### MORE MURDERS.

We are constantly in receipt of such letters as the following. Oh! bow long, how long must Union men submit to such things ?-

REPUGIO, REPUGIO COUNTY, TEXAS, )

To the Editors of the San Antonio Express.

It is with a beavy heart I write to narrate another atrocity, and this time the victim is my own son. I send you for publication the following letter just received from Judge William Sheriff, the tather-in-law of my son, who forme ly resided in this county, but now of Fort Bend county :

[A COPY.] PITTEVILLE, FORT BEND COUNTY, TEXAS, ) July 8, 1868.

To Judge E. P. Upton.

DEAR JUDGE :- I have the sad task of relating to you the murder of your there is still left the right-divine—the son Wheelock! Within the last two Lex Talionis, between this neighborhood and the vicinity of Milican, driving beeves. On Monday, 29th ultimo, he left this for Milican with a small drove of boeves, and, on reaching Navasota, he was arrested and put into jail on a warrant for stealing beeves from one Brookshire of this neighborhood. He then sent for Mr. Gill, my brothersin-law, who went ing all in his power for our relief; but on his bond for \$500, and he was released. From there he went to his home. seven miles from Milican, where he was again arrested on another charge of the same nature. In the night a band of men surrounded the bouse, and caused him the present state of things. and the Speriff in whose charge he was to go with them to Milican. At Milican the next day he was informed that he would have to return to Navasota to be tried, and a guard was appointed to take him there, and about three o'clock they sta ted with him. Near the close of the day the guard returned to Milican and reported that near a creek they were met by a large band of men who took their prisoner from them and liberated him. Then the authorities at Milican sent out to have him re-arrested. Mr. Gill, who remained at Milican, suspicious of circumstances, got one of the guard to show him where the pretended liberation took place, and was led by this man to a place where they found Wheelock

hanging.

All of Wheelock's property has been taken—his widow and children left totally destitute. Mrs. Upton and her child is with me here in Pittsville, where she has been for many weeks past under

I state facts and make no comments. The perpetrators of this atrocity

ought to be punished, but I am afraid

I leave here to day for Wheelook's home, in order to try to regain something for his wife and child—I am afraid hopelessly-his property is gone.

Mr. Gill, who has been living with Wheelock, brought me the news. He had an inquest held on the body, on which was found a letter without signature, but supposed to be from you, which the Coroner read and commented on.

The above-mentioned Brookshire reported that Wheelock was the son-inaw of an old Union scoundrel living at Pittsville, and the whole crowd of Uptons and Sheriffs were d-d Abelition-

There is no safety for a Union man here.

I ask for revenge, but apparently without any hope

I shall be at the next Court in Refugio.

My son, Wheelock H. Upton, and his father-in-law, left this county about two years since to settle in Fort Bend county. They fled from persecution here of the most annoying and attrocious character. They were branded as Union men, and charged with all the crimes known to the criminal calender; the same persecution followed them, and some time since my son removed up the Brazos, to by a band of lawless desperadoes.

My son's only crime was, that he was a fearless Union man, and had by honest labor accumulated some property since the war. He was the son of the old Union Upton, charged with high treason against the Confederate States, thrown into the loathsome jail of Gonzales, and there kept for the period of six months, and denied while there the writ of right by Judge Thomas Derine, who I am told favors? is now pardoned and free, and again working in the interest of the rebels.

He is the son-in-law of William Sherfrequently threatened.

Sir, our own private wrongs we could and have endured without a public murmur; but this last overflows the cup, and now we call loudly for justice, and justice we are determined to have.

The murderers are known; if they arrested and properly punished, 'tis well and good; if not, Wheelook H. Upton has still a father living, and brothers, and numerous relatives and friends, who cannot be expected to ait quietly by, listening to the moans of his bereaved mother and eisters, the cries of his heartbroken wife, and the wail of his little orphan children.

I have placed the matter in the hands of General Reynolds, who I believe will use his best endeavors to bring this murdering band to justice; should be fail,

eurity for a Union man in this State.

How long, sir, are we to endure ? Already the Union men in various parts of the State are banding together for mutual protection; and this will become general unless something be speedily acomplished by Congress.

I know that General Revpolds is dounfortunately his power is limited, and relief may come too late to save us from civil war; for the Union men of the State, white and black, are being determined that they will so longer submit to

### EDITORIAL CORRESPOND-ENCE.

BRENHAM, TEXAS, July 19, 1868.

DEAR EXPRESS :

This is truly a day for writing up the events of my past four days' travel; and, of all places to inspire a "Radical carpetbagger," the atmosphere of Brenham has the true element.

CHIVALRY.

The town has a number of pot-bellied red-nosed Colonels, (nobody ranks below a Colonel here), who are constantly harping upon the everlasting "nigger" question. These "lords of the land" are never so happy as when they can get an humble freedman to stand before them, with hat in hand, while the corpulent chiv. warns him against the inevitable "war of races," which warning always concludes with the cheering assurance that " when it comes there will not be a 'nigger' left to tell the tale."

SLAVES LOST IN THIS COUNTY.

One strange feature of the remarks made by this class, is the number of slaves they lost by the war; two hondred and fifty was the fewest that any one of them would acknowledge to have lost. By averaging the losses of those I conversed with, and making a calculation of the number of slave-holders in Washington county, I find that this county alone lost upwards of a balf million of slaves.

Taking into consideration these great losses and humiliation of these generous people, don't it seem unfair that so much fuss is made over the murder of one thousand carpet-baggers and niggers recently reported by the State authori-

ties to a committee in the Convention? According to my calculation for Washington county, the State has lost at least fifty million slaves.

To return we will first speak of

SAN MARCUS.

This little place is situated near the aprings of the same pame, and is becoming quite a village of the residences of the owners of farme in that region. These people make a sad mistake in building their bouses in little towns, expecting to have their tarms cultivated by disinterested labor, In passing through I took the trouble to count, and found there were forty three finelooking white men sitting back at their leisure in front of the various stores, near Milican, and was pursuing his while there were only three colored men honest vocation when foully murdered in sight. Yet, while we stopped at the Postoffice I overheard part of a conversation, in which an apparent intelligent man remarked, with much feeling, that "the country is going to ruin-the negroes never will work again."

If these geutlemen would cease worry ing about what the freedmen are going to do, and would take off their own coats and put their hands to the plow, bow long would prosperity withhold her

THE CROPS.

Along the route between San Antonio and Austin, the crops are ripening, al iff, who during the war was subject to though a slight drouth stunted the corn all sorts of persecutions - imprisoned, his as it was beginning to " make," and this property stolen from him, and his life shortened it. There will be a great abundance, and the country can easily austain a bundred thousand immigrants without materially effecting the supply.

NEW BRAUNFRIA.

Here we halted but a few moment, for supper. The fields and orchards in the vicinity are laden with grain and fruit. The buisy hum of the woolen and cotten mills greet the stranger on either side. Except for the absence of the comfortable barns and beautiful houses, one could easily imagine that he was traveling through New England.

In less than five years this community of people, who have built themselves up with as little money and as little outside assistance as ever the Mormons received at Utab, will have every comfort that industry and wealth can obtain. Unlike the Pennsylvanian, as the stock needs but little shelter, the barns are not built ; the fences are therefore the first considrounded and divided with excellent cedar rail fences; as rapidly as time will permit, the outside fence is replaced with splendid stone walls, and the rails used as division fences. Already many miles of stone wall is laid in Comal county, and ere another generation the Valley of the Guadaloupe will be as celebrated as that of the Genessee in New York.

AUSTIN-ITS INFLUENCES. At Austin the same state of things existed as were reported a week ago in THE EXPRESS. The Convention was at a dead lock. The recognition of the Confederacy, as urged by Governor Hamilton, has cast a gloom over the loyal people, and they have become dispirited. It is a pitty that members of the convention should have allowed themselver to be led astray by the reputation of a man who assumes to be a loyal leader; yet it is true. As an instance, M. Mackey, of Caldwell, is known to have gone to Austin determined to wipe out rebel laws; he soon after changed; his constituents instructed him anew-he has disregarded their instructions.
