To My Constituents.

Austin, Texas, July 11, 1868. The question on the division of the State has reached a new era. After a lengthy discussion in the Committee of the Whole, of which the journal fur nished no report, the entire matter was reported back to the House, and, with a great deal of parliamentary engineering, the opposition to the measure succeeded to take the convention by surprise, and postponed the whole matter indefinitely with a vote of 42 against 38. The motion to "reconsider" was, however, offered at once, and thus an opportunity was given to the delegates once more to walk over the whole ground The discussion lasted several days; a fair expression of opposite opinions was made, mercantile as well as political argnments were freely given, and the con-stitutional lawyers had ample opportunity to show their learning as well as their eloquence.

When the final vote was taken, 47 votes declared themselves in favor of reconstruction and 31 against it. Although the majority may not be unconditionally in favor of division, it can be safely assumed that the minority was strictly a party vote of opponents of the measure, "under all gireumstances" But two Western men voted with the minority. It will be well for the people to make an accurate record of the yeas and mays recorded on a question which so materially affects their welfire. It was notice! West General Hamilton voted against reconsideration, thus giving an comistakable evidence that the substitute offered by him was not only intended to kill off the Congressional division plan, but division altogether.

The question now being decided, that the majority believes a division in some shape or other; a necessity, the merits of the several boundary lines have to be investigated, and it is but appropriate to offer a few remarks thereon to those in-
