WASHINGTON, June 27.—Senate—Sumner presented memorials from Boston merchants, stating that pending legislation on Rum-exportation is very injurious to commerce. Judiciary reported adversely to increasing federal jurors fees. Committee on claims reported bill compensating Jos. Segar for property used by the Government at Fortress Monroe.

Colorado admission is resumed. Executive is adjourned.

House—Committee on claims reported bill granting sixteen thousand dollars to owner of Bark Barry, destroyed at sea by Confederate Cruiser Florida.

River and Harbor bill resumed, much confusion, nearly every member has put Harbor or River needing money, opponents of bill vote for every proposition in House, looking at it so, will ultimately fail, which result is probable. Adjourned.

Washington Secretary has issued a circular warning people that taxes and all dues arising under Revenue laws, whether from fines or penalties, can only be received for by bonded officers, or in certain cases, by Clerks of Courts, all direct or implied authority to special agents to collect money, is revoked.

CHARLESTON, June 29.—Daily News this morning publishes full abstract of message of Gen. Scott, Governor elect, to be presented at the meeting of the new Legislature, on Monday next; Gen. Scott urges immediate provisions for extinguishment of State debt, so that at future time, new loans may be effected at lower rates; he advises rigid economy and equitable taxation, to insure regular payment of accounts and interests coming due, and says that no obligation of State should be evaded. In regard to education, he recommends establishment of a thorough system of public schools, and that Congress be memorialized for aid, as the State is too poor to pay for them by taxation, he advises that the crops be diversified and urges the passage of laws encouraging immigration; he advises the Legislature to relieve every citizen of all political disabilities; in regard to militia, he advises thorough reorganization, and no oath be required but to support present constitution of State; he strongly recommends encouragement of railroad enterprises and advises measures for securing immediate completion of blue Ridge Railroad; he advises modifying Penitentiary and Jail and Judicial system, saying he hoped freedmen's bureau will be terminated in the State by October; he regrets recent disturbances in Chandler and Bernal and presses determination to enforce law against disturbers of the peace of the State, without respect of persons, and at the same time expresses his belief that no organization exists in S. C. for the purpose of resisting the laws of the State; he states that every man shall be fully protected in person and property, and in fee exercise of all of his rights as a citizen so far as they depend upon the Executive of the State; in conclusion he expresses the hope that an era of good feeling has been inaugurated and that the material valor of S. C. so justly renowned, will hereafter be displayed in supporting the flag of our common country.

Division.—This question seems to be little understood in the city. The bill reported in Congress passed its third reading in the House and was then referred to the Austin Convention for suggestions. The Division Committee at Austin at first changed the lines as proposed by Congress, recommending two States on the Gulf and one Red River State. The northern people objected, when the Committee reconsidered and accepted the lines as proposed in Washington—i. e., making three States, all possessing Gulf points. This gives the State of Lincoln all west of the Colorado.

We believe our readers prefer the truth a little slow, to fast falsehood. It appeared last August, and was attributed to the friends of Mr. Colfax, who at once emphatically disowned it and repudiated its assertions. It will doubtless be extensively reprinted during the coming summer, as embodying the views of Mr. Colfax respecting General Grant. Those who give it currency, however, will do so with the consciousness of uttering a base falsehood.
