Soldier's Graves.
ORDER FROM COMMANDER IN CHIEF, GEN. LOGAN, FOR THEIR DECORATION.
The following official order from Major-General Logan, having reference to a subject to which we have several times called attention, should not only enlist the full strength of the Grand Army, but receive for the posts the hearty co-operation of our citizens, especially of the ladies. Let the day be celebrated here as a general holiday:
HD-QUA. GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,
ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE,
446 Fourteenth St.
Washington, D. C., May 5, 1868.
General Orders No. 11.

1. The 30th day of May, 1868, is designed for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land. In this observance no form of ceremony is prescribed, but Posts and Comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit.

We are organized, comrades, as our regulations tell us, for the purpose, among other things, "of preserving and strengthening those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together the soldiers, sailors and marines who united to suppress the late rebellion." What can aid more to assure this result than by cherishing tenderly the memory of our heroic dead, who made their breasts a barricade between our country and its foes. Their soldier lives were the reveille of freedom to a race in chains, and their deaths the tattoo of rebellious tyranny in arms. We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance. All that the consecrated wealth and taste of the nation can add to their adornment and security, is but a fitting tribute to the memory of her slain defenders. Let no wanton foot tread rudely on such hallowed grounds. Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no vandalism of avarice or neglect, no ravages of time testify to the present or to the coming generations, that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided Republic.

If other eyes grow dull, and other hands sleek, and other hearts cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well as long as the light and warmth of life remain to us.
Let us, then, at the time appointed gather around their sacred remains and garland the passionless mounds above them, with the choicest flowers of spring time; let us raise above them the dear old flag they saved from dishonor; let us in this solemn presence renew our pledges to aid and assist those whom they have left among us a sacred charge upon a nation's gratitude, the soldier's and sailor's widow and orphan.

II. It is the purpose of the Commander-in-Chief to inaugurate this observance with the hope that it will be kept up from year to year, while a survivor remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades. He earnestly desires the public press to call attention to this Order, and lend it's friendly aid in bringing it to the notice of comrades in all parts of the country in time for simultaneous compliance therewith.

Professor Stowe, in a recent article on the Talmud, shows, contrary to the views of writers generally, that it is indebted to the New Testament, rather than the New Testament to the Talmud, that it contains remarkable confirmations of Scripture accuracy, and when fully known will be a great bulwark of Christianity. Although a Jewish work, it admits the miraculous power of Christ, and gives, as an illustration, the raising of Lazarus, with minute details.

The Boston Journal says greatest speed ever attained in telegraphic transmission in the country, if not in the world, was made Wednesday evening, between that city and Providence. P. H. Burns, champion of New England and New York, 2731 words in an hour, which was received by M. Walter Phillips, of Providence, and copied in a remarkable legible manner. The selection was from a wisp of Dean Swift's.

The Kansas City Advertiser declares that it yearns for "the happy odor of Democracy." Well, start a police court.

As the time for holding the Democratic National convention approaches, the want of harmony between the Eastern and western bodies become more apparent. The Dayton Ledger, Vallandigham's organ, grows fearfully over the preparatory wire-pulling of the Belmont clique. It says: The convention ought not, in our judgement, to have been fixed either at New York as to place, or on the fourth of July as to time; and with anything like proper management, it would never have been so arranged in either respect. Sitting in New York; the convention will be manipulated in all things by "rings," committees and small caucuses. The political schemers, bargainers and contrivers will have it all their own way. Everything will be duly arranged beforehand, and no delegate not in the secret will have the slightest chance perhaps even to be heard in the opposition; and the man agreed upon finally by the high-contracting and managing parties will be the nominee of the convention.

As to the time, it ought to have been, as we think, December last, or not later than February 22d. By July the campaign will be half over; and the machinery of the contest cannot possibly be arranged before the 1st of August. We made our State nominations in Ohio last year on the 8th of January; nine months before the election, and began active public canvassing on the 5th of August, and yet failed of complete success, only for want of time. "Somebody has blundered," but it was not the Eastern politicians. With them it was all design.—Whoever in the West expects to out-wit, out-manage, out-buy or out-bargain them in anything had as well begin by adding himself to early rising. Nothing but Western honesty, pluck and boldness can compete with their political skill and guile (for Belmont is not the "Israelite" we read of in the New Testament); and as for "over-sizing their pile"—to all such as entertain this delusion we commend the anecdote of Vanderbit putting up the steamboat against the bluff of the Western gamblers at draw poker. Had Napoleon fought Wurmser according to rule, and in his own style, the old stager would have driven the Little Corporal out of Italy in three weeks. "Whoso hath ears to hear let him hear."

"Brick" Pomeroy is also much disgusted by the movement in favor of Gen. Hancock, and says:
What a nice thing it would be for the Democrats to nominate and elect a man for President who is liable to be indicted, tried, convicted and executed for the murder of Mrs. Suratt and others.

Don Platt writes from Mac-A-Cheek to the Cincinnati Commercial, and reflects the impeachment sentiment of the country, as follows:
"If you corner a man and force an opinion from him concerning the high old court, if he is a Republican he says, generally, 'Well, upon the whole, I guess we'd better persuade him out; he's a stray bull in the pasture, anyhow, and a Connestoga at that.' If a Democrat, he is apt to say, 'Why, he's your own skunk, Colonel, and you can skin him any time you please.'"

THE GERMAN RUSH TO AMERICA.—Letters from the counties of Schenckburg (Electorate Hesse) state that the emigration to this country is extraordinarily great this year, and that even many peasants in easy circumstances are quitting their homes for the United States. The number of persons leaving, it is added, is more considerable than during the period from 1852 to 1854, when the uncertain situation of the country determined many of the inhabitants to abandon it. At present the excessive augmentation of the taxes appears to be the principal cause of this exodus.

The Texas and New Orleans Railroad appears to have given up the ghost. A train went over it on Monday, which we understand will be the last "until further notice." When are those New York capitalists going to give us "a fresh devil"—Houston Telegraph.

The La Crosse Democrat has opened a branch office in New York, "in response to a general desire of Eastern Democrats," it says.
