The Ashburn Murder.

Trial of the Murderers—Full Confession of Sergeant Marshall and George F. Betts—Several Other Democratic Assassins Implicated—The Defence Conducted by A. H. Stephens.

A special dispatch from Atlanta, Ga., to the Chicago Tribune, dated the 2d instant, says relative to the trial of the Ashburn murderers:

On Tuesday, the 30th of June, Sergeant Charles Marshall, of the United States army, company G, 16th infantry, was called. This was one of the persons arrested for the murder, and who has since made a full confession. He had not answered a dozen questions when a visible sensation overspread the court, counsel, and spectators. In the clearest and most direct manner he went on to tell how he was first approached upon the subject of killing Ashburn by Dr. Kirksey, about three weeks before the murder; how he had been associating with the Democrats about Columbus, and made to believe that the death of Ashburn was necessary; how Kirksey, a few days before the affair, informed him that a party was made up to do the killing, and told him to be ready; how a mask was sent him the night of the murder, with a note telling him to meet the rest at midnight; how he went to a vacant lot near Ashburn's house, meeting Kirksey, Hennis, Hudson, Duke, Barber, Bedell, Malone, and others; how they then proceeded to the house, broke in the doors, and massacred poor Ashburn, as is already so well known. The witness stated distinctly that although he had mingled intimately with the citizens of Columbus for a year, and especially with the Democrats, he knew no cause for their animosity against Ashburn except his offensive politics.

A. H. Stephens cross-examined the witness, but failed to shake his testimony in a single particular; indeed, he rather strengthened it, as it was shown that the witness had previously engaged in a personal quarrel with Ashburn, and had threatened to kill the latter if no one else did.

The examination of Marshall occupied the whole of Tuesday. On Wednesday the cross-examination was resumed, and conducted ably, as might be expected from Mr. Stephens; but after carefully examining the question and answer, it is difficult to see that the slightest impression was made. A strong effort was made to show that the witness had been improperly influenced to testify as he did, but it revealed only the fact that H. C. Whitley, the able detective, who has efficiently worked up the case, promised Marshall protection if he would confess. At the same time, according to the witness, Whitley expressly charged him not to implicate innocent persons.

The next witness examined was George F. Betts. He was a citizen of Columbus, and raised there. He also was one of the party that killed Ashburn, and has also made full confession. As he went on to confirm, in almost every particular, the statement of the first witness, the astonishment in court was even greater than before. He gave as his reason for assisting to kill Ashburn, that he thought he was a tyrant and ought to be put out of the way, but that the immediate inducement was \$50 or \$100 offered him by Kirksey.

In Betts's case, as in Marshall's, the cross-examination failed to shake the testimony.

This morning a physician testified to the nature of Ashburn's injuries. Alexander Gordon Bennett was next called to the stand. This is the man who stood behind a door of the room in which Ashburn was killed, and saw the whole transaction. He related all the circumstances of the murder with much minuteness, and identified Duke and Barber certainly, and Hudson less certainly. He said he gave different testimony at the coroner's inquest, because he knew the Ku Klux would surely kill him if he told the truth. Bennett's testimony was very interesting and occupied the entire day.

Hannah Flourens, the colored woman who kept the house where Ashburn boarded, and Amanda Patterson, the white girl who lived there, will be examined to-morrow. Both were present at the murder.

It is but fair to say that the testimony so far does not bear heavily against Chipley. Both Betts and Marshall say they think he is in the crowd of assassins, but neither can say that he certainly was.

The assassination, it will be remembered, occurred on the night of the 30th of March last, and various citizens, prominent and influential members of the Democratic party, were arrested for participating in the murder. Several of them were released, namely, two brothers, formerly of Cincinnati, named Marks; two other brothers, named Lawrence, and last, Grimes and Davis's.

Two were made full confession, and appear as witnesses for the prosecution. Twelve others were arraigned on Monday before a military commission, and each and all plead not guilty. Their names are as follows: Elish J. Kirksey, Columbus C. Bedell, Jas. W. Barber, William O. Duke, Robert Hudson, William D. Chipley, Alva C. Roper, James L. Wiggins, Robert A. Wood, Henry Hennis, Robert W. Blair, and Milton Malone.

Seven of the leading lawyers of Georgia, including Alex. H. Stephens and Morton J. Crawford, appeared for the defence. The prosecution is conducted by Judge Advocate Brigadier General Wm. McKee Dunn, assisted by General Joseph E. Brown and Major W. H. Smythe.

What Shall Loyal Men Do.

Lawlessness and crime in Texas renders it necessary that good men everywhere should combine for self-protection. From all parts of the country we hear of great outrages upon loyal men. Peaceable and quiet citizens are dragged from their homes and grossly abused, and it seems that to such there is little safety anywhere. We learn that there have been quite a number of men whipped and beaten in an unmerciful manner in Upshur and Wood counties of late for no other reason than because they were loyal to the Government. In the town of Gilmer several honest and industrious mechanics have been taken out of their houses in the night and scourged and beaten with many stripes because they were for the Union. Shack Roberts an industrious wagon maker, Gabriel (How) and Bas, the one a blacksmith and the other a shoemaker, have been set up by a mob of thirty or forty rebels and after being whipped in a cruel manner, driven from their homes. And yet the editor of the paper at that place makes sport of the matter, and thereby upholds the villainous acts. An old man in Smith county on the road from Sarden Valley to Starrville, was taken out a few nights since and whipped nearly to death for avowing himself in favor of reconstruction under the Congressional plan. How long, oh, how long shall these things continue?

How long shall the fiendish acts in Hunt and Fannin counties be permitted to go unnoted and the perpetrators be allowed to run at large.

Law and order must prevail in Texas or we are a ruined people. Let men who are oppressed bring these things to the notice of the Military if civil authorities will not do their duty.—McKinney Messenger.

Letter from Hempstead, Texas.

We take the following extracts from a correspondent in Hempstead, regretting very much that we have not room for all of his interesting letter:—

HEMPSTEAD, TEXAS, July 22, 1868.

MR. EDITOR:

Glancing over the proceedings of the late "ring-tailed convention" at Bryan, I was so forcibly impressed with the 6th resolution of that august body, that I at once proposed to Mrs. B. to pack my carpet-bag for a trip to the land of cotton, milk and honey, namely: the Valley of the Brazos.

I had been to the Post Office, and Mrs. B. probably shaping her precedents, manifold and frivolous, scanning my physiognomy with a peculiar expression of manifold doubt and alarm, remarked that she was in hopes I was only drunk, but perceived I had gone plum crazy. Thanking her with my usual spavity, I read from the Herald, for the benefit of my better-half, the following lines from the said resolution, where it wisely declares that "we need more population, labor and capital, as well as peace and civil government, for the development of the resources of our great State, and that our true policy is to invite immigration and capital from the Northern States, and to assure them of friendly welcome."

"This, you perceive, madam," said I, "gives a flat denial to the charge of the Radicals, that Northern citizens are not received with friendship, and cannot expect security to life and property here; does it not appear to you like a wilful perversion of the truth?"

My wife, who can be the most complaisant of the sex, would not deign an answer, and, muttering something about "three years in Texas, and so green," sailed from the room. The contest was decided in my favor, and the carpet-bag was packed.

At Bryan I found several delegates, still on "the same old bust," and joined freely with such as were not entirely playd out from the effects of the late convention. All were officers of high rank, the lowest grade being that of Colonel. Throckmorton was still on hand, nursing his prime minister, Epperson, of Red River, not yet quite recovered. Giddings, of Washington, was holding forth with a long winder from the steps of the Commercial, and the burden of his song was that the carpet-baggers should be cleared out—that colored Democratic clubs should be organized in every county in the State, and that the disunion Radical party should be defeated.

I saw at once that the object of the ring-tailed convention was to send out to the public one platform for effect-abroad against loyal men, and adopt a different one for home and local use.

The massacre of freedmen at Millican is undoubtedly one of the results of the Bryan platform.

Mr. Clinton Foot, an attorney of great talent, was assassinated at this place a few weeks ago by a man named Springfield, a merchant of this place. He is at large here on bail. The only cause that can be traced as the basis of this affair is that he belonged to the Loyal League.

A Mr. Scales was murdered a few miles from here night before last. The freedmen of the adjoining counties can get no satisfaction from their employers, and few of them ever get paid for their labor. The Bureau is powerless without the aid of the bayonet; a few bayonets with blue coats in the background would have a salutary effect on this neighborhood, or even the Stars and Stripes would be a pleasant sight at this time.

A young man of Southern birth and education was threatened away from here a few days ago for teaching a colored school.

I have lost faith in the friendliness of the 6th resolution, concocted by our walking whisky-barrel at Bryan. I have no faith in the ring-tails, and hereafter shall not spurn the advice of Mrs. B., whom I hope to be able to see soon. I have enough of the Bryan platform, and enough of the Brazos bottom. There is no place like the ranch, after all.

Please excuse this short letter, as I am run out of paper. I have some more paper, but the landlord of the Planter's Exchange has a lien on that; so, you see, I am a victim of circumstances.

Letter from Lockhart.

LOCKHART, CALDWELL CO., TEXAS,
July 21, 1868.

Editors of the San Antonio Express:

Permit me, through the medium of your paper, the *Republican Palladium* of Texas, to ventilate a few of the current topics of this town and neighborhood.

The Fourth passed off very quietly—no gun fired, nor any other demonstration made by the whites, except the raising of the United States Flag by the Bureau Agent.

The colored people repaired to the Court-house in the afternoon, where they spent a few social hours in dancing; thus expressing, by the only means in their power, some regard for the anniversary-day of American freedom. Yet even this innocent amusement of the freedmen seemed to ruffle the latent animosity of the autocrats of color; for within a few hours after its commencement, a petition was presented to the Police Court, seeking its interposition in the suppression of dances in the Court-house. The ultimate object of this little exhibition of spleen is to debar the freedmen from the use of the only public building in town.

The Sub-Assistant Commissioner of the Bureau of R., F. and A. L., raised the Stars and Stripes on the Fourth, which floated unmolested during the day; but at night the ropes of the flagstaff were cut, and the next morning that Banner, beneath whose starry folds so many patriots have sealed their devotion to their country, was trailing on the ground.

In the country, matters are not much better. Near McGee's Crossing, on the San Marcos River, on land owned by George Hancock, Esq., of Austin, there is a grove where the freedmen have been in the habit of holding Divine Service. Dr. Wm. Thompson, Mr. Hancock's agent of this land, called, a few weeks since, on the Bureau Agent of this place, and desired him to forbid the freedmen to worship in this grove. The Bureau Agent wrote to Mr. H. on the subject, enclosing stamp, and asking his permission for the freedmen to still hold their religious meetings on his land. Mr. Hancock, who professes to be a loyal man, never deigned to reply. This silence of Mr. H. has licensed Dr. Thompson in prohibiting the further occupancy of this temple of nature by the colored people of the San Marcos as a place of worship.

Does all this look very much like a spirit of reconciliation, and a desire to restore peace and quietude to our distracted country? Let echo answer.

Interest falling over due in federal obligations are outstanding one year, five per cent temporary loan issued five years ago, over a million seven hundred thirty-thousand, payable in sixty-seven; over half a million seven hundred thirty thousand these bonds are now payable in currency without interest.

It is positively stated that the President will continue as heretofore, regarding reconstruction and he will conform to the law until modified by Congress or nullified by the Court.

Blaque Bey, Turkish Minister, is offended by Congressional resolutions of sympathy for Crispien; Chinese legistrix took formal leave of the President.

Burlingham is delighted with the treaty.

Howard is dismissing many functionaries, giving them mouths leave of preliminary absence.

This evening's Star has the following: choosing electors in the South, the Southern members of Congress within the past few days have in conference with the republicans here decided that it will be best for the Presidential electors in reorganized States are to be chosen by their respective Legislatures, in the same manner as South Carolina has always chosen hers, this it is held will remove all fear of the disturbances and frauds which have been apprehended; it is thought probable these views will be carried out by the Legislatures, in whose hands matter fell.

The Cabinet has a prolonged session; Schofield submitted order for reorganizing Military Districts, which probably will be promulgated tomorrow, details unknown.

Mr. Davis and family sailed Saturday from Quebec for Europe.

The following order, issued from the War Department, commanding Generals of Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Military Districts having officially reported that Arkansas, N. Carolina, S. Carolina, Louisiana, Georgia, Alabama and Florida, have complied with reconstruction acts, including the act of June 25th, 1868, and that consequently so much of act of March second 1867 and all acts supplementary thereto, providing for military districts, subject to military authority of the United States, as provided, have become inoperative in said States, and commanding Generals have ceased exercising military powers conferred by said acts; therefore the following changes will be made in organization and command of Military Districts and Topographical Department:— First second and third Military Districts having ceased to exist; N. Carolina, S. Carolina, Georgia, Alabama and Florida will constitute department of the South, Gen. Meade to command, headquarters at Atlanta, Ga.; second Gen. Gillem will command 4th Military District, comprising Mississippi; third, Gen. Reynolds will command 5th Military District, comprising Texas, headquarters at Austin; fourth Louisiana and Arkansas, Gen. Rousseau commanding, headquarters New Orleans. Gen. Buchanan will continue in command until released by Gen. Rousseau.

Fifth, Gen. Geo. Crooke relieves Gen. Rousseau in the District of Columbia.

Sixth, Gen. Canby is re assigned to command the department of Washington.

Seventh, Ed. Hatch, Col. 9th Cavalry, relieves Gen. Buchanan as assistant Commissioner of Bureau Refugees and Freedmen and Abandoned Lands in Louisiana.

In accordance with concurrent resolutions of Congress, Secretary Seward proclaims reciting facts and circumstances, and concludes, and further certify, that the said amendment, 14th, has become valid to all intents and purposes as a part of the Constitution of the United States.

Commissioner of Internal Revenue has given notice that whiskey may be withdrawn from bonds on payment of fifty cents per gallon, and four dollars per barrel, of forty gallons, equal to six cents profit. All the distilleries have given bonds and have complied with the new law in all other particulars.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Some twenty five radical members of Congress had a private meeting last night members of Grant's Staff present stated that the President was weakening under apprehension of impeachment in September, and would not remove Rollins; opinion expressed that under yesterday's order from the War Department, Southern States would undoubtedly go democratic and removal of President so far as those present could go; was determined. The prospects looked gloomy to most members, but Grant's election was regarded as a patriotic necessity, which must be achieved.

The New York Herald has special from St. Louis, stating that a democratic meeting in Saline county, was attacked by radicals driven off, leaving three killed and seven badly wounded, several democrats badly wounded, about 20 on each side hurt.

Yarborough brought in a resolution to assist the county of Hood to build a new jail.

Lippard offered a declaration forming a new county, to be named "Richard."

Keigwin offered a resolution in relation to county courts.

Downing offered a declaration prescribing an oath of office.

Coffin offered resolutions to appoint a committee of three to consult a measure to protect loyal men. Referred to committee on lawlessness and crime.

Gray offered a resolution about a bridge over Boggy Bayou, in Titus county, securing to one Reynolds and his heirs certain rights.

Whitmore, by leave, asked to introduce a report from the committee on finance.
