road Company shall have the right to build equip, run, and mesetsin a railroad, of single or double track, through the State of Texas or double track, through the State of Texas.
Commencing on the eastern boundary of the State of Pexas at the point where the said Interdational Pacific Railroad strikes the line of Texas; thence running nouthwesterly through Tyler, Smith County; Waco, McLeupaa cunty; Belton, Bell county; Austin, Travis county; New Braunfels, Comaf county; San Astonio, Bexar county; to an eligible point on the Rio Grande river, south of Eagle Pass. And said Company shall have the exclusive right to put up and operate a line of telegraph along said entire route.

And should said International Pacific Railroad Company construct said road upon the line indicated in section one of this declaration, then they shall have the right to demand from the Legislature of the State of Texas the same ald, by way of donations in lands, that has theretofore been given to most favored railroad company in Tex-
