New Orleans, July 8.—Louisiana Legislature to day, after unimportant business, went into joint session and elected Wm. P. Kellogg to the Senate for the long term.

J. G. Harris elected to short term. The democratic members of both Houses presented a communication from Buchanan saying, the president's officers of both houses had proceeded in violation of the State constitution, and instructions of the General of the Army and of the General commanding the Department, in excluding members entitled to seats.

An appeal in behalf of the people of Louisiana, for redress, and (the people) ask military commander in virtue of his authority, to place such excluded members in their seats.

Buchanan replies, that while in his opinion these proceedings are illegal, unjust and oppressive, and known to be opposed to the will of the General in Chief, (Andrew Johnson) yet he deems it to be to the interest of law and order, and best interests of the people of the State, to allow things to go on without forcible interference to correct abuses complained of; says he will forward communication to General Grant and Chairman of reconstruction committee.

Washington, July 8.—But few democrats in Congress. Republicans take intense interest in the New York Convention ballot.

Convention at New York. New York, July 8.—On the 18th ballot indications were that Hancock had about reached his ultimatum, Illinois voted for some time solid for Hendricks, and although, to days doings show nothing definite, Hancock's friends were very confident, but the 18th ballot discouraged them very much.

The voting during the day had been mixed up and without confusion they reluctantly adjourned.

Devlin, who was thrown from carriage a few days since is dead. Senator Grimes has recovered from his stroke of paralysis.

Horace Greeley is announced as a prominent candidate for the Governorship of New York.

Hancock has written a letter declining positively to be a candidate for Vice President.

New York, July 9.—Nineteenth ballot Fendleton was withdrawn. Ohio voted for Packer and New York voted for Hendricks.

Tennessee went for Hancock. Result was Hancock 135, Hendricks 107, others scattering. California voting for Field and Missouri voting for Blair.

Twentieth ballot—Ohio gave Hancock 101, while the vote for Field steadily received 6 m. California Result—Hancock 142.

Hendricks 121. Twenty-fifth ballot Missouri voted for Hancock. Tennessee split. Massachusetts voted Chase. A tie was struck by a majority of votes.

Result—Hancock 135, Hendricks 132, English 19, Chase 4. On the 22nd ballot Ohio declared for Seymour. Hendricks gained heavily.

Seymour positively declined nomination. Vallandigham insisted that Seymour must yield to the demonstration in his behalf.

North Carolina, Ohio, Kentucky, Wisconsin and others changed votes for Seymour.

The delegates over the Hall arose and cried out change our votes. State after state changed vote and excitement reached the street, which was crowded, as the news was announced; Seymour then received a unanimous vote and the convention proceeded to nominate Vice President.

Washington Items. Washington, July 8.—In the Senate the tax bill was taken up, discussed and they adjourned without decision. House—Considering a proposition bill all day, found time however to pass a bill removing disabilities from a certain class.

A radical commission from Missouri is coming to illustrate the frauds in recent elections.

Washington July 9.—A strong movement was brought to bear on Senate to restore whisky tax to two dollars per gallon.
