(Concluded from yesterday.)

The President announced the business in order was a report and declaration from the committee on Internal Improvements, upon the resolution of Mr. Caldwell, respecting the "International Rail Road Company." Evans of McLennan offered the following substitute to the original declaration: Be it declared by this Convention: Whereas, There is now pending before the Congress of the United States and Act to aid in the construction of the International Pacific Railroad from Cairo, Illinois, to San Blas, on the Pacific Ocean, passing through the State of Texas; And Whereas, it is the opinion of this Convention that the State of Texas should encourage said grand enterprise; it is therefore declared—

Sec. 1st. Said International Pacific Railroad Company shall have the right to build, equip, run, and maintain a railroad, of single or double track, through the State of Texas. Commencing on the eastern boundary of the State of Texas at the point where the said International Pacific Railroad strikes the line of Texas; thence running southwesterly through Tyler, Smith County; Waco, McLennan county; Belton, Bell county; Austin, Travis county; New Braunfels, Comal county; San Antonio, Bexar county; to an eligible point on the Rio Grande river, south of Eagle Pass. And said Company shall have the exclusive right to put up and operate a line of telegraph along said entire route.

Sec. 2d. And should said International Pacific Railroad Company construct said road upon the line indicated in section one of this declaration, then shall have the right to demand from the Legislature of the State of Texas the same aid, by way of donations in lands, that has theretofore been given to the most favored railroad company in Texas.

Sec. 3d. As soon as said International Pacific Railroad Company shall survey and permanently fix the line of their road bed, in Texas, and file a plat of the same with the Commissioner of the General Land Office of Texas, then all the public land for a distance of 40 miles on each side of said road shall stand reserved to satisfy the donations of land to said Company.

Sec. 4th. All railroad companies now holding charters in the State of Texas, connecting points put in railroad communication by the International Pacific Railroad, shall have the right of consolidation with said International Pacific Railroad, under such regulations as the Legislature of Texas may prescribe, and said Company agree upon.

Sec. 5th. That the following persons to wit: Ed. Sharp, Henry Jones, George W. Patten, E. S. Robertson, A. Tobler, W. Alfred Smith, E. Nance, B. F. Torrey, W. B. Moore, and F. Schickum, shall be and constitute a Texas Board of Directors for said road; and they shall have the right to demand admission into the Board of Directors of the International Pacific Railroad Company upon equitable terms.

So the convention refused to reconsider the vote. Lindsay offered the following substitute. Insert after the preamble to the declaration as a substitute for all its sections: "Be it therefore resolved by this Convention, That in furtherance of the objects contemplated in the bill, now pending before Congress, this convention will insert in its constitution which they are now engaged in framing, some general provision authorizing the Legislature to consolidate the Railroad Companies called the Brazos Branch Railroad Company, and the Henderson, Marshall, and Jefferson Railroad Companies, and all other railroad companies in the State which may desire to be consolidated, and to afford such aid and assistance in the State, as the people, through their representatives in the Legislature, may deem politic and wise. Be it further declared, That the committee on General Provisions are hereby instructed to report a general provision giving such power to the Legislature."

Mr. Flanigan moved the previous question, upon the passage of the declaration. The President announced the reception of the following telegram from the Commanding General: Telegram, dated New Orleans, La., July 6, '68, Received at Austin, July 7, '68.

To Bvt. Maj. Gen. J. J. Reynolds. Appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars to defray the expenses of Texas Convention was made in order on the 2nd inst.

OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

[PUBLIC RESOLUTION—No. 33.] JOINT RESOLUTION directing the Secretary of State to present to George Wright, master of the British brig "J. and G. Wright," a gold chronometer, in appreciation of his personal services in saving the lives of three American seamen, wrecked at sea on board of the American schooner "Lizzie F. Choate," of Massachusetts.

Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of State be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to cause to be procured and presented to George Wright, master of the British brig "J. and G. Wright," of St. John, New Brunswick, a gold chronometer, in token of appreciation by the government of the United States of his humane and successful efforts in rescuing from death three American seamen on board of the wreck of the American schooner "Lizzie F. Choate," of Gloucester, Massachusetts, wrecked at sea on the fourteenth of February, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight. Approved, June 25th, 1868.

The State Gazette vs. the Report.

The rebel paper at Austin, the State Gazette, attacks the report of the committee on lawlessness and crime in the very manner we expected it would. Out of nine hundred and thirty-eight homicides cited by the committee, the Gazette selects two cases to disprove the correctness of the report...

The only mistake in this account was that the man killed had been appointed county judge, his father, of the same name, had received an appointment, but becoming alarmed at the murder of his son, never qualified. Our correspondent states that a report had been started that Indians had killed young Briggs...

Milton Briggs was murdered and just because he was a Union man, and no doubt because it was known that a Milton Briggs had been appointed county judge by Gov. Pease, and the fact that the father of the murdered man had not qualified, left the murderers in doubt as to which Milton Briggs it was, father or son, and they commenced by killing the one they had the first and best opportunity at.

The case of Judge Black is familiar to all our people in this section of the State. He was killed by his brother-in-law, and the house was pretended to be a private one, but it was not. Judge Black was known to be a fearless Union man, and he had asserted his firm intention of bringing to justice several deserting rebels who had disposed of United States property after the break-up. The determination to murder Judge Black was well known, and the fact that Wall was used is no argument against the assumption that he was murdered because he was a Union man, for it is well known that Wall was accompanied in his flight by rebels, and also that the murder of Judge Black was plotted over by the rebels.

The State Gazette also states that Governor Pease prepared the report, this is untrue, but it is unnecessary to deny it, so far as the rebel press is concerned. The report stands forth the most damaging verdict ever rendered against any people; every fact stated in it can be substantially proven, and we learn that forty-six murders are to be added to the list. Let us tell the truth and every good citizen lead his aid to put an end to this fearful state of affairs.

The number of crimes are not near so damaging to the credit of the State as the number of unspanned criminals. When it is understood that crime is punished in Texas, not only will crime cease to a great extent, but society will feel secure and the civilized world will draw its condemnation of our State.

Inauguration of Governor Warmouth, of Louisiana.

NEW ORLEANS, July 13.—The Inauguration took place today in the Hall of the House of Representatives, in the presence of both Houses and densely packed galleries.

The oath was administered by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State.

Members of the out-going and incoming officials were present on the platform.

The address of the Governor was brief and well chosen, but not very explicit as to his future course. He simply states that he refrains at this time from entering into any discussion upon measures deemed of great importance. He urges, however, immediate measures for the repression of lawlessness and crime, now rife in the State; that we want peace and order, and without it we can have no prosperity.

Louisiana Redeemed.

NEW ORLEANS, July 14.—After the inauguration yesterday, Governor Warmouth sent an official communication to General Buchanan, notifying him officially of the passage of the 13th Amendment and inauguration of the State Government, whereupon General Buchanan issued an order turning over the control of the State to the civil government.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Senate.—Pinckney White was seated vice Reverdy Johnson.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, July 8, 1868.

To the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention:

Sir—The special committee appointed to visit the Blind Asylum, and witness the exhibition, respectfully report that they have performed their duty: That the examination was in the highest degree creditable to both teachers and pupils. That the organization and management of the institution under the superintendence and direction of Dr. Baker shows that with the limited means at his command, nothing has been neglected to elevate all those under his care and in religious, moral, and intellectual culture. That their personal comfort and welfare receives from all, the most careful attention; and that cleanliness and good order are everywhere apparent.

Your committee, however, regard the appropriations for that institution altogether insufficient to provide for the necessary wants of the pupils. Suitable apparatus and books are greatly needed. The salary of the Superintendent ought to be increased at least upon the same footing with the salary of the Superintendent of the Deaf Mute Institution. The duties are equally responsible and onerous; and the Deaf Mutes have forty acres of land to cultivate, and thus save much expense in living by the application of the labor and the wisdom of the inmates; whilst the Superintendent of the Blind has neither land or labor to assist in supporting the charge under his care. Therefore the appropriations ought to be governed by these considerations. Your committee would respectfully offer the following statement, and ask that the accompanying resolution do pass:

STATEMENT IN REGARD TO THE INSTITUTION FOR THE BLIND.

Attendance for the last Session. Highest No. 19, Lowest 15, average 17. Appropriation for 1867 and 1868, six thousand dollars; or six thousand dollars per year.

Appropriation for pay of Superintendent for 1867 and 1868, one thousand dollars, or one thousand dollars per year.

The buildings are scanty and out of repair.

There are dormitories in the main house, by putting four beds in a room, that will accommodate sixteen female pupils.

There are dormitories in the wings and over the above room which may accommodate 16 male pupils.

According to the estimate, every bed must contain two inmates, and not a spare bed for the sick or a visitor.

The musical department a piano is needed.

Five hundred dollars worth of books in raised print are needed in addition to what has been ordered.

One of the cisterns must be repaired, if it can, or rebuilt, as it has become almost entirely useless to hold water.

There is no land attached to the institution except what is included in the court yard containing the buildings.

The distance from town is so great that in summer and all times in bad weather, the pupils cannot walk to church. There should be an ambulance and team provided for this and other purposes.

Resolved, That the Provisional Government of the State of Texas be requested to appropriate a sufficient amount of money to purchase the necessary books, apparatus, and instruments necessary for the wants of the blind pupils, for the repairs and improvements suggested in the foregoing statement; and that the salary of the superintendent be not less than the sum of \$1500 per annum.
