Corn Culture.
The grievance of our Texas farmers has been the drouth; no doubt but we have had seasons in which the best of work would fail to produce, although the failure in most of instances, may be traced to improper cultivation. The following from the Illinois Prairie Farmer, may be useful in Texas:
PLAN FOR PROFITABLE CORN GROWING.
—Editors Prairie Farmer: I notice an article copied from your paper on Corn Culture—in which the writer says he uses a Bolles and Harrow, after planting and is open to conviction for a better plan. There are two or three more men in the State who cultivate on the following plan, and run their crops up to over 100 bushels per acre.
First—Plow only six inches in width and twelve inches deep—put the strength of team on depth and narrow furrow. A six inch furrow pulverizes much better than a twelve inch furrow soil.
Second—Roll the ground before the sun has had a chance to make bricks of all the lumps on the surface.
Third—Plant with a Brown's plaster—and harrow immediately after planting.
Fourth—For the first time cultivating, use a long narrow Bell Tongue, for the inside shovel of a two horse cultivator. Let it run down as deep as the ground was plowed, and near the corn. After the first time use a shovel plow, setting them so as to throw the dirt slightly towards the corn. Keep the ground mellow and clean is the best rule for the number of times to go over.
The above plan was pursued by a man who took a worn out farm, and ran his crop up to 127 1/2 bushels per acre. I can cultivate on this plan is not liable to be injured by drouth. The farmer who plows only six inches deep, and does not produce even that, loses one half the fertilizing properties of his soil. I have been a close observer of corn culture for several years, and am satisfied that the crops of Illinois can be nearly or quite doubled. The same may be said of the winter wheat crop if farmers had proper machinery. But they have not, though it can be made.

TELEGRAPHIC

[ASSOCIATED PRESS DESPATCHES.]

Congressional.
WASHINGTON, May 25.—House—Woolley's affair was filibustered to the hour for court.

Court—A motion to adjourn to June 23d was lost; proceeded to vote on articles and defeated the second and third by the same vote as the eleventh article, 35 to 19; vote still progressing.

Senate—Court met again at noon. Motion to proceed with the remaining articles was lost, 28 to 26. Motion to adjourn to the 23rd of June was lost by the vote, as the vote on second and third articles resulted in acquittal, when motion to adjourn court sine die prevailed.

In the Senate Anthony, Willey and Van Winkle denied newspaper reports that Chase had endeavored to influence their votes, and Fessenden denied his identification with a proposed third party and announced his determination to support "Republican nominees." Adjourned.

House—The motion to grant Woolley 24 hours to prepare his answer, was tabled. Motion that Speaker propound certain questions to the prisoner, to be answered forthwith prevailed. Speaker announced that the function of managers had ceased. Resolutions continuing them as a committee to continue correspondence and investigation prevailed, protest that the committee of investigation in which majority is unrepresented as unparliamentary was overruled by the Speaker. House controlled and could investigate by whom pleased.

The motion to add two members who had voted against impeachment, was tabled 60 to 34.

Woolley answered with the protest which has been published and announced himself willing to answer any questions which the House might direct the managers to put.

Committee represented authority of the House and said Woolley had no right to question the propriety of their question.

The House sustained this view and Woolley was ordered into close confinement in the Capitol until he purged himself of contempt by answering such questions as the committee propounded.

House went into committee on Indian appropriations. Adjourned.

Ross voted with the majority and moved an amendment to the motion adjourning court to the first of September; it was thought those votes indicate Ross had gone over the grave question and turned in his vote. Ross rose from his seat pale but otherwise gave no indications of excitement.

New York, May 25.—Mayor Hoffman received a letter from Rockingham, North Carolina, asking assistance for anticipated distress. Demand for labor don't equal the supply. The Mayor will receive contributions.

Edward De Bos formerly Confederate Agent to Europe has used citizen newspaper for balance due for writing series of articles on secret Confederate diplomacy. Approved.

New York, May 25.—At a meeting of the Baptists Home Mission the Secretary's report made favors of reconciliation between Northern and Southern Baptists; Southern delegates were invited to the platform; Dr. Jeter of Richmond, made a warm Union address.

Washington, May 26.—Woolley is confined in the room of the committee of Foreign Affairs.

Richmond, May 26.—Justice Chase having assented to June 3rd as the day for the commencement of Davis' trial, if impeachment had finished by the time, it is understood to-day the trial will certainly take place then.

New Orleans, May 26.—Grand Jury awaited on Gen. Buchanan in a body, yesterday, accompanied by Attorney General and District Attorney, made complaint that the Chief of Police avowed himself in possession of knowledge of the whereabouts within the State, of a noted burglar named Watson, who he agreed to arrest if compensated, refusing to give necessary information to the Sheriff to enable him to make the arrest. Watson has forfeited his bond; charge supported by affidavits of sheriff and deputies. Grand Jury state the offence is not covered by any law of the State. Asked the action of the Commanding General, who replied that he would investigate, and take necessary steps in the matter.

Stanton Resigned.
Stanton resigned the war office, leaving everything in charge of General Townsend. The President has a private reception to-night.

Washington, May 27.—Stanton resigned War Office yesterday.

Parties complying with amnesty pro-

plamation of September, were registered yesterday. This concession adds considerably to white vote.

CHRONICLE, May 27.—McCooie is in custody at Lawnsburg and the fight is postponed.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—House and Senate engaged in important routine. Efficiency of habeas corpus in Wesley case, doubtful weight of opinion being in House of Representatives too high to be disturbed in its deliberation by this writ.

Foreign News.

LONDON, May 26.—Derby race won by Belladrum.

Nationality treaty between U. S. and Bavaria has been signed at Munich. The French infantry are all supplied with Chassepot rifles. Marshal Niel reports it the best arm in use.

Lord Clarendon has been appointed Chairman, and Chamberlain Secretary of commission on naturalization laws, Kustard, Philmore, Farrister and Harcourt: re members.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The case of Charles W. Woolley and corruption committee, subject of conversation to-night. A habeas corpus will probably be issued in the morning. The points at issue is that Woolley protests and has sworn that his money was not used to influence impeachment, and appeals to the House to protect him in the sanctity of his private affairs; but under protest expresses willingness to answer any questions the Speaker of the House sees fit to or let, claiming the right to appeal from the committee to the House; Managers and others claim the committee has final discretion and authority, the majority of the House concur; present position of Woolley seems to be that he is in close confinement by direction of committee. He must purge himself of contempt by answering questions they may propound as situation is understood.

Woolley's case can only come before the House again through the committee which is composed of the impeachment managers. The Democrats combated this decision claiming among other things that the committee did not represent the House nor held it right that they should fully exercise the authority of the House when it is contrary to parliamentary rule, the minority was not represented on the committee.

DEFERRED DISPATCHES.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The House proceeded, with regular call, to consider the Senate's proposition to build bridges over the Ohio and Mississippi rivers.

NEW YORK, May 25.—A. J. Mansfield was to-day admitted to bail in the sum of 20,000, by Commissioner Wells.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Seventy-five steamer captains and pilots protested against any further bridging of the Ohio river with less than 500 feet span.

Mr. Trumbull gave notice that he would endeavor to press the admission of Arkansas to a final vote on Wednesday. Adjourned.

The Revenue receipts to-day amount to \$941,000.

Mr. Stevens was not in the House to-day.

The Republican Senators are to have a caucus to-morrow morning to arrange the impeachment programme.

House.—Mr. Chandler introduced a resolution declaring that the control of State governments were in the hands of white people, and instructing the Committee on Elections to report a resolution declaring that this was a white man's government. Referred to the Committee on Elections.

A resolution looking to the creation of a Commission to investigate illegal and unjust imprisonment during the war. Referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Carry introduced a resolution declaring letters and spirit of laws justified the payment of \$500 in legal tenders. Referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

A resolution justifying Mr. Seward in retaining possession of the ram Stone- wall Jackson, recently sold to Japan, until Japan was pacified. Referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs.

The Tax bill is made the special order for Wednesday. The law covers three hundred and sixty pages.

A resolution was passed bringing Charles W. Woolley to the bar of the House for contempt.

The managers supporting the Constitution report, the reading of which required over an hour, with copies of private telegrams and evidence, mainly that of Thurlow Weed, showing that the scheme of buying votes for acquittal was canvassed in New York, and that suspicious telegrams and persons passed between the parties here and in New York; intimating that relations were shown to exist between the counsel and friends of the President and party who canvassed the purchase of votes in New York. The report claims that the managers have other evidence, but at present only feel justified in presenting such as will justify the arrest of Woolley. Adjourned.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Answering questions regarding tax bill and regulations that modified regulations and rates on whiskey and tobacco should be presented in special bill.

Schenck said bill might pass in three weeks, and sooner with right seasons. He proposed special bill, as the bill proposed by the committee was complete as a whole, and met in all, but a few, with unanimous support of committee, there were three or four points which would provide discussion. Republican members maintained that committee's bill could not pass both Houses and became a law before September. Schenck made over persuaded, and the bill was made the special order for Wednesday, to be continued from day to day until finished.

The report of the Managers leaves corruption question in a mystic state, the object they had in view appears to have been to make it probable that Woolley had used ten thousand dollars to corrupt Senators.

They show that a General Adams approached Collector Smythe of N. Y. with a proposition to buy votes for acquittal; Smythe broke the matter to Thurlow Weed who advised Smythe that it was not feasible. Adams afterwards covered with Weed on the subject but gave no encouragement. The matter was afterwards conversed in Woods room in his house with Weed, Woolley, Hastings of Alabama, Sheridan and Shook. Woolley afterwards left for Washington. Several obscure dispatches passed between Woolley and Weed which Weed did not understand beyond that they referred to impeachment. Shook and Hastings came to Washington.

The above is based in Woods evidence it is then shown that Woolley had ten thousand at one time and fifty thousand at another time placed to his credit in a despatch addressed to Shook at N. Y. he drew ten thousand here, in thousand dollar bills; Shook denies having deposited this money to Woolley's credit. Woolley drew five thousand from Cincinnati; Woolley refuses to swear what he did with the money. Nothing yet transpired connecting Senators with the money; the amount mentioned by Adams as necessary to secure four votes was thirty thousand dollars. The evident disposition of the House is an unwillingness for Woolley to account for his money.

Among the despatches is one from Woolley describing a meeting between Judge Chase and certain Senators looking to a new party organization. Several despatches regarding gold market were produced.

Baker a Radical from Illinois denounced in bitter terms the whole proceedings and blamed the House for permitting it to go on without allowing the Democratic party to be represented in the investigation.

WHAT IS TEXAS LOYALTY.

Atascosa and Wilson are two counties lying south of Bexar and adjoining each other. In Wilson there is an influential class of property holders who monopolize the improved lands and almost all the agricultural enterprise is under the control of these people. They are of the "superior class" who believe in the divinity of slavery; they staked their all upon the issues of the war and when that failed they settled back in despair—they may be seen any day setting around their homes discussing the labor question, and their arguments are embraced in the simple statement "we are ruined because the nigger won't work" their homes are without

comfort, where a negro can be found foolish enough to cast his fortunes with such shiftless whites, they go out in the spring and with a forked stick for a plow, scratch over the surface, not even an inch deep, literally sow their corn and set down awaiting the crop, a few specks may mature and yield nothing sufficient to feed the family through the year. Their tables are graced with black coffee and corn bread, and the traveler is told Texas cannot be cultivated, "there is no soil." Negroes are abused and Northern men termed "carpet baggers." There are but two men in the county bold enough to subscribe for the Express, in almost any other house except these two the mention of the San Antonio Express draws forth storms of fury, all the ills and misfortunes that visit them are attributed to the Radical Express that "actually wants to educate the negro."

Atascosa county watered by the same streams and blessed by the same rains, is spoken of by the rebel paper of this city as "the best county for a poor man in the State." Atascosa county during the war furnished nearly two companies to the Union army, and after the war while ex-rebels have been leaning against corner groceries repeating the expression "the negro won't work," they have rolled up their sleeves and like true men delved into the soil with their own hands; the farms are reported luxuriant with beautiful fields of corn, small grain and gardens, roasting ears are already in the market and to partake of the hospitality of a citizen of Atascosa is like stopping at the way side farms of old Pennsylvania.

The Express has over one hundred paying subscribers in Atascosa county; there are two flourishing councils of the Union League there and a rebel murdering Ku-Klux stands about as much chance as he would in San Antonio. We repeat our question. What is Texas loyalty?
