WASHINGTON, July 2.—S. M. T. — Trumull spoke against the bill excluding the Southern States from the Electoral College. It was moved to strike from the bill Florida and Arkansas. No action taken.

A consideration of the Appropriation was resumed. Sherman withdrew the pending bill which he had offered as an amendment.

House.—Had under consideration the Alaska bill. Washington of Wisconsin opposed any appropriation to carry the treaty into effect. The understanding is that a vote will be taken Thursday week.

The President has relieved General McDowell from command of the Fourth Military District. He is ordered to report without delay at the War Department.

General Gillem succeeds McDowell in command of the Fourth Military District.

PARIS, July 2.—General Napier, of the Abyssinian war, arrived yesterday, and is a guest of Lord Lyons. He will be created a peer on his return to England.

St. Louis, July 2.—The steamer Benton has arrived at Leavenworth from the Upper Missouri, with skins and furs valued at seventy-two thousand dollars. Beavers are very plenty this season, and all kinds of furs are better than ever known.

Indians continue very troublesome along the river. There was a heavy rise while coming down the river.

CINCINNATI, July 2.—At Newark, Ohio, yesterday, G. W. Morgan was nominated for Congress.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Hamilton, member of the House from Florida, has been sworn in.

LONDON, July 1.—The debate on the Irish Church bill was continued in the House of Lords until 3 o'clock, when the Suspensory bill was defeated by 97 to 192. The Tories cheered loudly.

ROME, July 1.—The Pope has summoned General Council at Vatican, December 8, 1869. Persons summoned must appear personally or by proxy.

BERLIN, July 1.—Bavaria has ratified the Naturalization treaty.

LISBON, July 1.—Rio Janeiro advices represent that war on the part of the allies is languishing.

The peace party in the Argentine Confederation is in the ascendancy.

Nominations of the National Republican Convention at Chicago, May 21, '68.

For President, U. S. GRANT. For Vice-President, Schuyler Colfax.

THE AB INITIO QUESTION--FINAL FIGHT.

On Monday morning, at 10 o'clock, the Convention went into Committee of the Whole to consider the ab initio question; by agreement Judge Pedigo took the floor against ab initio. This is the first time the Judge has spoken; he is accredited as a good lawyer. He commenced by attempting to prove it not a question connected with politics; this was a strange position, and not very clear to our mind. He branched out upon a homily upon the history of parties, notwithstanding his position, that it was a question outside of party politics. He commenced a lecture to the colored delegates for opposing General Hamilton, calling them ungrateful and insolent. Ruby, of Galveston, took him to task in a manly manner.

Judge Pedigo took the same ground taken by the gentleman who had preceded him on the same side of the question.

Mr. Monroe followed Judge Pedigo on the same side. Dr. Smith then took the floor and made a very good argument against the position taken by the gentleman who had preceded him--quitting from Mr. Bingham's argument. Congress in favor of the validity of the Reconstruction Acts.

The Committee took recess until 4 o'clock.

At 4 o'clock Mr. Morgan Hamilton took the floor and reviewed in an able manner the whole question.

The question was called for on the adoption of the substitute, and a division demanded, resulting in a vote of 43 for the substitute, and 73 against--nine members not voting.

The Committee rose and reported to the Convention. A call of the House was made, and the Sergeant-at-Arms sent for the two absent members.

Mr. Morgan Hamilton moved to lay the substitute on the table, which was sustained by a vote of 46 to 43. This was voted as taking the whole matter out of the Convention.

Mr. Morgan Hamilton moved to reconsider, which was lost.

This closed out the entire consideration of the question. While a parliamentary victory for the ab initio advocates, it was a practical defeat of the true and correct principle they advocated as a basis of their Constitution; and this defeat is due to the influence of General Hamilton.

During the entire debate the ab initio advocates gained the question beyond the shadow of a doubt. Judge Evans' proposition was untouched. The line table in the Convention prevented the condemnation of the Southern Confederacy.

We hope the Radical men in the Convention will not stop here; bring the question again before the Convention and let it be settled who it is who are willing to endorse the Confederacy as a de facto government; who it is who are willing to compromise with rebels, and let the people know it. Taking out the rebel delegates the ab initio declaration would have been adopted.

The Convention began with a compromise upon the oath question, and up to this hour, it has been compromising under the leadership of General Hamilton, who has faced square about upon his own record.

CONGRESSMAN--Gen. W. T. Clark of the 1st National Bank of Galveston is spokesman for U. S. Congress. Gen. Clark has a record such as few men can boast of, and aside from this, his private character is above suspicion, such men as he is would lend great influence to our party and the State.

The New Braunfels Woolen Mill.

"Give me," said Archimedes, "a lever outside the world, and I will move the world."

The citizens of New Braunfels acting on the principle laid down by the ancient sage, have applied the lever of Manufactures to the prosperity of their city, and are now commencing to see the result of their labors.

One year ago, a few gentlemen who looking forward to the time when Texas should become thickly populated, and seeing the needs of her people, as well now, as in the future; these few, determined to commence a Woolen Mill.

With a sagacity which demands the admiration of every lover of the State, they cautiously made the estimates of profit and loss.

The wool was growing on the flocks upon the hill side.

The labor was in the sinews of their industrious citizens. Machinery only, was wanting, and this supplied, they could use up the raw material at home, and manufacture the articles which had to be freighted from the North.

Thus saving the freight of the wool going North, and the freight of the manufactured goods coming South.

With a scanty capital, (only \$40,000) but with honesty, prudence and sound judgment; they purchased the site for a mill, procured the machinery, and went to work. One year has passed, and the result is placed before us in a report from the Directors, from which we extract:

"At the regular annual meeting of the New Braunfels Woolen Manufacturing Company, the following report was submitted:

ASSETS. In real estate, Machinery, raw material, manufactured goods on hand and sundry dues, as shown by the books of the company, \$56,239.37

LIABILITIES. Capital stock subscribed and actually paid up with in a fraction, \$41,000.00 Balance due on whole machinery, (valued at \$30,000.00) \$5,824.41 Due on lot of land and building (Brewery) recently purchased, \$1,125.00 Due on account to sundry creditors, 7,689.96 Total, \$56,239.37

The directors report the consumption of wool at 600 to 700 pounds daily, which is being made into first class Blankets and No. 1 Jeans and Tweeds.

There will be a quantity of these goods placed in the market this coming season, and will find a ready sale, from the fact that a better quality of wool is used at their mill than is used for similar goods at other factories.

Wool is far cheaper, labor and other expenses not much higher than at the North, and the better qualities of wool used, the Directors are assured will bring the value of the goods up to the highest market rates.

The Directors report that although a year has elapsed, since the inauguration of the enterprise, yet it is only three weeks since the Factory has been in complete running order; since which time the mill has proved itself a complete success. Every part of the machinery working harmoniously, and the texture and evenness of the goods manufactured, will insure them a ready sale.

They also report that since the formation of the Company, not a bad debt has been incurred, nor has a dollar of the Company's money been lost or misused, but that every purchase made by them, has and is worth its full valuation, and the Directors believe that the institution is now so firmly established as to be considered a financial success, and they have no doubt of a handsome dividend before the close of the ensuing year.

The committee appointed by the Shareholders to examine the accounts and exhibits presented by the Directors, reported their correct and every particular.

The Shareholders tendered thanks to the Directors for the efficient and generous manner in which the Directors had conducted the affairs during the past year, and expressed their full confidence in the success of the undertaking. After which, they unanimously re-elected the old Board of Directors, viz: F. Mourou, President. Dr. Th. Koester, Th. J. Perryman, S. R. Kone, J. J. Gross, Directors.

It was then resolved to increase the Capital Stock to \$75,000; which additional capital will be used to extend the building and add more machinery. The shares are one hundred dollars each, in specie.

So much for the report, of which we have given but a brief extract. In order to appreciate the full value of the enterprise, one must visit the Mill and inspect the Machinery. We have not leisure nor space to enter into a minute description of the different processes which the wool undergoes from the time it enters as wool, and comes out the finest of Blankets, or Cloth, and we will leave this to a future issue. But the general peculiarities of the mill we cannot forbear mentioning.

The whole machinery looked as clean and as bright as a china closet. All persons engaged show that they feel an interest in their work. Industry and activity are exhibited in every department; while the whole Mill is kept in that perfect order and neatness, only equalled in the older mills of the East and in England. The looms, the spindles, the spools, the whole establishment, even to the drying yard, and every portion of the Company's grounds, show that neatness, order and industry are hard at work to insure success.

The Woolen Mill of New Braunfels is an institution of which the people of that city may feel proud, and which will pay handsome dividends in the future, and we have no hesitancy in pronouncing it the best investment of the kind in the State.

THE CONVENTION.

TWENTY-FOURTH DAY.

CAPITOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS, June 27th, 1868.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present. Prayer by the chaplain; journal of yesterday read and adopted.

Lindsay introduced the following declaration:

Be it declared by the people of Texas in convention assembled, That it is the truest and wisest policy of the State of Texas to grant settlement rights upon the public lands within its territorial jurisdiction, to every person who will settle, occupy, cultivate and improve the land, in quantities not more than one hundred and sixty acres to the head of a family, and every single person who will locate and improve any portion of the public land, now vacant within the limits of the State, by actual settlement and improvement, may have the same surveyed by any authorized surveyor, which surveyor shall deliver his plat and certificate of survey to the local or settler; and when it shall be presented to the commissioner of the land office, he shall forthwith issue a patent to the settler, occupier and improver of the land, so surveyed as aforesaid. It is further resolved by the convention, That this declaration, in some form, be embodied in the constitution.

On motion, the Declaration was referred to the committee on public lands.

Lindsay introduced the following declaration:

Be it declared by the people of Texas in convention assembled, That one fourth of the annual tax assessed and collected as revenue by the State, shall be sacredly dedicated to the education of the children living and resident in the State, without regard to race, color or previous condition. And if the said one fourth of the revenue, so assessed and collected, shall exceed the sum necessary for the annual schooling of the children of the children, the regularly accruing surplus shall be funded, and invested in such stock and securities as may be prescribed by law; the interest of which shall be used and applied for educational purposes. But in no event shall the money arising from such revenue be expended for the purposes of education from the purposes of education. Be it resolved, That the above de-

claration be engrafted upon the constitution.

On motion, the declaration was referred to the committee on education.

Faye, from committee on enrolled bills, reported the bills numbering respectively from No. 3 to 15 as correctly enrolled.

Armstrong of Lamar presented the following petition, and asked its reference to the committee on finance: To the Hon. members of the State convention of the State of Texas, 1868:

Petition of S. B. Buckley for pay for services rendered the State as assistant State geologist in 1861, after April 15th of said year.

Your petitioner states that he was appointed to the office of assistant state geologist by Dr. Francis Moore, with the approval of Gen. Houston, then Governor of the State, and further, that during the administration of Gen. Houston in 1861, he left Austin with Dr. Moore, on a geological tour to the coal region of Fort Belknap, and northward of said fort; thence along the frontier; a large portion of the time beyond the settlements; from whence they arrived at Austin on June 15th, 1861, and then ascertained that Governor Houston had been deposed, and also that the geological survey had been suspended by joint resolution of the rebel legislature, passed April 15th, 1861, all of which was officially unknown to either Dr. Moore or your petitioner until their arrival at Austin. As this service was not made in aid of the rebellion, nor has your petitioner ever in the least aided said rebellion, he prays that he may be paid in full for services then rendered as assistant State geologist for the State of Texas.

He would further state that he was mostly engaged in the business of the survey until the middle of July, 1861, when he left the State and arrived at Philadelphia, where he remained engaged in the study of specimens collected in Texas, pertaining to the natural history of the State, the results of which are partly embodied in his Preliminary Report of the Geological and Agricultural Survey of Texas, published by the last State Legislature. Said report has been pronounced an able one by some of the best geologists of the country. It has already done the State much good by making known in part her vast mineral and agricultural resources. Therefore it would be no more than just and right that your petitioner should receive the pay of assistant State geologist for the six months of his stay in Philadelphia.

Dr. Moore received pay for his services in the survey up to July, 1861, which was collected by his agent, Mr. Swenson.

The salary of assistant State geologist is fifteen hundred a year in specie. All of which is respectfully submitted by petitioner.

S. B. BUCKLEY.

Austin, June 27, 1868. The petition was referred to the committee on finance.

Leib offered the following resolution:

Whereas, it has been the custom of the United States, in some suitable and public manner, to show a due sense of human obligation, to report, as of Divine ordination, the day known as the Christian Sabbath; and

Whereas, no opportunity more appropriate can ever present itself for the people of this State to make a similar avowal of respect for that day than the present; therefore be it

Resolved, That the committee on general provisions of the constitution be requested to inquire into the propriety of engraving in the constitution of the State of Texas a provision, requiring the legislature to make suitable laws for its due observance.

On motion, the resolution was referred to the committee on general provisions.

Mr. Mills moved that the business on the President's table be taken up.

Carried. The President announced the business on the table to be the report of the committee on federal relations, respecting the relinquishment by the State to the United States of political jurisdiction and rights of public domain over El Paso county.

Hamilton of Bastrop moved to reconsider the report to the committee on federal relations.

The President announced the hour had arrived to take up the report of the committee on division of the State, made the special order for 10 o'clock.

McCormick moved to postpone the consideration of the report until 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning, June 30, 1868.
