NASBY.
A Convention at the Corners to Nominate a County Ticket—How Joe Bigler Opposed the Resolutions Unanimously Adopted at such Conventions.
[Written for the Toledo Blade.]
(Post Office, CONFIDENTIAL X Roads, Wich in the State of Kentucky)
April 26, 1868.

There never will be peace or anything like it at the Corners till that disturber Joe Bigler, and his faithful adherent, aider and abettor, Pollock, are shot or otherwise killed. In the olden time, afore the innogershan uv the 'Ablishers, we led a short way uv disposin uv sich. It was a maxim in the South that their cood be pees only where there wuz a perfect yoonanimitiy uv sentiment, and to bring about that 'one's uv ideas—that the delictful concord wch wuz so desirable—we were in the habit uv shootin or hangin the most stubborn uv those wch didn't agree with the majority, and tarin and featherin those who wore yet accessible to Kentucky reason. By vigoraly perswain this course the minorities in this vicinity wuz kept to libly small and postrollable. Why these cusses haven't bin so treated, passes my comprehension.

Our Conventions to nominate candidates for county offices wuz held yesterday. And Joseff let us be wepi, when Pollock ostentatiously hauded him a pocket handkercher.

"If I held any heterodox views I her repented uv 'em, and Pollock, and we purpase to vote for all yer resooloshens, like frisky-lamb wuz glad to get back to the troo fold. Don't we Pollock?"

"Certin, we do. The Conventions may go on and count us in ex troo con verts from Ablishism; wch in view of the fact that my store her bin set on fire twice becaz uv my awful opinions, I may be sed to be literally a brand pluckt from the burnin. Go on."

Finidin, we wuz bound to stay, we went on. The first thing in order wuz the adoption uv resooloshens, ex follows:

1. We resolved we had the utmost confidence in Androo Johnson, President of the Yoonited States, provided he wuz impeached—ef he wuz, then we shood hev the privilege uv considrin him worthy uv confidence or not, ex the circumstances of the case shood wvraunt.
2. That the Congress of the Yoonited States wuz a unconstitutional body, wch wuz persistently endeavorin to break up the Government of the Yoonited States, wch we wuz ex persistently trying to sere.
3. That the only hope of Yoonus lay in the displacement of sich traitors ex Grant, Sumner and Stevens and the puttin in their places sich gileless patriots ex Breckenridge, Britte, Valandyyum, et al.
4. That the thanks by the Democracy is due the people uv the South for their forbearance in not risin to sweep the radical faction from the face uv t' earth.

At this plet Bigler arose. He wanted to know of this coavenahun, stylin itself Democratic, wuz agoin to be satisfied with them resooloshens? He called for the regler one wch without no Democratic platform wuz complete. He referred to the one dedicatin this Government forever to white men. "Here it is he sed."

Resolved, That this Government wuz established by white men, and that white men will keep it intact for white men and their posterity forever.

"I demand, ex a white man," sed this Bigler, "that this resooloshun be added. Let every white man, every proud Cansashen, who believes in race, say 'aye,' and with emphasis."

And every one of them hollered out "aye" with all their mite.

"Good," said Bigler, "good. White men and their posterity! what a noble sentiment. Say 'aye' to my resooloshun."

And they yelled "aye" agin.
Now Pollock, brother in the troo faith, newly baptized, will you open the door? Its better to be a doorkeeper in the house uv Democracy than to dwell in the tents of Ablishism! Open the door!

Wich Pollock did, and then entered—wat! Good Heavens!
A hundred Mulatto, Quadroon and ooo-roon niggers—two by two.
"Wat does this mean?" shrieked I. "Who are them?" gasped Deckin Pogram!
"Holl!" sed lassker Gavitt profanely. "They are the posterity referred to in my resooloshen. 'This government wuz established by white men and shel be preserved for white men and their posterity,' I think it read. These are the posterity. There may be a few here who wood be barretted on the score uv bein the posterity of white women, but these are exceptions. I shood hev in-clooded white women in my resooloshun. The majority uv those here, ex you kin easily determine by their color, are the posterity uv white men. They are not pure black. Here is every shade from the subdoo yaller uv the mulatts up to the almost white uv him who her only a sixteenth part bigger blood in his veins. Uv course they will take seats and assist in ex nominatin the ticket wch called us together."

"Uv course they won't" roared Deckin Pogram "I never will sit in a convention with niggers—never! never! never!!!"

"Very good. Ef this is the yoonanimitus decision, we won't nominate any ticket. I take the responsibility uv bustin this convention. Bat, oh, Deckin! wat a goin back on your principles. Dare you deny that these shades, these modified mokes, are the posterity uv white men? Deckin, shood you cast poor beamin eye over this assemblage, woodent it rest par-ontally and lovinly onto your own posterity? Oh, Deckin, ef you go back on the resooloshen wch you yoonanimitously voted for, don't I beg uv you, go back onto nacher. Don't desert your children. Don't turn a deaf ear to the pleadins uv nacher, or a blind eye to her supplications.—Hannibal Pogram, go and beg your father to permit you, his posterity, scarcely blacker than he and a cussed site handsoner, to mix in this yere caucus."

The Deckin indignantly left the room, and I follered soot, wich egg-sampel wuz follered by all uv us. Bigler and Pollock remained, and nominated a ticket uv these half-breeded susses, making it up entirely uv the Pogram, Gavitt and Punt niggers, ex these names, they sed, hed weight in the county! Who will deliver us from these two bodies uv death.

The Teachers of Young America.

There seems to be no doubt that women are superceding men as teachers in the schools of the United States. An examination of the census shows that of the 150,241 teachers in the common schools of the country, exactly 100,000 are women. In Massachusetts there are six times as many female as male teachers. In Vermont the proportion is five to one; in Iowa three to one. The disproportion is most marked in large cities. In New York there are only 178 male out of over 2,000 teachers; in Philadelphia, 83 in 1,300; and a similar proportion prevails in all other cities. The cause seems to be that few men are willing to enter systematically a profession which nowhere holds out a higher salary than three thousand dollars, the average payment being 2,000 dollars per annum. A leading principal in New York believes that soon there will be only women teaching in the schools. The Board of Education in New York declares that the teaching by women is equally satisfactory with that by men, and the Board of Cincinnati says it is superior.

The Occident, a Presbyterian newspaper published at San Francisco, has a letter from Virginia City, Nevada, announcing the arrival of Rev. Dr. Finney, well known in this city, who was on his way to California from Austin, Texas, to solicit aid from the churches of the Pacific coast for the restoration of religious institutions and the rebuilding and extension of churches in the State of Texas, now just struggling to rise above the weakness and desolation with which slavery and its attendant barbarism have afflicted that fine country. What a memorable event was the vote in the Western Convention, which made California a free State, by which it is already a nursing mother to the newest and greatest of the late slaveholding States.

Congressional.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—The House introduced, under the regular call, a bill to construe and prevent frauds in law regarding abandoned lands in the Southern States.

A joint resolution amending the Constitution, making naturalized citizens ineligible to the Presidency.

A bill was introduced for constructing a Government telegraph hence to New York.

A resolution appointing a committee of five to investigate Senator Henderson and the Missouri delegation affairs.

A preamble and resolution authorizing the Speaker to add two from those who voted against impeachment to the managers to be present and assist in the investigations.

Mr. Hinds reported Alaska Appropriation bill. Postponed to June.

Mr. Stevens offered a resolution calling for the secret proceedings of the Court. He said no one could doubt that there was deep damnation somewhere, and he wanted to find out who was guilty.

In answering the question whether Senators would have been justified in committing perjury, Mr. Stevens said: "Well, sir, I don't think it would have hurt them much."

The resolution passed.

After refusing to concur with the Senate for a recess, the House adjourned until to-morrow.

Senate.—The Virginia Constitution was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

The memorial of the Philadelphia Corn Exchange for modifications of the whisky tax, was referred to the Finance Committee.

Leave of absence has been granted to Mr. Grimes.

The deficiency appropriations for the Third Military District was passed.

The recess resolution from the House was passed.

Senator Harlan stated that he has had no communication with Bishop Simpson since the impeachment began.

The Senate adjourned to Thursday.

Washington Items.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Among the witnesses summoned by the managers are Dan. W. Voorhies, Mr. Fuller, of Kansas, and General F. Thomas Ewing.

The city charter expired to-day, the President not having signed an extension.

Stevens' resolution asking for official proceedings, caused a bitter debate in the Senate.

Washington Rumors and Surmises.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—It is stated that Cabinet changes are still pending, and it is asserted that the new Cabinet will tend to harmonize Congress and the President, and that the President will cease obstructing reconstruction or the Congressional plan; the progress of events having rendered his own impossible now, and the material interests of the South requiring immediate representation of some kind. This statement is made on high Republican authority.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Politics are very feverish. A mass with the third party element, though not sufficiently tangible, yet is enough so to warrant details.

The New York Tribune is captious over the elaboration of last night's despatches regarding changes in the President's Cabinet, rumors, as follows:

"The Washington agent of the Associated Press telegraphs the following, probably under White-House & Grimes-Fessenden & Co.'s dictation: 'The tone of leading Northern papers and the spirit of the debate in both the Senate and House to-day, indicate that the acquittal element, with Chase at its head, is to be read out of the Republican party, if the Chicago Convention can be ruled by Radical Congressmen and editors.'"

The Tribune's Washington despatch says: "First, the conspiracy on the part of Fessenden, Trumbull & Co., includes not merely the defeat of impeachment, but of the Republican party and of the candidates of the Chicago Convention; so far as Mr. Chase is concerned it is known, for he does not hesitate to say that he holds that the Republican party has been led in a wrong direction, and that he has always been opposed to impeachment. He has not abandoned those principles which he claims to be Republican—he believes in impartial suffrage, and in universal amnesty. Within the last few days Mr. Chase has said that if the Republican party should persist in its present course, a new party must irrevocably be organized."

The Times' special has the following regarding the stories about Chase and the Presidency. "It is finally coming into some leading shape—he has formally put himself into the hands of his friends, and said that while he is not a candidate, he is not object to the use of his name, and will run if nominated by the Conservatives."

The N. Y. World's special says: it is generally understood to-night that if the vote had been taken upon all the articles of impeachment yesterday, the President would have almost immediately reorganized his Cabinet. The State Treasury, War and Interior offices, were, as the report said, to be put in other hands. The following are the persons mentioned as those who were to assume the several Secretaryships: State Department, Mr. Evarts; Treasury Department, Mr. Groesbeck; War Dept., Ex-Gov. Cox of Ohio; Interior, Mr. Catton of Illinois, and Mr. Stansberry would probably be returned the position of Attorney General; no one mentioned for new head of Post Office Dept. As the impeachment stands, none of the changes can be expected to be made, and the administration of the government will probably continue for an indefinite period in the present hands.

European.

Opinion of London Press on Impeachment.

LONDON, May 18.—The morning Post says: the vote on impeachment is conclusive and the result demonstrates the folly of the radicals as the certainty of success was the only excuse for such a step, after all if the right is vindicated, it is due to accident; now take other grounds. It is considered that the vote is inconclusive.

LONDON, May 19.—Comments on acquitted Times says, the 11th article, almost too vigorous for any substantial charges, but the vote upon it corrects the fear of any party bias and shows the case to have been judged on its merits.

The morning Telegraph says: dignity and decorum have marked the whole trial.

The Standard says: Radical plot is beaten, and the country saved, the shame of deposing its Chief Magistrate, for refusing to obey an illegal act of Congress.

Barrett, the Clerkwell Fenian, has been reprieved one week more.

In debate on Austria treaty, Bismark said, while Prussia, without applying any pressure, waits until South Germany seeks union with the north confederation, all the rest lie in free action of the diet.

NOON DESPATCHES.

From Washington.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—The investigation of the managers into impeachment matters, has not developed anything as yet.

The Senate has postponed the admission of Arkansas indefinitely.

John Nagle, of Prince William Co., Virginia, sues Stanton for \$50,000, for trespassing on his farm.

A Chicago special to the N. Y. Tribune, says that stones were thrown at Gen. Logan, while at York, Penn., one stone missing Logan, struck Gov. Hahn, of Louisiana, on the breast. [It is not the first time Logan has been a mark for traitors.—Ed. Express.

Trouble at Port au Prince.

HAVANA, May 19.—Salvave has reached Port au Prince, he arrested many citizens, and shot some six American merchants, and robbed them. Many Americans were shot at their own windows, by troops. Salvave menaces the foreign consuls.

Mr. Belmont sends here for war vessels, and sent to Jamaica for vessels. Anxiety here is intense. Later—British Gunboat, Phoebe, left Jamaica, for Port au Prince, to assist the American Minister.

HAVANA, May 19.—Later—Port au Prince 12.—Whole country, except Gonaire, and Jaemel, and the Cape, in arms against Salvave. At Jaemel, the merchants were closing stores.

English Ministry again defeated.

LONDON, May 19.—The Ministry have been defeated on the Scotch reform bill. Delaral said the Ministry must consider their position.

Black Vomite.

VINA, Cruz, May 11.—The Vomito has made its appearance in a severe form, its victims are among the oldest inhabitants.

Rebel Encouragements to Immigration.

The Columbia Herald, a Ku-Klux-organ published in Tennessee, serves up the following highly seasoned dish, which we commend to any of our Germans disposed to be conservative.

"PLAYED OUT.—Perhaps our readers may remember that some months ago we mentioned, without comment, that some gentleman near Pleasant Grove, in this county, had procured from New York a party of German laborers, about thirty. If we remember right, we refrained from comment then through respect to the gentleman referred to. We did not believe the experiment would succeed, but we would not prejudice it.

There is no more affinity between the class of Dutch who emigrate to America as farm laborers, and the white people of the South, than there is between the white people and the negroes. As laborers, they are very little superior, and as a general thing they cannot be trusted. At least, such is the impression that we have taken up from a limited observation of them, and such is the character given them by those who have tried them. Having such an opinion of the Dutch emigrants, we have never been disposed to go into contact with their importation into Tennessee, as some of our contemporaries have done.

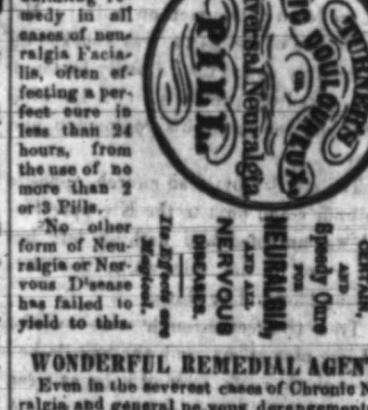
