THE CONVENTION.

FIFTH DAY.

CAPITOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS,
June 5th, 1868.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment. Roll called; quorum present; prayer by the Chaplain; journal of yesterday read, amended and adopted.

The President announced the following committees:

Political or Legislative—Caldwell, Chairman, Armstrong, of Jasper, Flanigan, Webster, Carter, Ruby, Grisby, Degener, Lippard and Butler.

Judiciary—Hamilton of Travis, Chairman, Caldwell, Lindsay, Gray, Burnett-Evans of McLennan, Fayle, Mullins, McCormick, and Pedigo.

General Provisions—Hamilton, of Eastrop, Chairman, Whitmore, Flanigan of Rank, Sorrel, Varnell, Newcomb, Smith, of Galveston, Phillips of Wharton, Armstrong of Lamar.

Executive—Lindsay, Chairman, Munroe, Phillips, of San Augustine, Rogers, Mills, Boyd, Thomas, Vaughan, Williams.

Finance—Whitmore, Chairman, Pedigo, Mackey, Johnson, of Calhoun, Glenn, Bryant of Grayson, McWashing-ton, Jordan, and Stockbridge.

Education—Talbot, Chairman, Schutze, Lieb, Constant, Long, Cole, Kealy, Ruby.

Mullins offered a resolution, confining the work of the convention to the reconstruction acts; adjourned.

At 4 o'clock P. M., the convention met pursuant to adjournment.

Roll called; quorum present.

Degener moved that a committee of three be appointed to conduct the General to his seat; carried.

The President appointed Degener, Hamilton of Travis, and McCormick.

Wright added to the committee on internal improvements.

Buffington added to the committee on printing.

Patton added to the committee on internal improvements.

Smith of Galveston added to the committee on apportionment.

Ruby added to the committee on education.

There being no objection, it was so ordered.

Flanigan Webster offered the following resolution, and asked that it be referred to the committee on contingent expenses.

Be it ordained that the sum of \$125,000 be, and the same is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, or as much thereof as may be necessary to pay the current expenses of the Convention, and the per diem and mileage of the members; and that the per diem of each member be fixed at the sum of fifteen dollars and the mileage at twenty-five cents per mile to be governed by the computation of the U. S. Army regulations.

Mr. Newcomb offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the morning sessions of this convention commence at 9 o'clock and continue until 12 M. The evening sessions commence at 8 o'clock and continue until 5 o'clock.

Summer moved to lay the resolution on the table; carried.

On motion House adjourned till 9 o'clock to-morrow morning.

FENCES AND HEDGES.

We received a visit yesterday from an old subscriber, and he remarked incidentally of the number of acres he had fenced in, and the value of an article published in this paper some time ago on the subject of hedges for fences.

Our people do not seem to realize the fact that "a penny saved is two pence earned," and they seem to neglect that saving of labor and material that is so essential to the agriculturist.

Joint resolution removing Harper's Ferry suit from Jefferson County, Va., to U. S. Circuit Court, passed. Wiley maintained it was impossible to obtain a fair trial in Jefferson County on account of hostility of the people to the United States.

Omibus admission bill resumed and amendment restoring Alabama to list, discussed all day without a vote.

House Judiciary Committee directed enquiry why Davis trial is delayed. Bill appropriating money for capturing arms, referred to appropriation committee bill for inaugurating Southern States officers and covering legislatures, referred to reconstruction committee.

Bill taxing United States bonds for national purposes considered, motion to table; lost 15 to 100; referred to Committee of Ways and Means, 88 to 30. Resolution receiving Chinese embassy at 11 to-morrow, adopted.

Speaker announced a purgation from Wooley, Butler moved its reference to committee, Democrats objected because only two of the committee were in the city. Elridge moved a suspension to receive purgation of Wooley, negatived.

Motion to bring Wooley to bar of the House, adopted. After hearing question somewhat indefinitely stated, and with understanding that it was by order of the House, Wooley declined to answer, and is remanded to custody.

Confidence report on admission of Arkansas adopted. This important bill which admits Arkansas has now only to go to the President. Shortly after being sworn, Bowen, with aid of locksmith, took possession of the Mayor's office.

Radical aldermen adjourned till to-morrow. Conservatives issued protest against Bowen. Mayor Wallace has issued proclamation acknowledging returns, which gives conservatives just fallot.

Radicals have possession of original returns, and conservatives have certified copy. The radicals wing lower board adjourned to-day, conservative wing to 11 to-morrow.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Post office committee agreed to report adversely to building government telegraph from hence to New York.

Debt statement shows an increase of gold bearing 57,500,000. Currency bearing decreased 57,250,000. Total debt increased 4,000,000, but owing to decrease of cost, real debt increased 9,700,000.

CAPE ISLAND, June 8.—Bottle found with papers stating that ship Mason Strablar, for New York, is burning, crew and passengers taken boats, no sail in sight.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The two parties were accusing each other of casting illegal votes.

NEW ORLEANS, June 8.—In consequence of the arrest of Peckard, on Saturday, the balance of members of Convention of board of Registrars, yesterday issued another proclamation, denouncing Buchanan and endorsing Peckard, they were consequently arrested this morning, but released by Buchanan, on peremptory telegram received from Gen. Grant. On releasing them Buchanan informed them should Congress fail to legislate in the matter of the admission of Louisiana, they will be arrested, and brought to trial by a military commission.

Gov. Wells has brought suit against Mayor Heath, to test legality of last election of Directors of N. O. J. & N. R. R.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Senate pension Committee reported adversely to a bill that second marriage shall not forfeit widows pension.

Joint resolution removing Harper's Ferry suit from Jefferson County, Va., to U. S. Circuit Court, passed.

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Gold in Treasury 50,750,000. Currency 45,250,000. WASHINGTON, June 9.—Wooley's statement given on ground that Shook's evidence relieved Wooley from confidence; involved by professional shows that Wooley was partly influenced by Ways and Means committee on whiskey tax in Shook's interest. Wooley's proceedings in this respect are not fully told but no corrupt operation is apparent.

Seventeen thousand and six hundred dollars of questioned money are and have been in the safe of the Metropolitan Hotel, and it appears from affidavits that Wooley, Shook's and others were at the Metropolitan Hotel taking politics and proposing bets.

THE MARKETS.

LONDON, June 9th.—Noon.—Consols 95-4; bonds 73-1/2 to 1-1/2.

NEW YORK, June 8.—Governments dull, money strong, unchanged; gold 50-1/2; Virginia ex-coupons 55; Texas ex-coupons 74, flow unchanged; wheat shade firmer; corn dull, 100; oats firm, hard quiet, cotton declining 30.

The Catholics are building a \$400,000 hospital in Troy.

The Michigan Agricultural College has 75 students.

The first cheese factory ever started in Kansas has just been put in operation at Olathe.

OUR PLATFORM.

The following platform, reported by the committee on resolutions, was unanimously adopted by the National Republican Convention in session at Chicago on the 21st instant:

The National Republican party of the United States, assembled in National Convention in the city of Chicago on the 23rd day of May 1868, make the following declaration of principles:

First. We congratulate the country on the assured prospects of the reconstruction projects of Congress, as evinced by the adoption, in a majority of the States lately in rebellion, of constitutions securing equal civil and political rights to all, and regard it as the duty of the Government to sustain these institutions and to prevent the people of each State from being remitted to a state of anarchy.

Second. The guarantee of Congress of equal suffrage to all loyal men at the South was demanded by every consideration of public safety, of gratitude, and of justice, and must be maintained, while the question of suffrage in all the loyal States properly belongs to the people of those States.

Third. We denounce all forms of repudiation as a national crime, and national honor requires the payment of the public 'debtedness in the utmost good faith to all creditors, at home and abroad, not only according to the letter but the spirit of the laws under which it was contracted.

Fourth. It is due to the labor of the nation that taxation should be equalized, and reduced as rapidly as the national faith will permit.

Fifth. The national debt, contracted since the rebellion, should be extended over a fair period for redemption, and it is the duty of Congress to reduce the rate of interest thereon whenever it can possibly be done.

Sixth. That the best policy to diminish our burden of debt is to so improve our credit that capitalists will seek to loan us money at lower rates of interest than we now pay, and must continue to pay so long as repudiation, partial or total, open or covert, is threatened or suspected.

Seventh. The Government of the United States should be administered with the strictest economy, and the corruptions which have been so shamefully nursed and fostered by Andrew Johnson shall loudly for radical reform.

Eighth. We profoundly deplore the untimely and tragic death of Abraham Lincoln, and regret the accession of Andrew Johnson to the Presidency, who has acted treacherously to the people who elected him and the cause he was pledged to support; has usurped legislative and judicial functions; has refused to execute the laws; has used his high office to induce other officers to ignore and violate the laws; has employed his executive power to render the prosperity, peace, liberty, and life of the citizens; has abused the pardoning power; has denounced the National Legislature as unconstitutional; has persistently and corruptly resisted, by every means in his power, every proper attempt at the reconstruction of the States lately in rebellion; has perverted the public patronage into an engine of wholesale corruption, and has been justly impeached for high crimes and misdemeanors, and properly pronounced guilty by the votes of thirty five Senators.

Ninth. The doctrine of Great Britain and other European powers, that because a man is once a subject he is always so, must be resisted at every hazard by the United States, as a relic of the feudal times, not authorized by the law of nature and at war with our national honor and independence.

Tenth. Of all who were faithful in the trials of the late war there were none entitled to more especial honor than the brave soldiers and seamen who endured the hard ships of campaign and enlistment, and imperiled their lives in the service of the country. The bounty and pensions provided by law for these brave defenders of the nation are obligations never to be forgotten. The widows and orphans of the gallant dead are wards of the people, a sacred legacy bequeathed to the nation's protecting care.

Eleventh. Foreign emigration, which in the past has added so much to the wealth and development of the resources and the increase of power of this nation; "the asylum of the oppressed of all nations," should be fostered and encouraged by a liberal and just policy.

Twelfth. This convention declares its sympathy with all the oppressed people who are struggling for their rights.

On motion of General Carl Schurz the following additional resolutions were unanimously adopted as part of the platform:

Resolved, That we highly commend the spirit of magnanimity and forbearance with which the men who have served in the rebellion, but now frankly and honestly cooperate with us in restoring the peace of the country and reconstructing the Southern States government upon the basis of impartial justice and equal rights, are received back into the communion of the loyal people; and we favor the removal of the disqualifications and restrictions imposed upon the late rebels in the same measure as their spirit of loyalty will direct, and as may be consistent with the safety of the loyal people. [Cries of "Good, good."]

Resolved, That we recognize the great principle laid down in the inaugural Declaration of Independence as the true foundation of democratic government, and we hail with gladness every effort toward making these principles a living reality on every inch of American soil.

OUR EAGLE PASS LETTERS. Experts and Imports—Fate of Colored troops captured by Indians—Kikapoo at war with Lipana, etc., etc.

EAGLE PASS WEEK, June 4, '68. Editors San Antonio Express:

The following figures show the amount of cotton exported, and the amount of wheat and specie imported at the Port of Eagle Pass, from Sept. 1, 1867, to the 1st of the present month: 5,848 bales of cotton exported; 20,213 bushels of wheat and \$248,987 specie imported.

The following statement will show the number of bales of Cotton exported, and the number of bushels of wheat imported in each month.

Table showing Cotton exports from September 1867 to May 1868. September 1867: 222 bales; October 1867: 180; November 1867: 687; December: 126; January 1868: 1481; February: 142; March: 878; April: 1379; May: 753. Total: 5,848 bales.

Table showing Wheat exports from September 1867 to May 1868. September 1867: 968 bushels; October: 2,973; November: 2,789; December: 4,393; January 1868: 920; February: 1,048; March: 1,637; April: 4,928; May: 1,159. Total: 20,213 bushels.

126 bales of cotton have been exported since the 1st of the present month. The above figures were furnished by G. Cramer, Esq., Deputy Collector of Customs for the Port of Eagle Pass.

Mr. S. S. Brown, the gentleman who brought out the Machinery for the New Braunfels Woolen Factory, has just set up a grist and flouring mill at this place, preparatory to moving it to Piedras Negras, where he proposes to engage in the manufacture of flour from Mexican wheat.

Recently, while a party of Lipan Indians were at Piedras Negras, they were asked what they did with some colored soldiers whom they captured some months since, near one of the upper forts. They laughingly replied that they turned them over to their squaws, who beat them about their heads until life was extinct.

A few days since, while a party of twenty-one Lipans were in-camp near the Rio Grande, they were surprised by a party of Kikapooos, who attacked them and killed the whole party, including women and children. The Kikapooos then visited the Mexican towns where the Lipans had settled, in search of the remainder of the tribe, but did not succeed in their search, as the remainder of the Lipans had left for parts unknown. In their efforts to destroy the Lipans, the Kikapooos have the warmest sympathy of the inhabitants of this section and their most earnest hopes that full success may crown their efforts.

After the annihilation of the Lipans, if some tribe or people will exterminate the Kikapooos, peace will reign within our borders, and the frontiersman will experience a feeling of security to which they have been strangers for years.

Within the last three years, within a radius of 45 miles of Eagle Pass, on the Texan side of the river, more than 38 men have been killed, 17 have been wounded and 3 have been captured; and 600 horses and mules and 5,000 head of cattle have been stolen and driven to Mexico by Indians and others. Nearly all the murders and thefts were committed by the Kikapooos and Lipans, who have found refuge and protection in Mexico.

These figures are the minimum of the murders, thefts, &c. A careful examination would doubtless make these figures much larger. As it is, they show that the insecurity of life and property on this frontier is very great.
