ebellioh. It is also trume that many of these bomicides have resulted from pri-vate quarrels. There is much bad blood in the land. But this wholesale killing cannot be accounted for by either or both of the causes named. The figures themselves shed some light upon this subject. During the last three years, according to the report consulted, 373 freedmens have been killed by whites, whilst only ten whites have been killed by freedmen.
