Washington, D. C., May 19, 1868.

OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

[PUBLIC RESOLUTION—No. 24.] JOINT RESOLUTION CONCERNING CERTAIN LANDS GRANTED TO RAILROAD COMPANIES IN THE STATES OF MICHIGAN AND WISCONSIN.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That a failure to grade twenty miles of the roads within two years from the passage of the act entitled "An act to extend the time for the completion of certain railroads to which land grants have been made in the States of Michigan and Wisconsin," approved on the third day of March, anno Domini eighteen hundred and sixty-five, and twenty miles additional there of in each year thereafter, as required by said act, shall not cause any forfeiture or reversion to the United States of any lands granted to the said States, or either of them, to aid in the construction of the railroads described: Provided, That said companies, or either of them, shall fully complete their said railroads in the manner required by law on or before the thirty-first December, anno Domini eighteen hundred and seventy-two, at which time a failure shall forfeit the lands to the United States: Provided, [That] the provisions of this section shall apply only to the chartered and projected line of railway from the city of Fond du Lac, in the State of Wisconsin, northerly to Escanaba, in the State of Michigan, and the chartered and projected line of railway from Marquette, in the State of Michigan, westerly to Ontonagon, in the same State; and provided further, That if the said Marquette and Ontonagon Railroad Company, in the State of Michigan, shall not have completed according to law ten additional miles of their railroad, on or before the first day of January, A. D. eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, and shall not in like manner complete ten miles of said railroad in each and every year thereafter, then it shall be lawful for the legislature of the said State of Michigan to declare the grant of lands to said company to be forfeited and to confer the said grant of lands upon some other company in the same manner as if the said grant was now for the first time made to the said State of Michigan.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to cause a patent in due form of law, to be issued to the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company, in pursuance of a resolution passed by Congress granting the same to the State of Wisconsin, approved April twenty-five, anno Domini eighteen hundred and sixty-two, and an act of the legislature of Wisconsin, approved June sixteen, anno Domini eighteen hundred and sixty-two, granting the same to said company for eighty acres of land of the Fort Howard military reserve, as the same was surveyed and approved by said commissioner on the eleventh June, anno Domini eighteen hundred and sixty-four.

Approved, May 20, 1868.

The Ab Initio Resolutions.

In the fifth days proceedings of the Reconstruction Convention, appears the *ab initio* resolutions introduced by Judge Evans of McLellan county. The doctrine seems to us sound and incontrovertible. It is a complete overthrow of the doctrine of States' rights, and a clean sweep of all the acts of the rebellion. This is the first time this issue has been placed before the public fairly, and the loyal people of Texas will expect that their representatives in the Convention make a clear record upon the question, whether they are willing to recognize anything as legal, done during the reign of treason. The question is plain and cannot be dodged. No excuse, no hair-splitting technicality will answer, in deciding it. If *ab initio* becomes the policy of the reconstruction convention, then the pins will be knocked from under several corrupt corporations, and many swindlers of the Confederacy are trembling at the issue.

We opposed the agitation of this question when it was first brought forward by some gentlemen at Austin; we discountenanced the split which took place in the Republican party at Austin, upon this question, but it is now before a convention composed of loyal men, whose business it is to study principle and not policy, and we believe there are few men reckless enough in that convention to declare in favor of the legality of any act done under the rebel government, whether it be good or bad. The principal cannot be ignored by arguing material interests. The convention, we take it, are assembled to make a Constitution intended to last a long time, and it is only their business to lay down sound principles and let the Courts and the Legislatures and the Federal Government take care of the damages, if any result, therefrom.

The Convention Committees.

The selection of committees by General Davis, for the various duties in the Constitutional Convention, seem so far as our knowledge of the members extend, very appropriate and judicious. True, men are given responsible positions who have not always acted up to the standard most of us advocate; yet we little fear any man elected as a republican to this convention, will ever again offer concessions to traitors who have had ample opportunity to meet Union men on equal terms and who have invariably rejected such opportunities with scorn. It is seldom so large a body of almost total strangers work together so harmoniously, and it is hoped as they become acquainted, the harmony may increase and our convention earn the good opinion of the whole country.

PERSONAL.—Rev. Mr. Guion, Chaplain 41st United States Infantry, has been in our city and officiated at St. Marks Church on Sunday.

Mr. Guion is a Union patriot, tried through many campaigns of the war, ministered comfort to dying martyrs in the Union cause, and with a true Christian, a personal friend to the present Gov. Warmoth and the faithful band of men who have been fighting the battles of universal liberty in Louisiana. Mr. Guion had the honor as a personal friend to attend the bedside of the Martyr Dostie the chief victim of the infamous Monroe and his associates, and now his Government has honored him with a position where he has exhibited spiritual and intellectual food to a regiment of our country's defenders who were but a short time since slaves. May success attend his works.

THE SITUATION.

As the excitement of impeachment failure dies away, we are more and more convinced that, whatever may have been the motive of Republican Senators voting with Democrats, whether gold, ambition or honest conviction, the vote stopped the conviction of compact and republican Senators are again voting, squarely for the principles of Congressional reconstruction. Whatever traitors may have hoped from Johnson's acquittal, the confirmation of Schofield has dispelled all such hopes and today the principle, that "traitors must take back seats," is more surely foreshadowed than at any time since the terrible news of assassination, flashed over the country from Washington, in 1865. And again a little incident which occurred in the debates in the Senate, which our press Nepotists omitted (inadvertently let us charitably suppose) gives us, if possible, greater courage. It is this:

"Senator Fessenden has declared in the Senate that he knows Chief Justice Chase is in favor of the distinguished nominees" of the Radical party.

What does this determine? Are we to suppose that the talk of the formation of a third party has been merely sensational, or are we to think a political scheme has been thwarted and its champions are endeavoring to glide back again as easily as possible, into the ranks of their friends.

An answer to these queries is unnecessary, the country was emphatically convinced that efforts were on foot to destroy the great party that carried the war through to a successful issue; a deflection of its honored champions, whether real or fancied, like the shock of a galvanic battery, caused a thrill of distrust to rush through the whole party. The circuit was perfect and every republican except the seven Senators, reportists, and what not, were inside the loyal lines.

No power can destroy the ranks of the radical power in the free enlightened States of the North, people are there educated beyond men and up to principles. Men hoped with the confidence of their countrymen, who so far forget themselves as to assume to be leaders, are immediately discarded, public men in a republic can only represent the will of the people, and Messrs. Chase, Fessenden, Trumbull & Co., have demonstrated that a defiance of that will must end in the downfall of those setting themselves against it.

The quiet demeanor of Andrew Johnson, demonstrates that he has achieved no triumph. The prompt declaration of Senators who voted against conviction, favoring the "distinguished nominees" of the republican party destroys all rebel hope there. Look where we may, the cause of universal liberty is triumphant, and save the unprotected Southern loyalist, who is at the temporary mercy of murderers, ruffians and outlaws, outside the pale of military protection; the country never promised more thorough protection to her defenders.

It behooves loyal Texans to be of good cheer; the day is at hand when traitors must sink back. We look to the tried men composing the Constitutional Convention at Austin, to make treason odious, the remainder, under good laws, we can do for ourselves.

PRINTING.—We notice quite an effort in the convention on the part of some of the members to adopt some paper and make it their pet. We hope no favoritism will be shown in the matter of distributing this patronage. It is the duty of the convention, and they owe this much to the people—that journals never faltering to the work of reconstruction should be selected with a proper regard to their influence and usefulness.

Whatever is done, we hope the noble journals in the interior, like the McKinney Messenger and our very few other Republican contemporaries will be helped and sustained in their usefulness. On the number and influence of Union papers in the State, rests the future of loyalty in Texas.

Wilson moved to admit Alabama; Sherman and Stewart favored amendment; Morton favored early admission of Alabama, but feared insertion would be inoperative with bill for Alabama's immediate admission. Wilson denounced provision under which Alabama voted, in strong terms and quitted law.

Debate arose among Republicans who had favored clause requiring majority of the registered voters to ratify the Constitution, no action.

Wade appointed Trumbull, Drake and Williams, committee conference on Arkansas bill.

House.—After unimportant business tax bill resumed; Drake opposed bill as being injudicious and very improper at this time, but, said, when he believed what would benefit his party would not benefit the whole country; he would leave his party sixth section conferring appointing power commissioner. Rollins struck out 64 to 54.

Logan argued against bonded warehouses, and favored 20 to 35 cents collected of firm at still; said he had a telegram from the collector of his district, saying there were a million and nine hundred thousand gallons of spirits in bonded warehouses in his District, on which owners could not pay tax, as spirits were selling on the street at one dollar and a half. No indications of opposition to reduction of whiskey tax.

Great Fenian Scare.
MONTREAL, June 5.—Fenian scare increasing, flying columns of four companies of regulars and two battalions of volunteers here under orders, to move at a moment's notice.

QUEBEC, June 5.—Volunteers prepared in every respect for a campaign. A large force of regulars go to Prescott next week. Fenian sympathizers jubilant. Invasion expected before 20th instant. Men arrested at Sweetburg with maps and papers, implicating them as Fenians.

NEW YORK, June 5.—Fenian fairs are to be gotten up here and St. Albans to cover movements of Fenians. Large quantities of arms arriving here and elsewhere. Prominent Fenians say within this month they will have large forces and arms in Ottawa, Canada. Authentic information received here of transfer of Fenian arms from St. Albans to points along the frontier. Orders transferring three companies of rifles from Quebec to Ottawa countermanded.

ATLANTA, June 6.—Authorities continue receiving information of Fenian preparations along frontier.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The renege committee on Arkansas admission agree to original House bill, with the additional stipulation that any alteration in said Constitution prospective in its effect, may be made in regard to the time and place of residence of voters. This conference report will certainly be adopted in the House on Monday.

Senate.—Gorham was sworn in as secretary.

Omnibus admission bill resumed, amendment including Alabama discussed all day. Morton said he had changed his mind about danger of defeat of bill, including Alabama, and should vote for amendment, debate was scattering opposition mostly confined to the Senators on negro caption, without vote on amendment.

Senate adopted conference report regarding Arkansas after executive session adjourned.

House.—After unimportant business tax bill resumed.

Conference Committee on Arkansas, reported, but on motion to table report, quorum not voting, House adjourned.

Corruption committee don't seem disposed to disturb Woolley in his prison.

Funding 7-30's delays debt statement, expected it will show seven millions reduction. Customs week ending 30th ult., nearly 2,000,000.

WASHINGTON, June 7. Heavy hail storm prevailing.

Chinese will dine with the President Tuesday.

\$22,000 collected and paid to President's counsels.

Corruption Committee give no indications of intention regarding Woolley, who shows no indication of yielding.

There are forty thousand gallons of whiskey in bond waiting reduction of tax.

ATLANTA, Ga. June 7.—Gen. Meade returned after absence in Alabama. Quite a number of colored Columbus prisoners here under arrest, supposed to be connected with Ashburn's murder.

Corruption Committee.
WASHINGTON, June 8.—Corruption Committee investigations under Butler and Logan, are taking alarmingly wide range. Nothing authentic is known beyond the gossip of witnesses, but enough has transpired to create a general scare among politicians.

City Council organizing in secret. It is a stormy session, and a row of some kind occurred inside. Half dozen police jumped into the windows; it is impossible to obtain details of trouble.

NEW YORK, June 6th.—Callicut, White, and Allen who have defrauded the Government out of millions of whiskey revenues, were sentenced to-day in accordance with verdict.

The crowd in the court room was immense and the scene impressive; the parties were men of standing.

Callicut was at one time a leading Democratic member of the New York Senate, on the ballot for United States Senator the two parties tied, by some strange freak of conscience. Callicut changed his vote for Morgan the Republican candidate and shortly after was appointed collector of internal revenue of New York.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Gorham the successor of Forney announced he would make no change in the Secretaries office.

Revenues for the week: six millions three hundred and forty-six thousand dollars.

Senate.—Sherman's bill relative to U. S. notes, legalizes and makes valid gold contracts which may be made hereafter. A motion to strike out the word hereafter was lost and the bill passed.

LONDON, June 6.—Abyssinian prisoners arrived at Suez; home ward bound.
