BUTLER'S PRELIMINARY REPORT.
WASHINGTON, May 25.—The prelimi-
nary report submitted this p. m. by Gen.
Butler, in behalf of the impeachment
managers, produced a decided sensation.
It contains nothing to show that the
President has used any wrong influence
to secure acquittal, nor anything to
prove that a single Senator has yielded
to corrupt machinations, but it estab-
lishes beyond all question that some of
the President's most influential friends
were very willing to actually buy votes,
and will probably be accepted by the
country as furnishing proof all but con-
clusive that money was really used here
to bring about the vote obtained here on
the 11th article. The report was estab-
lished by the fact that the demand for
summary measures with Woolley, but
everybody understands that the real pur-
pose of the managers was to strengthen
their case before the country.

EXAMINATION OF THURLOW WOOD.
The report includes a good part of the
evidence given by Thurlow Wood, and
the reading of this occasioned a good
deal of interest and amusement. The
adroitness of Mr. Wood was matched by
the shrewdness of Mr. Butler, who con-
ducted the inquiry, and lawyers are say-
ing to night that the examination as a
whole is a remarkable fine piece of legal
business. Wood asserts that he refused
to have anything to do with the busi-
ness of buying votes, and it appears that
the ring consulted with him frequently,
and that they used him to some extent
as a gentleman among themselves. But-
ler's report treats him as head of the
ring, and names Sheridan Shook as his
lieutenant.

WOOLEY'S PART
Seems to have been in one sense sec-
ondary, though all the money in the tran-
saction was at his command, and his
elegant parlors here were the headquarters
of the so-called conspirators. He was
also in close telegraphic correspondence
with some of the President's secretaries,
and gave sumptuous dinners to the gen-
tlemen interested in securing the acquit-
tal.

COLLECTOR AMYTHE
Seems to have been the first one who
talked about buying votes; at least he
was the first one who spoke to Wood.
He does not appear so much in the lat-
ter part of the proceedings as some of
the others.

SAN WARD,
Stock and gold broker, of New York,
figures prominently in connection with
the matter, and does some business on
his own hook in sounding the Secretary
of the Treasury about his financial pol-
icy. Gen. Hancock and Messrs. Evans
and Groesbeck, frequently smoked
Wooley's cigars and drank his wine, and
were hale fellows well met with about
all the members of the ring.

**SENATORS NOT MENTIONED IN THE RE-
PORT.**
There were many inquiries as to the
Senators mentioned by Mr. Speed in his
evidence, whose names were not given
in the report. He appears to have
spoken of at least four, of whom, as is
understood on what is believed to be re-
liable authority, three were Messrs. Nye,
Pomeroy and Henderson. It was also
said on the Democratic side of the House
this afternoon that Nye and Pomeroy
were of the number.

**HOW REPORTS OF TESTIMONY GOT INTO THE
PAPERS.**
The managers took occasion through
Butler to assert that they had not made
any of their evidence public through the
papers; that such reports of testimony as
had been printed were furnished by the
witnesses themselves.

**BUTLER'S BEARING—TRIANGULAR ASSAULT
REPULSED.**
General Butler's bearing throughout
the afternoon was delicious for its sharp-
ness and self-uncossciousness. Eldridge
and Brooks undertook to cross swords
with him from the Democratic side of
the House, and Baker from the Republi-
can side of the House, but Butler was
too much for all of them, and the style
in which he used up Eldridge is almost
without parallel in the Congressional
proceedings of this winter.

**CONFIDENCE OF BANKERS IMPRACHMENT
WAS KEPT.**
There is a great deal of talk to-night
about matters in the committee, but not
revealed by Butler, and sanguine im-
peachment men are quite confident in
their predictions that Mr. Johnson
will yet be turned out of the White
House.

mitted what they had prepared, but the

REGULAR POSTPONEMENT OF VOTE.
There is a pretty general opinion to-
night that the revelations made to-day
by the managers, though not clearly put
in Senatorial form, will secure the post-
ponement of the vote in the Senate,
which was to have been taken to-mor-
row, but it is impossible to speak with
any definiteness on this point. The
Radical caucus this evening, for the con-
sideration of that question, adjourned
till to-morrow morning without reaching
any decision, though several strong im-
peachment men said they should go
against any further postponement, as at
present advised.

yer & Co., for shingles and lumber sold
on tannery premises, presented and or-
dered filed.

The petition and statement of T. Sim-
on, city assessor read, and referred to
finance committee.

The account of A. Siemerling & Co.,
for printing and binding, referred to
same committee.

The various bids for making a new
City map, were deferred till to-morrow
evening.

It was ordered that the City Scrip
now on file in Mayor's office, amounting
to \$435, belonging to Fire Co. No. 2, be
paid, and the monthly allowance already
due said Company be paid by instal-
ments.

The committee on Education present-
ed a report which was read and recom-
mendation therein were adopted.

On motion, the Board adjourned till
Tuesday, June 2nd.
