 nays.

Yeas--Messrs. Anthony, Bayard, Backus, Davis, Dixon, Doolittle, Edmunds, McCreery, Morrill of Vt., Patterson of Tenn, Saulsbury, Sprague, Van Winkle, Vickers, and Wiley.

The only doubtful Senator voting with the majority is Trumbull.

The Ratification of the Constitution in Arkansas.

WASHINGTON, May 6. General Gillem has made a report to General Grant, showing a majority of over 12,000 for the ratification of the Constitution in Arkansas.

A Republican Convention at Richmond, Va.

RICHMOND, May 7.--The Republican Convention met here to-day. A. McCrane, of Winchester, was nominated for Congress at large.

The preamble and resolutions were adopted.

The first resolution asserts that the Government owes it to Virginia to promptly admit her when the reconstruction acts are complied with.

The second resolution guarantees equal rights to all men in every respect.

The third resolution sets forth the advantages of the new Constitution.

The fourth resolution endorses the necessity of public schools for all children.

The fifth resolution pledges the party to use all efforts to advance the principles of reconstruction; and to remove the disabilities from those who participated in the rebellion.

The sixth resolution urges the speedy payment by the Government of losses of loyal citizens during the war.

The seventh resolution endorses the impeachment.

The eighth resolution endorses General Grant for President, and Senator Wilson, of Massachusetts, for Vice President.

Tumultuous and prolonged cheers followed the reading of the seventh and eighth resolution.

A motion to substitute Mr. Wade's name for Mr. Wilson's, was lost.

Hunnicutt appeared and spoke, pledging his support to the nominees of the Convention.

The Convention adjourned sine die.

WASHINGTON, May 8.--Noon.--It is stated that the Impeachment Court adjourned over till Monday at the instance of Chief Justice Chase, who desired time to reflect on the proper manner of putting questions.

Public sentiment is not perceptibly changed by to-day's proceedings.

Pending proceedings to-day Mr. Sumner moved procedures of consideration of articles, defeated 15 to 39.

WASHINGTON, May 7.--Noon.--Only Mr. Trumbull of the doubtful Senators

voted against the publication of speeches made in retirement; the vote was 20 to 28.

A South Carolina Committee with a protest against the Constitution will appear before the Reconstruction Committee; their remonstrances and personal representations regarding the situation, attract the attention of the Conservative-Republicans.

Complete registration, whites ten thousand two hundred and fifty-four; blacks sixty thousand thirty-seven.

House.--A deficiency of 70,000 for the administration of the reconstruction acts in 3rd Military District.

A joint resolution was reported ordering the President to send war vessels to the Gulf to protect the fishing interest and to demand reparation for certain injuries.

In course of debate Pike said: Who is afraid of war, the resolution asks nothing but that your laws shall be embraced.

An amendment proposed to send vessels to the coast of Ireland and take care of American interest, rejected.

During the debate Pike thought some one called him a coward, made some inaudible remark for which he was called to order.

Tariff question introduced.

Pike wanted free trade for ship building material.

Eldridge asked if free trade was good for New England ship builders, why was it not good for Western laborers.

After a long discussion somewhat jocular in the case; resolution passed 92 to 39.

Robinson offered a resolution expunging impeachment resolutions from journals.

The Speaker declared it was not a privileged question.

Mr. Robinson said he would bring it up again.

Mr. Stevens introduced a bill for the admission of Arkansas; ordered to be printed. Adjourned.

Mr. Steven's bill is as follows: Whereas, The people of Arkansas in permanence of the provisions of an act entitled an act to provide for the more efficient government of the rebel States, passed March 2nd 1867 and the acts supplementary thereto have framed and adopted a Constitution of the State Government which is Republican in form, and the legislature of said State has duly ratified the amendment to the Constitution of the United States, proposed by the 39th Congress and known as article 14. Therefore be it enacted that the State of Arkansas is entitled to be admitted to representation in Congress as one of the States of the Union, upon the following fundamental conditions, viz:

That the Constitution of Arkansas shall never be so amended or changed to deprive citizens, or class of citizens of the United States of the right to vote, who are entitled to vote by the Constitution herein recognized, except as a punishment for such crimes as one now laid down in common law, after he shall have been duly convicted.

Delegation with North Carolina Constitution and several members of the Congressional delegation arrived.

Revenue to-day 448,000.

Heavy storm this evening.

No Western markets.

Court prolonged; second session resulted in the adoption of the following: That the court adjourn till Monday at 11 o'clock, when it will consider rules, and the vote on the several articles shall be taken up now Thursday, without debate.

Speeches are all to be limited to fifteen minutes on the entire subject and not each article. Members may file opinions within two days; after vote on articles, to be published with proceedings.

Time Changed of the Texas Convention.

NEW ORLEANS, May 6.--Gen. Buchanan has ordered the assembling of the Texas Constitutional Convention, June 1, instead of the 15th as previously ordered.

Richmond Convention.

RICHMOND, May 7.--The Conservative Convention met at noon to-day, sixty-three counties represented; owing to a railroad accident the Southwestern delegates have not yet arrived.

John B. Baldwin of Augusta, was chosen President. In his speech, he said "This Convention has assembled to try and save the life of Virginia by defeating a Constitution, which is a galling disgrace." After the Committees were appointed the convention adjourned until night.

Resolved, That we select candidates who are true to the Constitution of the United States, and with the honor of Virginia, and without reference to the ability to take the "iron clad."

Price Case Decided.

NEW YORK, May 7.--The celebrated Peterhoff prize case was decided to-day in the Court of Admiralty. \$190,000 to be distributed by the Secretary of the Navy, among the captors, \$280,000 to be paid English owners.

Two men-of-war belonging to the Spanish frigate Corena, were rescued from an infuriated mob.

Colonel Mahan, late of the Irish Brigade, attempted to incite the crowd to attack them while under the protection of the police.

Miscellaneous.

ATLANTA, May 6.--It is understood that the test oath will not be required of the members of the legislature, and that the legislature will first be assembled at Milledgeville as a provisional body, to take action on the Constitutional amendment and then adjourn.

NEW YORK, May 6.--H. J. Messenger, the broker, whose failure was reported yesterday has effected a compromise with certain creditors at 75 cents on the dollar.

The Ocean Queen with \$727,000 treasury has arrived.

The Java took out \$63,000 specie.

TORONTO, May 6.--Altogether seven suspected Fenians have been arrested for the circulation of papers with Fenian proclamations which were forbidden in Montreal.

CHICAGO, May 6.--The Conference took up and discussed until adjournment, the admission of Southern delegates.

WASHINGTON, May 7.--Mr. Donnelly says he was misunderstood in the House and that he neither desired, nor does he desire a reconciliation with Washburne; his proposal to take a drink meant nothing of that kind.

Gen. Grant sent a message to Congress conveying a communication from Gen. Canby, detailing the evil effect of compelling the state officers of the North or South Carolina to take the oath; many good men acting with the Union party can take it, other good men who could refuse taking it, feeling that unworthy motives will be attributed to them. Gen. Grant expresses no opinion on the subject, he only transmits Canby's letter to protect the white people of South Carolina against the Constitution. Referred to the Reconstruction Committee.

ALBANY, May 7.--The Legislature adjourned sine die.

BOSTON, May 7.--The message of Gov. English of Connecticut, was delivered before the General Assembly to-day. He alluded to the fact of their not being a semblance of a Republican Government in, or over one third of the settled United States, and reviewed the policy of the governing majority in Congress.

AUGUSTA, GA., May 6.--The Southern Press Association convened to-day. Montgomery, Columbus, Atlanta, Knoxville, Chattanooga, Macon, Augusta, Savannah and Charleston papers were represented. Lamar of the Columbus Sun and Times was elected temporary president; Reese of the Macon Journal and Messenger, secretary. After organization they adjourned until to-morrow.

European.

LONDON, May 6.--It is reported that France and Russia had a consultation about the Cretan affair, is authoritatively denied. France has suspended diplomatic relations with Tonic, because of the repeated outrages on French citizens.

A division on Gladstone's resolution is expected to-morrow. An immense meeting was held at St. James Hall, to favor the continuance of the Irish Church. The Bishop of Canterbury presided and other eminent Tories are on the stand.

The Lord Mayor offered a series of resolutions in favor of continuing a union of church and state.

Arch Bishop York offered a series of resolutions declaring it was an attack on the English church, and a movement to establish a papacy. Much tumult and confusion at this point.

LONDON, May 7.--A nolle prosequere was entered in the case of Mullany, who testified to the telegram from Hong Kong. Minister to Japan, Kenbery, is at Osaka and demands redress for damages occasioned by the recent disturbances, and is supported by the presence of the East India fleet.

LONDON, May 7.--John Bright and other Liberals have petitioned for commutating punishment of the Fenian Barrett convicted of murder.

LONDON, May 7.--Bullion decreased two thirty two thousand.

In the House of Commons, large attendance; Gladstone said he proposed that after the House had acted on resolution to offer a supplementary act to remain in force till August ninth, he then moved second resolution to be given in.

Hardy said the opposition intended to destroy Irish Church, Ministry, and wishes to alter for better, but would make no resistance now to second the resolution, which then passed without division.

Gladstone then moved third resolution which was adopted.

BERLIN, May 7.--North German Diet, rejected by a decided vote.
