DEDER FROM COMMANDER IN CHIEF, GEN. LOGAN, FOR THEIR DECORATION.

The following official order from Maj-General Logan, having reference to a subject to which we have several times cal'ed attention, should not only enlist the full strength of the Grand Army, but receive for the posts the hearty co-operation of our citizens, especially of the ladies. Let the day be celebrated here as a general boliday:

HD-QRS. GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, 446 Fourteenth St. Washington, D. C., May 5, 1868. General Orders No. 11.

1. The 30th day of May, 1868, is designed for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet church-yard in the land. In this observance no form of ceremony is prescribed, but Posts and Comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may per-

We are arganized, comrades, as our regulations tells us, for the purpose, among other things, "of preserving and strengthening those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together the soldiers, sailors and marines who united to suppress the late rebellion," What can aid more to assure this result then by cherishing tenderly the memory of our heroic dead, who made their breasts a barricade between our country and its Their soldier lives were the reveille of freedom to a race in chains, and their deaths the tattoo of rebellions tyranny in arms. We should guard their graves with sacred rigilance. All that the consecrated wealth and taste of the nation can add to their adornment and security, is but a fitting tribute to the memory of her slain defenders. Let no wanton foot tread rudely on such hallowed grounds. Let pleasant paths in-vite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no vaudalism of avarioe or neglect, no ravages of time testify to the present or to the coming generations, that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and andivided Republic.

If other eyes grow dull, and other hands sleek, and other hearts cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well as long as the light and warmth of life
