### LAW'S.

#### UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

(Public Resolution No. 33.) An Act to grant the right of way to the Whitehall and Plattsburg Railroad Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Whitehall and Plattsburg Railroad Company be, and be lawfully authorized to locate, construct, and operate its railroad across the land belonging to the United States, at Plattsburg, in the State of New York, upon a line commencing in the highway leading from Plattsburg to Peru, at a point one hundred feet from the north line of the enclosure surrounding the government buildings, running thence in an easterly direction about sixty hundred feet to the bank of Lake Champlain, thence northwardly along the bank of said lake to the north line of the land belonging to the United States; such line of said road being designated on a map of survey of the same, made by James P. Campbell, and now on file in the office of the Secretary of War; Provided, That the right of way herein granted shall be subject to such restrictions as the Secretary of War may think necessary to protect the interests of the United States; and provided further, That no more than four rods' width of the covered way land shall be occupied under the provisions of this act.

Approved, May 20, 1868.

(Public No. 32.)

An Act making appropriations for the expenses of the trial of the impeachment of Andrew Johnson and other contingent expenses of the Senate for the year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the payment of the expenses of the trial of the impeachment of Andrew Johnson, and other contingent expenses of the Senate of the United States for the year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight.

For expenses of the trial of the impeachment of Andrew Johnson, President of the United States, ten thousand dollars.

For incidental expenses, forty thousand dollars.

For deficiency in the appropriation for the payment of the Capitol police, and for additional policemen and incidental expenses thereof, seventeen thousand dollars.

For deficiency in the appropriation for the payment of additional messengers, fifteen thousand dollars.
