GABOR de NAPHEGYL

Gabor de Naphezyi, the pseudo Hungarian who out a figure in this city in 1852, has recently been arrested and mprisoned on a charge of forgery in New York. He forged the name of Reverdy Johnson to a letter, apon which he received \$50,000. The New York Tribune speaks thus of this notorious charac-

Gabor de Naphegyi has been caught at last. For years he has been passing himself off as a Hungarian, and once at St. Louis, in 1850, he represented himself as a quandam accretary of Louis Kossuth. He is not a Hungarian, but a native of Pisck, near Prague, in Bohe mis, and his name is Sonnenberg. He very eleverly translated his name into Hungarian, Sonne being Nap, and Beig

being Hegy.

He made his first appearance in this country at New Orleans, in 1849, and after a short stay in that city, the police were at his hoels. The cause of it was a portrait of General Taylor in glass beads on waxed paper, which he exhibited at the St. Louis and St. Charles How tels for a rafle, and after solling hearly all the "chances, it is said that he too both the money and the picture, and was for ever after missed in that locality. A Catholic priest at Carrollton, Louisians, might probably tell comething of this man's hiding for a week or so; at least some of this priest's gold coin found its way to St. Louis, without the priest's

At St. Louis, as the guest of banker Mandelbaum and protege of Drs. Poliak, Pope, and Prout, he failed in his ondeavors to exhibit a hydro-oxygen gas microscope and a solar microscope, and after involving the Convent of St, Francis Xavier, the Female Seminary of the Sacred Heart, and a number of private gentlemen in h avy lose, he suddenly dasppeared. While in St. I onis, le caused to be published in the Anzeiger, a German paper, a series of sketches which a gentleman now connected with the New York press wrote for him. These sketches be afterwards caused to be translated into English, and palmed

them off as original. He was in this city for a while, but about the time Kossuth arrived he left and went to Washington, where he suceceded in amusing the then President, Mr. Fillmore, by a translation of the Lord's Prayer as the Constitution, in 54

languages. He soon made off from Washington, and when Governor Ujhany reached Austin, in Texas, in 1853, he was introduced to "Colonel" Gabor de Naphegyi, s professor of modern languages in the University of Texas. As a matter of course, Mr. Sonnenberg did not await the rise of the sun, but decamped and went to Mexico.

At Vera Cruz and the City of Mexico he undertook to build gas works, carned money, and for a while made as honest

The year 1865 say him back again in New York, as a commission merchant, at No. 45 Beaver street. His harvest was greatest when Don Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna sojonraed here, preparing for an expedition to Mexico. The Exedusfrom Germany. According to the latest perfectly reliable information from Bremen, over 8,000 persons left that port alone during the week preceding Easter, for the United States, in four steamers and seventeen sailing vessels, and the steerage accommodations of the atenmers have been secured in anticipation already up to the end of June next. Dissatisfaction with the condition of public affairs and fear of an impending great war had taken such hold of the people, particularly of Southern Germany, and even Austria, the latter of which heretofore has furnished but an insignificant quota to the yearly contingent of German emigration, that it seems a plain proposition that for the current year number of emigrants will be limited but by the capacity of the vessels en-gaged in carrying them. Never have Spanish silver fleets carried a prouder spanish allver fleets carried a prouder nor a mone valuable freight; and if the great sugration of nations that, during the Middlo Ages, swept all over burope, be compared as the on-ly instance in history to this latter day emigration as to numbers, it certainly cannot be as to the character and value of the material. - Washington Chronicle.

Texas must do her best to secure a portion of this immense tide of emmigration. As soon as reconstruc-tion is consummated, let one or five millions of dollars be devoted to emigration purposes. Let us send ships to Europe, and there is no doubt but what they will come back ladened with emigrants, who will rejoice over the good fortune which has landed them in a country, so fall of plenty; a climate so healthful and mild; where they can have homes and anjoy the blessings of freedom . The Chronicle appeals to Congress to pass measures to protect the emigrants in their passage over the sea, As the unusual suffering in many parts of Central Europe, and that many poor emaciated people will flock aboard emigrant vessels, where they will be crowded together, and ill fed, cause postilence, as in the horrible instances of the "Leibnitz' and "John Brougham" last year.

IMPEACHMENT—THE PIRST

Our noon dispatches of Saturday give the proceedings of the impeachment court and the vote upon the 11th article. The vote stood 35 for conviction, 19 against convictio; lacking one vote for a two thirds majority. The court then adjourned until the 26th inst.

Mr. Wagner thus takes the blame on is own shoulders, a very Christian spirit, but one which will not answer the publie or those directly interested. For the sake of truth, for the sake of Christian integrity, we are sorry the whole truth was not told by Mr. Wagner.

Let us start with the fact, that \$10,-000 were donated to erect a building and establish a school in this city. Now what is there to show for this \$10,000? A lot worth about \$500, and an unfinished building worth about \$2,000-in all \$2,500 specie, or about \$3,570 currency. The whole concern is not worth, at the highest figure, over \$4,000. Upon this building is a mortgage for \$2,400, specie; if sold under this mortgage the property would barely realize the amount. This would dwindle the actual Of Wolf interest in St. Mary's Hall down to nothing. Now what has become of the \$10,000 donation ?

We are not acquainted with all the acts in connection with the erection of St. Mary's Hall, but the scandal and rumors about the mismanagement of the entire affair has cast a stain upon the character, of all who have had anything to do with it. We learn that Mr. Campbell offered to fluish the building at a figure much within the anm on hand for that purpose, and that, in place of giving it to a builder to finish, it was tinkered with by Mr. Wagner, and finally Colonel Washington, a former United States officer, who deserted h's flag and turned traitor, was given the superintendence of the building; and, under his and Mr. Wagner's mismanagement, it reached its present nafinished state, with a debt of \$2,400 upon it,

There is no denying the facts, which stare us in the face; and although we sign him to everlating ignominy, if he bolieve that Bishop Gregg was victumized, atill we hold him responsible as the public servent in whose hands this fund was placed for the benefit of a portion of the pone
