Editor Republicans:

The San Antonio Express of the 14th inst., publishes a letter written to Gen. Griffin, and signed by myself, and several other gentlemen, requesting from Gen. Griffin a decision as to what laws ought to be enforced in Texas. This letter took the extreme *ad initio* side of the question, and recommended a decision with that view. This letter was drawn up by Mr. William Alexander. Mr. Alexander and myself had been on the most intimate, personal and political terms, and we had often discussed this question, and also the propriety of a system of moderate confiscation, he favoring *ad initio* and confiscation, whilst I opposed both. But I finally agreed to present the question to Gen. Griffin and obtain an authoritative decision, so as to avoid debate and division in the Republican party, and with that understanding I signed the letter in question. It was simply a concession on my part in the interest of harmony and peace.

I believe it is a well established principle of law that a concession for the sake of compromise cannot be afterwards used to the detriment of the party making the concession, and therefore, so far as the contents of the Express are intended to charge me of inconsistency, they do me great injustice. Gen. Griffin did decide the question, and I have abided by that decision. That other gentlemen who signed the letter did not conform to the decision is their fault not mine.

The Express will please do me the justice to republish this statement.

So far as his confiscation opinions are concerned, we know that he favored confiscation and furnished a long and able article to this paper on this subject a year ago. The Colonel had better come out frankly and say he had changed his opinion, then attempt a Rio Grande dodge. Say you have changed your opinion, and tell the reason why.

CORRECTION.—We regret that we did Mr. A. J. Evans the injustice to lay the statement before our readers that he attempted to have the per diem of the Convention Delegates placed at \$15. Mr. Evans motion reads as follows:

The per diem question was again taken up.

Amendment of Mr. Varnell was lost, 36 to 40 yeas.

Mr. Evans offered the following amendment:

"Strike out \$8.00 and insert \$5.00 per diem, and mileage \$5.00 for each 25 miles travel."

Caldwell moved to lay the amendment on the table.

Upon Surgeon's certificate of disability leave of absence for twenty days, to go beyond the limits of the Fourth Military District, with permission to apply to the War Department for an extension of seventy days, has been granted Brevet Lieut. Col. James B. Mulligan, Captain, 19th Infantry.

The President has accepted the resignation of the following officers of the army: First Lieutenant John W. Gill, 26th Infantry; First Lt. Henry Sammer, 2d Infantry; First Lt. and Brig. General Chas. L. Fitzhugh, 4th Artillery; First Lt. J. L. Jack, 23d Infantry.

Army Personal.

Brevet Colonel Edward Wright, Paymaster, assigned to the pay district of Omaha.

Leave of absence for fifty days has been granted Major Joseph Steyer, Fourth U. S. Artillery.

Brevet Brigadier General Joseph B. Smith, U. S. Army (retired), has been temporarily assigned to duty Headquarters Department of the Lakes.

Under orders from the General-in-Chief, the military posts of C. F. Smith, Phil Kearney and Reno, on what is known as the Powder River route, will be abandoned.

Brevet Lieutenant Colonel Don, Paymaster, is ordered to return to his station at San Francisco, reporting to Brevet Brigadier General Leonard, Deputy Paymaster General.

General Thomas will be absent from Washington for a few days, and on his return will, it is understood, resume his official duties as Adjutant General of the United States Army.

Leave of absence for twenty days, with permission to apply to the Adjutant General of the Army for an extension of four months, has been granted to Brevet Colonel A. D. Nelson, Major First Infantry.

Leave of absence for twenty days, upon surgeon's certificate of disability, with permission to go beyond the limits of his military district, has been granted to Second Lieutenant W. H. Hamner, Twentieth Infantry.

The leave of absence for twenty days granted Captain E. S. Huntington, Twenty-ninth U. S. Infantry, in Special Orders No. 73, current series, Headquarters Department of Washington, has been extended ten days.

Acting Assistant Surgeon G. W. Hatch, U. S. Army, having been relieved from duty at Jackson, La., will proceed, without delay, to Austin, Texas, and report to the Commanding General and to the Chief Medical Officer, District of Texas, for assignment to duty.

Until further orders, Captain C. H. Hoyt, Assistant Quartermaster U. S. Army, will make monthly tours to different posts in the District of Louisiana, under the direction of the Chief Quartermaster, for inspection, and for the purpose of paying the outstanding debts of his department.

Special orders from the War Department announce that Brevet Major General O. C. House has been assigned to the command of Fort Washington, Md., and that Colonel William Chapman has been retired from the service and relieved from duty in the Second Military District.

Bvt. Lt. Col. A. J. McGonnigle, Captain and Assistant Quartermaster, U. S. A., having reported at Headquarters, Department of Missouri, in compliance with Special Orders No. 12, current series, Headquarters of the Army, has been assigned to duty as Special Inspector in the Quartermaster's Department.

Prof. Houghton of Trinity College, Dublin, has published some curious chemical computations respecting the relative amounts of physical exhaustion produced by mental and manual labor. Nominees of the National Republican Convention at Chicago, May 21, '68.

For President, U. S. GRANT. For Vice-President, Schuyler Colfax.

The Opening of the Ab Initio Fight.

On Tuesday, the 16th inst., the ab initio resolutions introduced by Evans of McLennan, came up for action before the Convention, and it was made the special business of the day following at 11 o'clock, at which time the Convention would go into a Committee of the Whole.

An appeal was taken from the decision of the Chair. The yeas and nays were called and the vote stood 41 to 41. The appeal was lost. The Chair ordered the report of the majority and minority of the Committee on Federal Relations to be read.

We will not do that gentleman the injustice to comment at length upon his splendid argument; strictly logical, eloquent and fine. His points were distinctly made and fortified by authorities not to be controverted.

During Mr. Evans' speech he had occasion to summon up before the view of the Convention the distinguished leader of the anti-abinitio heresy, who had enunciated in his proclamation upon taking charge of the provisional government, the very doctrine to-day contended for by the ab initio men.

The Committee of the Whole rose and reported progress and adjourned until Thursday, 11 o'clock.

On Thursday at the appointed time the Convention again resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole, the Hon. Mr. Armstrong called to the Chair.

Gen. Hamilton took the floor and commenced to refute the argument of Judge Evans; he spoke two hours and then requested that the Convention take a recess as he did not wish to exhaust himself.

We candidly believe the General never did a harder two hours' work in his life he labored like a ship in a storm. He made as good an argument as it was possible for a man to make on so poor a foundation. He did toby, and his eloquence deserved a better cause.

At 5 o'clock the Committee of the Whole again went into session and Gen. Hamilton continued his speech until seven o'clock. The latter part of Gen. Hamilton's speech was very personal and bullying. We were sorry that he

destroyed his argument by such a display.

The Committee of the Whole adjourned until Friday, to again take up the discussion. When the combat between the lawyers is over we shall expect to hear from the other members of the Convention.

The contest is a great one, and its settlement will involve the whole character of the work of the Convention.

How it was Done.

When the difference occurred, Col. Haynes of Austin who had been a warm supporter of that doctrine, being chairman of the State Executive Committee of the Republican party and Grand President of the Union League of Texas, appealed to the League in different portions of the State to avoid discussion on ab initio question and stated that the advocates of ab initio were attempting to destroy the Republican party.

TELEGRAPHIC

[ASSOCIATED PRESS DESPACHES.]

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Dredge boat for the mouth of the Mississippi left Boston yesterday for destination.

A fire steamer while working at a destructive fire in Philadelphia, yesterday, exploded and killed five persons.

NEW ORLEANS, June 19.—A telegram from Grant is promulgated by telegraph in form of an order for instruction and guidance to all concerned. Gen. Grant says that civil officers elected cannot be installed until the State admitted and that until then the State is under provisional government, entirely under military control.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—A bill was introduced transferring the control of Indians to the Freedman's Bureau.

Bill relieving the exports of distilled rum, was reconsidered.

Bill regulating the passengers of steam carrying vessels was passed, without division.

The Conference committee who reported the bill relieving a list of men from political disabilities, was defeated—78 to 55.

It was afterwards reconsidered and bill come up as a special order to-morrow.

Senate.—The amendment continuing the Freedman's Bureau was adopted, it now goes to the President.

Chase the next Democratic Presidential Nominee.

NEW YORK, June 19.—Chase has written a letter to be read in the Democratic Convention, placing himself squarely on any platform the Convention may determine; but urges that negro suffrage be recognized and universal amnesty demanded.

Foreign News.

LONDON, June 19.—The Queen reviews the volunteers to-morrow. No business to be done on Stock Exchange or in markets.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—Last gap of railway connecting California with Nevada was concluded to-day.

First sample of new wheat was received to-day, excellent.

Boat Race.

PHILADELPHIA, June 19.—The referee ordered another trial on account of Couler breaking an oar in the third pull. Hannil rowed slowly over the course.

MONTEVIDEO, June 20.—Fine and seasonable rains have fallen in different parts of Alabama during the last few days, coming just in time to save corn crops which were nearly burst up.

The members of the legislature elected under the reconstruction laws are assembling in anticipation of the omnibus bill. None but radicals were elected. The anti-radicals defeated the Constitution and legislature by not voting.

THE CONVENTION.

FOURTEENTH DAY.

CAPITOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS, } JUNE 16th, 1868.

CONVENTION met pursuant to adjournment; roll called, quorum present; prayer by the Chaplain; journal of yesterday read and adopted.

Carter, chairman of the Committee on Style, reported as follows: Monroe from the committee on engrossed provisions made the following report:

COMMITTEE ROOM, } AUSTIN, June 15, 1868.

Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention.

Sir—The committee on Engrossed Bills instruct me to report the following resolutions correctly engrossed:

1st. Resolution, that the special committee on lawlessness and crime be authorized to employ a clerk, and that said clerk be authorized to swear witnesses.

2d. Resolution, that the committee to examine the penitentiary of the State, or any one or more of them, at their discretion, be authorized to proceed to Huntsville to carry into effect the order of this convention, and that they be authorized to employ an accountant to aid them in their investigations. Respectfully submitted, A. T. Monroee, Chairman.

Report adopted. Johnson offered the following resolution.

Resolved, That besides the duties of enrolling and engrossing the declarations and resolutions of this convention, the enrolling and engrossing clerks shall perform such clerical duties as may be required of them by the secretaries of this convention, or if there be no such duties required, the pay of the enrolling and engrossing clerks be reduced to four dollars per day, or such amount as the committee on Contingent expenses may think a proper amount to be paid for the duties they perform.

Referred to committee on Contingent Expenses.

Mackey offered the following declaration:

Be it ordained by the people of the State of Texas in convention assembled, That all male persons over the age of twenty-one years, or who may hereafter arrive at the age of twenty-one years, of foreign birth, residing in the State of Texas at the date of the passage of this ordinance, shall on taking the oath of allegiance to the Government of the United States, and an oath to support and defend the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, be declared citizens of the State, and as such be entitled to suffrage; Provided, they have resided in the State twelve months at the time of voting, and all male persons of foreign birth who may hereafter immigrate to this State shall, on taking said oaths, and residing in the State twelve months, be entitled without further delay to the right of suffrage.

Referred to committee on Political and Legislative.

Bryant of Grayson, offered the following resolution:

Be it ordained by the people of the State of Texas, in convention assembled, That all officers of Col. Duff's regiment of rebel troops, all officers of Brigadier General William Hudson's Brigade, 21st Texas State troops, all rebel officers or men in the rebellion who, during or since the war, were murdered, robbed or assaulted with intent to kill or maimed any Union man, Federal officer, soldier or other government official; all officers or men formerly engaged in the rebellion, who have been disfranchised by the Reconstruction laws of Congress

by boards of Registration appointed by Major Gen. Sheridan, or Bravet Maj. Gen. Griffin; all persons who have been convicted of or charged with murder or assault with intent to kill a Union man, white or colored, and have fled from justice or legal process; all persons disfranchised by the laws of other States, and all persons engaged in the rebel service, bushwhacking or guerilla warfare from other States and have since that time immigrated to this State; all persons who on the collapse of the rebellion, fled the State and took refuge in Mexico or other foreign governments; all ministers of the gospel who entered the rebel army, or preached rebellion from the pulpit, or persecuted Union men for opinion's sake; all persons engaged in the abduction from Mexican soil of Brigadier Gen. E. J. Davis and Captain William Montgomery; and all persons engaged in the murder of Captain William Montgomery, and are hereby declared disfranchised and incapable of holding in the State of Texas any office of honor, trust or profit under its authority, or of being an officer, counsellor, director, trustee, or other manager of any corporation, public or private now existing, or hereafter established by its authority.

On motion, it was referred to committee on political or legislative.

Lippard introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the committee appointed to investigate the financial condition of the State penitentiary be, and are hereby authorized to inquire into and ascertain the cause for which each convict was committed and for what length of time.

Bryant of Harris, moved the suspension of the rules to take up the resolution.

Rules were then suspended and resolution ordered to be engrossed.

On motion the rules were further suspended, resolution read a third time and passed.

Monroe moved that Evans of Titus be added to the committee on division of the State. There being no objection, Evans was added to the committee on the division of the State.

Hamilton of Bastrop, moved that Armstrong, of Jasper, be added to committee on public lands.

There being no objection, Armstrong was added to committee on public lands.

Flanagan offered the following resolution:

Be it resolved, That the executive, E. M. Pease, be requested to procure a suitable frame to contain the portrait of the portrait and grandfather of Texas, Gen. Samuel Houston.

Resolved, 2d. That the sum of — dollars is hereby appropriated to carry out the resolution.

On motion, the resolution was referred to the committee on Contingent Expenses.

The president announced the unfinished business of yesterday to be next in order, to suspend rules to take up minority report of Judiciary Committee upon forced sales by sheriffs.

Mr. Whitmore offered the following substitute:

Be it ordained by the convention, That until the 1st of January, 1870, no property, real or personal, belonging to any debtor, or the estate thereof, shall after the passage of this ordinance be subject to execution or forced sale, unless it shall bring two thirds of the full amount of its assessed value, to be ascertained by the tax roll of the year 1860, and under rules and regulations by law, and that this ordinance take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Mr. Hamilton of Bastrop moved the previous question upon the adoption of the minority report.

The motion being seconded by the required number, was withdrawn to give Mr. Hamilton of Travis the floor.

The question then was "shall the main question be now put?"

The main question was ordered.

The question recurring upon the engrossment of the resolution, the yeas and nays were demanded, and resulted as follows:

Nays—Messrs. Davis, Bledsoe, Brown, Bryant of Grayson, Bryant of Harris, Cole, Coleman, Constant, Curtis, Degener, Evans of McLennan, Evans of Titus, Fayle, Foster, Glenn, Goddin, Hamilton of Bastrop, Hunt, Johnson of Harrison, Johnson of Calhoun, Jordan, Kealy, Kendall, Keuchlet, Kirk, Lindsay, Lippard, McWashington, Mills, Mhillis, Mundine, Moore, Newcomb, Oaks, Phillips, Patten of San Augustine, Posey, Raby, Schatz, Slaughter, Smith of Galveston, Sorrel, Sumner, Thomas, Vaughan, Watrous, Whitmore, Williams, Wilson of Milam, Warburton—50.

So the convention refused to engross.

Mr. Hamilton of Travis asked leave of absence for Mr. Mackey during the week.

Leave granted.

Mr. Butler moved the convention proceed at once to take up the business on the President's table.

Carried.

The President announced the business first in order was upon the third

reading of the resolution authorizing the committee on Penitentiary matters to proceed to Huntsville and examine accounts.

Resolution read third time and passed. The next business in order was the report of committee on Federal Relations, upon the declaration offered by Mr. Evans of McLennan.

Mr. Bryant of Grayson, moved to refer the report to committee of the Whole, and that it be made the special order for to-morrow at 11 o'clock.

Mr. Hamilton of Travis, moved that the convention go into committee of the whole upon the report of the committee on federal relations.

Carried.

The convention then went into committee of the whole, Mr. Evans of Titus being in the chair.

The committee rose and reported progress.

The President announced the next business was the resolution of Mr. Smith of Galveston to dispense with the services of the reporter of the convention.

Mr. Smith moved the indefinite postponement of the resolution.

Carried.

The President announced the next business in order was the resolution offered by Mr. Bledsoe, authorizing the President to administer to him the iron-clad oath.

Mr. Lippard offered the following amendment:

"And further, that said oath be administered to all other members desiring to take the same."

The President decided that the amendment was out of order.

The question then recurring upon permitting Mr. Bledsoe to take the specified oath.

The resolution was adopted, and Mr. Bledsoe took the iron-clad oath.

The President announced the next business in order was upon the report of the committee on State affairs, respecting the admittance of Mr. O'Leary into the Blind Asylum.

Mr. Posey moved that the report of the committee on State affairs be adopted.

Mr. McCormick made the following point of order:

When a resolution or declaration has been introduced, read first time and committed by the house to a standing committee, and the committee report unfavorably and recommend that it do not pass, if the report of the committee be not concurred in by the house, the original resolution remains before the house, subject to be disposed of as a bill or declaration on its second reading.

The chair ruled that the report of the committee was the original matter before the house, and that the original resolution could only be taken up on a motion to substitute the original resolution for the report of the committee, or for the resolution offered by the committee, or be offered as an amendment to that resolution; from which ruling of the President Mr. McCormick appealed to the convention, and the question being put, "shall the decision of the convention" the yeas and nays were called and resulted as follows:

Adams, Armstrong, of Jasper, Armstrong, of Lamar, Bell, Beltinger, Bledsoe, Board, Boyd, Bryant, of Grayson, Bryant, of Harris, Butler, Burnett, Carter, Coleman, Constant, Curtis, Downing, Evans, of McLennan, Evans, of Titus, Glenn, Goddin, Gray, Grigsby, Harris, Harn, Hunt, Johnson of Harrison, Jordan, Kealy, Keigwin, Kendall, Leih, Lindsey, Long, Mac Washington, Morse, Mills, Muckleroy, Monroe, Newcomb, Oaks, Patten, Phillips of San Augustine, Posey, Ruby, Schatz, Scott, Slaughter, Smith, of Maricou, Sorrel, Sumner, Talbot, Varnell, Watrous, Whitmore, Williams, Fleming, Wilson, of Milam—58.

No decision of the president was sustained.

On motion, the convention adjourned till 9 o'clock to-morrow morning.
