The Republican's Apology.

The Austin Republican comes out in an apologetic article in regard to strictures upon the demagogism of a certain article which appeared recently in that journal upon the division of the State. The Republicans quotes from our article as follows:

"The ground of the opposition of the Austin ring (to division) does not appear publicly, but it is altogether political and partakes of a brutal character."

The word "brutal" is a misprint. If it occurred in our article, it should be "ideal." The tone of the Republican's article is of the "injured innocence" character, which does not look up to manly effort, the republicans of West Texas, who favor division, with no higher or better motive than a desire to furnish additional official positions for their own benefit.

The Republican falls back upon those three popular ideas, "schools, railroads, emigrants," and attempts to throw discredit upon those who advocate a division of the State, and to place them in an antagonistic position to reconstruction. We have advocated a division of the State upon the same principle we advocate public schools and measures for the better government of our State, and the building up of our community prosperity. We regard a division of the State in the light of a material interest, just as we would a system of railroads, or common schools, and we experience no such vitriolic solicitude pretended by the Austin Republican.

He also speaks of "Bart," "Joshua," "Simon," "Sam," and points to himself as "Tommy." This may lead to his identification and restoration to his friends. Vina Mors was recovered from these same Indians, and taken a few days since by her brother to her home and friends in Texas. The Nez-Perce have a black boy I shall get soon. Convention adjourned to await report from the committee of credentials tomorrow.

CHARLESTON, May 20.—The Conservatives of Charleston have nominated for Mayor Col. Wm. H. Marion, an ex-officer of the U. S. A., who served gallantly during the war and is now engaged in cotton planting; his opponent is G. Philibury, an ex-Bureau Agent, who will be supported by the Union Leagues and extreme Radicals.

3d. That we will disownenance open and notorious thieves and desperados in our social intercourses, and we will give them no comfort or countenance.

4th. That we will labor to restore the supremacy of the law in South Carolina.
