GEN. E. J. DAVIS—PRESIDENT OF THE RECONSTRUCTION CONVENTION.

The Texas Reconstruction Convention which convened in Austin on the 1st inst., elected on the first ballot General Edmund J. Davis as its permanent chairman.

In addition to our telegrams we will state that General Davis is a native of Florida, and came to Texas in 1848. He engaged in the practice of law in the Rio Grande district, and before the breaking out of the rebellion was Judge of the 12th Judicial District.

After his escape from the rebel murderers General Davis organized the 1st Texas U. S. Cavalry and rose to the rank of Brigadier General; his record as a gallant soldier we have partly told.

After the war General Davis was elected to the State Convention in 1866. In that Convention he made a record upon suffrage question and in opposition to the legality of secession and all that grew out of it that was far in advance of the Republican party of that day and fully up to the elevated standpoint of to-day.

General Davis is thirty-eight years of age, a young man, but apparently in the prime of life; he is the tallest man in the Convention, has an easy, pleasant and dignified manner and will make a splendid presiding officer.

To the Republican Members of the Convention.

We desire to call the attention of the Republicans of the Reconstruction Convention to our daily paper, laid on their desks. We have fought the battle of Republicanism in Texas, single-handed until the Republican party has grown up in its mightiness about us.

The Secretary of the Convention, W. V. Tunstall of Anderson county has been elected Secretary of the Convention. Mr. Tunstall was defeated for the Convention by an ex-rebel soldier, but stood forth boldly for the cause of Republicanism and the Convention has properly honored him with the second office in that body, where he can confront his rebel opponent.

Trial of Jeff Davis.

RICHMOND, Va., June 3.—The United States Court met this morning, Chief Justice Chase presiding, assisted by Judge Underwood. The Chief Justice called the case of Jeff Davis, Mr. Anderson of Miss., one of the counsel for defense, then rose and read an agreement for postponement until October, which was signed by Everts and O'Conner.

The Chief Justice then asked if the counsel were ready for trial, independent of the stipulation.

Gov. Wells, for the prosecution, in reply stated that in view of the absence of the District Attorney, whose wife is in a dying condition, and the absence of the prisoners counsel by this stipulation, and the absence of Mr. Everts, who stood in a position, the nearest the Attorney General, the case could not well be gone on with.

The counsel for the defense moved for a postponement until the next term which the Chief Justice granted; saying at the same time that had the trial taken place say a year ago, or last fall or now, it would have been more convenient for him as he was ready to try the case, he, however, would attend next term if possible, in view of his other duties.
