On the 2nd isst. the reconstruct tion convention passed a resolution appointing a committee to wait upon Gen. Reynolds and Governor Pease to inform them of the organization of the Convention, Gen. Revnelds replied verbally to the committee, expressing his gratification at the progress of the convention, and offering to afford that body all the means in his power to carry out the object of the convention. Gov. Pease seized upon the occasion to send in a regular Governor's message. The two main points in this message are the passages treating upon the ab initio question, and the division of the State. Upon these two questions Governor Pease has made his record, and now it stands before the public. The following is the clause upon the ab initio question :

"That you will declare that this pretended act of secession and all laws that have been enacted in sid of the late rebellion, or repugnant to the Constitution and laws of the United States, are and were null and void from their inception; and that you will at once repeal all laws that make any discrimination against persons on account of their color, race or previous condition.
