The Division of the State.

The division of the State is creating a profound impression at Austin. The bill before Congress dividing Texas into three States, with the Colorado for the boundary of the Western Texas; the middle State beginning between the Colorado and Trinity, and the northern eastern State bounded by the Trinity. This division meets the hearty support of the eastern Texas men, and a majority of the middle State men. The west Texas delegates grumble at it, as we wanted the Brazos, but we will take this location of the division question and be thankful. The Austin lead 120 men are very blue; they pulled against all division and did all in their power to defeat the movements of the people of Western Texas, and now, alas, Austin is left standing a State line, with none so poor as to do her reverence. The middle State men complain bitterly that Austin, properly, is left in their State, they have no use for it; the eastern State men rejoice mightily that they have a State between them and Austin. The great men at the Capital look blue, their wings have been clipped; they can lay all their misfortune at their own doors. We have the Institute for the dumb in our State. The committee on division, will report in accordance with the Congressional bill, and there will be a large majority in the convention will sustain the committee. Austin remains the capital of the middle State a short time, until a capital is erected at Waco. Tyler will no doubt be the capital of the eastern State, and San Antonio of the western or State of Lincoln.

ADVICE.

JUNE 16, 1868.

Sir:—In answer to your letter I have to say the following: In ordinary times, when the State government has sufficient power to suppress crime and bring offenders against the law to justice, all criminals should be tried before the courts of the country, no matter of what nature the crime committed may have been. It certainly will happen in some cases, that high criminals who doubtless deserve death as a punishment, escape from the hands of justice, or as we in our unfortunate State of Texas, have witnessed in many cases, that cold blooded murderers can publicly boast of their deeds without even being molested by the authorities. But all this would not justify citizens in taking the execution of law into their own hands. Public peace, the law itself, and the dignity of the people, demands that a lawful course shall be taken in bringing criminals to justice. But in extraordinary times, in times of revolution and war, in times when civil authorities have not sufficient power to arrest and punish criminals, when murder is committed nearly daily, and when outlaws have gathered in secret organizations, whose outspoken object it is to persecute and murder a certain class of citizens, then I say, take the law into your own hands and execute it to the extent of your power. Form into vigilance committees, as the citizens of San Antonio have done in (1858?) and if you have proof of the guilt of an individual, execute him. In any of night—no matter when.

In regard to the K. K. K. I have to say that if the reports concerning this organization are true, and it can be proven hostile to them in only one single case, that its object is to persecute and murder Union men, go to work and find out their place of rendezvous, if they have one, find out the time of their meeting, then take your vigilance committee and shoot them down like dogs. If you cannot work it in this manner, in whole-

sale, do it in detail, (as Lyons, of San Antonio, in Confederate times, proposed to do, with Union men); find out one by one the members of this assassinating organization and hang them one by one. This is my advice. Yours truly,

THE CONVENTION.

FOURTEENTH DAY.

CAPITOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS, June 20th, 1868.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present. Prayer by the chaplain; journal of yesterday read and adopted.

Armstrong of Jasper offered the following protest: To the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention:

The undersigned delegates ask leave to present their objections to the passage of the resolution offered by the Hon. delegate from Travis county, A. J. Hamilton, on the 15th inst., urging upon the Congress of the United States the necessity of authorizing the organization by the several counties of this State, to act in conjunction with and under directions of the military commander therein. In the first we are of opinion that the rumors and reports in regard to lawlessness and crime, are greatly exaggerated, and many of them have no foundation in fact; and if the power asked be granted, owing to the existence of much excitement and unfounded fears, the result will be unfavorable to the promotion of peace and good order.

We believe furthermore, that the organization of such a force, by a political party, would only tend to exacerbate the public mind, and, in all probability, have the effect to produce conflicts of races, and in our judgment the officers of the provisional government, if they will do their duty, together with the military, are fully able to bring all transgressors to punishment; and we do not hesitate to say, that the masses of the people, if called on, would lend any needful assistance.

We believe, moreover, that the military authorities of this district, on proper application made, will furnish ample protection to our citizens.

In our opinion, this resolution, if not expressed, is an implied censure of the commander of this military district, and the granting of such power would invest the commander of this State, through this convention, with power over the district commander, within the limits of this State. Seeing no good that will probably result from the passage of the resolution, we respectfully submit this protest, and ask that the same be spread on the journals of the convention.

Mr. Whitmore, Chairman of the Committee on Finance, made the following report:

COMMITTEE ROOM, Austin, June 20, 1868. To the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention: Sir—Your committee on Finance, to whom was referred the resolutions introduced by Messrs. Evans of McLennan and Armstrong of Jasper, for an appropriation of \$25,000 to be used by the Governor, if found to be necessary in the

apprehension of lawless and desperate persons, have had the same under consideration. A majority of said committee instruct me to report the same back to the house, and ask that the declaration offered by Mr. Evans of McLennan do pass.

To the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention:

Sir—Your committee on Finance, to whom was referred the resolution offered by Mr. Armstrong of Lamar, providing for the payment of the unsettled balance due the civil officers of this State appointed by Governor A. J. Hamilton, have the same under consideration, and beg leave to transmit the same to the convention, with the recommendation that it do pass.

G. W. WHITMORE, Chairman, COMMITTEE ROOM, June 17, 1868.

Mr. Glenn offered the following minority report:

To the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention:

Sir—I do not think that the adoption of the resolution appropriating \$25,000 for the arrest of desperadoes and thieves, as recommended by the majority report of the committee on Finance, necessary or expedient.

It seems to me that the measures of the Convention to secure the organization of a militia force throughout the State by Congress, to act in conjunction with the military and civil already existing in this State, if of any effect at all, are sufficient to answer any emergency that may arrive in the apprehension and arrest of those contemplated in the original resolution.

The military commander in this State has, by his order, shown an entire willingness and earnest desire to furnish a sufficient force to any of the post commanders throughout the State to give protection to the various sections or districts where they may be located. And in no instance has he intimated that his powers were not adequate; and when I consider the aid he offers in connection with the powers of civil officers in the State, who by law have the authority to call to their aid the posse comitatus, together with the various expenditures which are bound to be met in the progress of reconstruction from the Treasury department, I am driven to the conclusion that the majority report in this behalf should not be adopted by this convention. All of which I most respectfully submit.

MARSHALL GLENN. Mr. Degener moved to suspend rules, to take into consideration the majority report of the Finance committee upon the resolution offered by Mr. Evans of McLennan, appropriating \$25,000 to be used by the Governor of the State in apprehending lawless persons.

Rules suspended. Mr. Hamilton of Bastrop offered the following amendment to the resolution:

Provided, That no part of the sum shall be used unless the military commander of the District of Texas shall first be authorized to organize military commissions for the trial of offenders.

Mr. Burnett moved that the Convention resolve itself into committee of the whole upon report of the committee on federal relations.

Carried.

Mr. Armstrong of Lamar in the chair. Committee rose, reported progress, and asked leave to sit on Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

Mr. Monroe from the committee on engrossed provision made the following report:

COMMITTEE ROOM, June 20, 1868.

To the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention:

Sir—The committee on engrossed provisions, after examination, instruct me to report the following declaration and resolutions, as correctly engrossed:

1st. Preamble and resolutions urging upon the Congress of the United States the necessity of appointing a force in each county for the suppression of crime and lawlessness.

2d. Resolution authorizing the committee on penitentiary to inquire into the laws under which convicts are held.

3d. Resolution instructing engrossing and enrolling clerks, when not engaged in their duties, to assist the Secretary.

4th. Declaration amendatory of a declaration appropriating \$125,000 for the pay of members of the convention and officers.

5th. Resolution authorizing the publication of the debates of the members of the Convention.

6th. Resolution requesting the Comptroller General to approve the appropriation of \$125,000 to defray expenses of Convention.

Respectfully submitted, A. T. MONROE, Chairman.

Report adopted. On motion, the convention adjourned on Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

CAPITOL, Austin, Texas, June 22, 1868.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present.

Prayer by the chaplain. Journal of Saturday read and adopted.

Mr. Carter offered the following report:

To the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention:

Sir—The committee on style, to whom was referred the enclosed engrossed provisions, numbered 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13, have examined the same, and returned them corrected, with slight alterations in verbiage.

CARTER, Chairman.

Report adopted.

Mr. Carter offered the following resolution, and asked its reference to committee on Commerce and manufactures:

Whereas, It being the policy and duty of the people of Texas, to foster and encourage the industrial interests of its citizens, particularly as it regards its manufacturing interests; Therefore be it

Resolved, That all machinery imported into this State for manufacturing purposes shall be exempt from all taxation for five years from the date of its being put into operation.

It was so referred.

Mills offered the following resolution, and asked its reference to the committee on federal relations:

Whereas, The people of the county of El Paso, in the State of Texas, and the county of Dona Anna, in the territory of New Mexico, have petitioned the Congress of the United States to give them a territorial government; and Whereas, Owing to the geographical position of the said county of El Paso, it is inconvenient and unwise that it should be longer a part of the State of Texas; and

Whereas, In the opinion of this convention, it would be better both for the people of the State, and for the people of the aforesaid counties, that such territory should be formed; therefore,

Be it resolved by the people of the State of Texas in convention assembled, That the political jurisdiction over the said county of El Paso and the right of "public domain" therein is hereby relinquished to the United States of America, provided that the said United States shall form a territorial government of which the said county of El Paso shall be a part.

It was so referred.

Wilson, of Brazoria, offered the following resolution, and asked its reference to the committee on the judiciary.

Resolved, That every debtor whose property shall be sold by virtue of a writ of execution to satisfy the payment of debts, shall be entitled to redeem the same, at any time before the first day of January, 1874, by refunding to the purchaser or purchaser the amount of money paid for the property thus sold, together with twelve per cent. interest, and paying for all improvements put upon said property, to be valued by two disinterested appraisers. Provided, however, That debtors shall not redeem real estate thus sold, if it should bring two-thirds its assessed value in 1860.

It was so referred.

Mr. Glenn introduced the following ordinance, and asked its reference to the committee on the division of the State.

AN ORDINANCE, To provide for a division of the State of Texas.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the people of the State of Texas in convention assembled, That the Legislature shall be vested with power to give the consent of the State to the erection of a new State or States, within the limits of this State, and to pass all laws necessary to designate the boundaries of such new State or States, to enable the people of the same to organize State governments.

The Legislature is also vested with power to settle the claims of such new State or States, to a proper share of the school fund and public domain.

It was so referred.

The President announced the unfinished business to be the report of the committee on Finance, with accompanying resolution as amended by Mr. Hamilton of Bastrop.

The question recurring upon the adoption of the amendment, it was adopted.

The question recurring upon the engrossment of the resolution as amended, it was read a second time and ordered to be engrossed.

Armstrong of Lamar moved a further suspension of the rules to put the resolution on its third reading.

Rules suspended. Mullins offered the following amendment: Amend by striking out "disposition," and insert "disposal."

Flanigan moved to lay the amendment on the table.

Carried.

Resolution read a third time and passed.

Monroe moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the resolution was adopted.

Evans of McLennan moved to take up the unfinished business upon the President's table.

The President announced that the first business in order was the resolution of Mr. Lindsay to amend the rules of the Convention, such rule to be inserted after the 24th section of the rules.

Lindsay offered the following amendment: Amend by inserting after the word "Convention," the following: "or resolutions relating solely to the internal government of the house; or relating to the printing of documents which have been read in the Convention."

The question recurring upon the adoption of the amendment, it was adopted.

The rule as amended was then adopted as a rule of the convention.

The President announced that the next business in order was the report of the committee on printing with reference to the purchase of maps for the use of the convention.

Degener moved the adoption of the original resolution offered by Mr. Ruby. Lost.

The question recurring upon the adoption of the report of the committee, it was adopted.

The next business in order being the third reading of a resolution as reported from the committee on State affairs, defining the powers of the convention.

Armstrong of Jasper moved to lay the resolution as reported from the committee on the table.

The yeas and nays were demanded, and resulted thus: Yeas—Messrs. Armstrong of Jasper, Boyd, Cole, Gaston, Kirk, Mills, Muckleroy, Mullins, Sorrell—9.

Armstrong of Lamar in the chair. The committee rose, reported progress and asked leave to sit to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Leave granted. Hamilton of Travis moved that Kirk be indefinitely excused from the sittings of the convention. By consent of the house Kirk was excused.

On motion the convention adjourned until 9 o'clock to-morrow morning.
