SPECIAL LEGISLATION IN THE CONVENTION.

This question cannot be reverted to too often. Looking back over the history of the State Constitutional Convention for the last five weeks it will be seen that half the time has been consumed in considering purely legislative matters.

At the opening of the convention, Mr. Morgan Hamilton, a gentleman of great experience and honesty of purpose, who foresaw the danger likely to arise from the great mass of legislation likely to spring up after so many years of misrule and anarchy, introduced a resolution providing for the appointment of a committee of fifteen to chalk out the scope of the convention and establish a rule by which all measures presented to the convention should be tried.

The reason for the opposition to this movement to restrict the action of the convention became apparent as measure after measure of a legislative character was pushed forward upon the consideration of that body by the men who had been prominent in this opposition, as whose head stands General Hamilton. The Stay Law occupied several days in its discussion, and at last was laid upon the table in spite of the eloquence and personal influence of General Hamilton.

Week after week has been spent in legislation, while great principles, dealing with the past and providing for the future, and vital issues affecting the life of loyal reconstruction in Texas, are choked down. Let the responsibility of wasted time rest where it belongs; and that responsibility lies at the door of these Republicans who have attempted to avoid the question of the validity of the confederate rule, and who have buried the question of the division of the State under local and personal interests, and who have presented and persistently supported Stay laws, Railroad schemes, and other legislative measures in the convention. Unless this legislation is checked, the convention will sit for months and fail in its true object, and become a curse instead of a blessing to the State.

Division of the State.

The question of the division of the State came up in the convention on Tuesday, a week ago. Mr. Thomas of Colia county, moved to indefinitely postpone the whole matter; the vote stood ayes 42, nays 93. Several members favorable to division voting aye. This vote astonished the friends of division. A reconsideration is under consideration. Two-thirds of the convention are in favor of division, but the introduction of a substitute, suggesting other lines than those laid down on the Beaman bill, has frightened a large number of the members into opposition to any division. As they determine to kill division rather than accept the terms of the substitute. If division fails, the fault lies at the door of the substitute.

We hope Congress will do the people of Texas the justice and favor to decide this division question for them. The diversity of interests effected by different lines presents an almost impassable barrier to its accomplishment by the convention, the legislators or the people.

The Division Fight.

The question of the division of the State came up in the convention on Saturday on the motion to reconsider the vote to indefinitely postpone, and on Thursday. After quite a lively discussion the vote to reconsider was taken, resulting in 47 ayes to 31 nays—16 majority; General Hamilton voting nay.

The main question was then ordered on the substitute offered by General Hamilton, which was the signal for parliamentary skirmishing to kill the time until the adjournment hour, one o'clock, it being but a few minutes off.

Dr. Smith's Speech.

The Austin Republican of the 11th inst., contains a speech made by Dr. R. K. Smith, delegate from Galveston to the Constitutional Convention, upon the division of the State. The Dr. has opposed division in order to protect the local interests of Galveston.

Mr. Editor:—

Will you permit an old Texas through your influential paper to say a few words to the honest people of Texas (for I believe there are some left)?

Texas is rapidly acquiring, if she has not already acquired, the reputation abroad of being the land of murders and assassinations.

Many form this opinion from such sheets as the San Antonio Herald, which almost invariably apologizes for murder, and even publicly rejoiced over the assassination of our Chief Magistrate.

Is there no way that the good people of Texas who love law and order can correct this state of things and give the lie to such a reputation? I think there is one way, and only one way; and that is for every good citizen to do all in his power to bring criminals to justice and see that they are punished according to law.

I am well aware that many will say: "Well, what has this got to do with it? I don't want to see anybody murdered, I am sure." It has everything to do with it; Texas's community looks upon crime in a different light from the criminal, that community will justly be held responsible for its crimes.

Communities are but large families; and what affects the honor of an individual member effects the honor of all. Society must be purged of these murders and assassinations, and one of the most effectual methods is to throw down all who sympathize with them.

Watch all those city-faced hypocrites who, with all becoming weakness, say they "deplore these murders; but our government is so unsettled that there is no way of preventing them." Such men are murderers before and after the fact; for they will not raise a hand to prevent these crimes, nor to help punish the perpetrators after they are committed.

I feel convinced that before we can have perfect quiet, society will resolve itself into two sections or parties. One will be the law-abiding, sober, industrious, virtuous; the other will be the rebellious, drunkard, and lazy portion. The former may be called "Vigilance Committee," "Militia," or by any other term; and the latter can select its own name, as experience shows they prefer a name that does not represent their principles.

The Galveston News contains a long vindictive report of the committee on lawlessness and crime, the following is the finale:

"Resolved, That the members of this convention, and the committee of the Democratic party in each county in the State, be requested, at the earliest moment possible, to furnish the State Central Committee, with sworn testimony in relation to the crimes committed in their respective counties, and that the State Executive Committee prepare the testimony so furnished and publish the same to the country." GEO. W. CARTER, Ch'm'n Com.

This reminds us of the Pennsylvania Justice who was examining a man for stealing a pig; as the accused was a particular friend of the Judge, the State's Attorney objected that he feared the Judge might be prejudiced.

Two men swore positively to seeing the accused steal the pig, but the accused brought three who swore they did not see him steal it. Whereupon the Judge dismissed the case saying "the preponderance of the evidence was for acquittal—three was more than two."

The Houston Telegraph.

We notice that this old mother of lies during the rebellion, has been in an "interesting situation" for some time past. We see that after a great labor, she has been delivered of a "kissing parson," and is out with his whole family in the "Daily Telegraph," and talks rather precociously for the first time, as follows:

It was referred to committee on general provisions. Bryant of Harris, offered the following resolution: Be it declared by the people of Texas in Convention assembled, that all laws granting the public lands to railroad companies are hereby repealed, and all charters of said railroads in Texas are declared null and void, except where such charters have been strictly complied with both in letter and spirit.

Lawlessness and Crime.

The McKinney Messenger of the 3d July, contains an account of the assassination of two men, Thomas and Doc. Walters, living in the edge of Hunt county, who were shot from the brush and killed by some of the Lee party.

Later intelligence to the Messenger gives an account of the murder of three other citizens in Colia county, nicknamed Poudleton, his brother-in-law, name not remembered, and a young man named Boren.

The Messenger also publishes the proceedings of a public meeting held at McKinney, on the 2d of July, of which Capt. T. C. Goodner was chairman, which contains an account of the dreadful lead in Grayson, Fannin, Hunt and Oolin counties, and of the anonymous notices served on persons to leave the country under threats of death, strongly condemning it all, and calling upon the citizens of those counties to rise generally and assist in putting down these lawless acts by aiding the authorities, which resolutions were signed by all those favoring the object, and amongst the names we observe those of Hugh Throckmorton, Judge Bowly, and other well known citizens.

In Grimes county a man named Craig, who was charged with horse stealing, and who was under arrest, was taken out of the hands of the officers on the 24th of June, and hung.

In Brazos county, on the 3d inst., a man named Upton, who was under arrest charged with cattle stealing, was taken out of the hands of the officers by a mob, and hung.

On the 3d of July, the body of a colored man was found in Grimes county, who had been shot to pieces, by persons unknown. All of these accounts come to hand by yesterday's mail, and constitute only one of the many accounts...

THE CONVENTION.

THIRTY-THIRD DAY.

CAPITOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS, July 9, 1868.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present. Prayer by the chaplain; journal of yesterday read and adopted.

Mr. Varnell offered the following protest to the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention:

The subscribers to this protest respectfully state, that some of them are members of the committee on general provisions; and that the honorable chairman of said committee made a report to the convention to-day, July 8th, and moved that it be made the special order for the 29th day of July, 1868.

We cannot see the propriety for this delay. The labor of the committee had been well matured; and if this most important part of a constitution cannot be considered for the next twenty days, it does seem to your protestants that we had better adjourn sine die.

This thing of remaining in session here at an enormous expense, and the work on general provisions suspended for twenty days, seems to us that something else must be contemplated outside of regular constitution making; and for the purpose of showing our opposition to the postponement of the action contemplated, we respectfully ask that this protest may be spread on the records.

Mr. Moore offered the following declaration:

Whereas, an immense amount of quackery exists in this State in the practice of medicine and surgery, much to the detriment of the good people thereof.

Resolved, That the following shall be a section of the constitution, viz: No person shall practice medicine or surgery in this State who has not a diploma from some chartered medical college.

On motion the declaration was referred to the committee on general provisions.

Mr. Brown offered the following resolution, and asked its reference to the committee on general provisions:

Resolved, That the following shall be a section of the Constitution: Sec. — It shall be the duty of the Legislature at its first session to provide for the levying of a special road tax, and to prescribe rules and regulations for the expenditure thereof, for keeping the public roads in the county in good repair, and the building of bridges.

Mr. Brown offered the following declaration, and asked its reference to the committee on general provisions:

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Resolved, That the following shall be a section of the Constitution: Sec. — It shall be the duty of the Legislature at its first session to provide for the levying of a special road tax, and to prescribe rules and regulations for the expenditure thereof, for keeping the public roads in the county in good repair, and the building of bridges.

Resolved, That no person shall be a member of the House of Representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty five years, and who has not been a citizen of the State of Texas for five years, and who has not resided in the county or district from which he may be chosen to represent for the last two years next preceding his election, and who shall be elected as provided in this constitution.

Resolved, That no person shall be a member of the Senate who shall not have attained the age of thirty years and who has not been five years a citizen of the State of Texas, and who has not been a resident of the county or district from which he may be chosen to represent for the last two years next preceding his election, and who shall be elected as provided in this constitution.

Resolved, That no person shall be a member of the Congress of the United States from this State who shall not have attained the age of twenty five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and have all other qualifications requisite for a member of the State Legislature.

On motion, the declaration was referred to the committee on political or legislative.

Bryant of Grayson offered the following declaration:

Be it ordained and declared, That this convention was elected by the qualified voters of this State for the purpose of framing organic law.

Therefore be it resolved, That the Convention will not legislate on any subject further than may be necessary to carry out the true intent of said convention.

On motion, the declaration was referred to the judiciary committee.

Mr. Moore offered the following declaration:

Be it declared by this convention that no export facto law, or law imposing the obligation of contract shall be passed, and that all laws postponing or obstructing the collection of duties are hereby declared palpable violation of this provision.

On motion the declaration was referred to the committee on general provisions.

The President announced the business first in order was upon the passage of the resolution offered by Mr. Thomas discontinuing the newspapers now furnished the convention except 500 copies of the Austin Republican.

Mr. Flannigan moved the previous question, upon the adoption of the resolution.

Previous question seconded.

The question recurred, shall the main question be now put.

Mr. Juffington moved a call of the house.

Call seconded.

Upon the question, "all the main question be now put."

The question recurring upon the second reading of the resolutions, the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:

The President announced the first business in order was the report of the committee on federal relations, upon the resolution of Mr. Mills relating the county of El Paso to the United States.

Mills moved to postpone consideration of the report until Saturday, the 11th inst., at 10 o'clock. Carried.

The President announced the next business in order was the substitute of Mr. Hamilton of Travis to the report of the committee on division of the State.

Thomas moved the whole matter be indefinitely postponed, upon which the yeas and nays were demanded, and resulted thus:

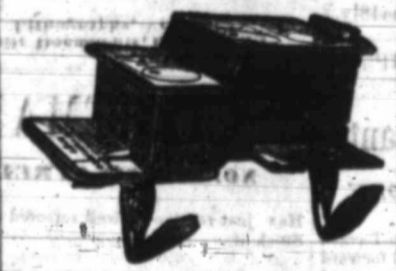
