OFFICIAL LAWS UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

[PUBLIC RESOLUTION—No. 35.] JOINT RESOLUTION extending the time for the completion of the Northern Pacific Railroad.

Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section eight of an act entitled "An act granting lands to aid in the construction of a railroad and telegraph line from Lake Superior to Puget Sound, on the Pacific coast," is hereby so amended as to read as follows: That each and every grant, right, and privilege herein, are so made and given to and accepted by said Northern Pacific Railroad Company upon and subject to the following conditions, namely: That the said company shall commence the work on said road within two years from and after the second day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, and shall complete not less than one hundred miles per year; that the second year thereafter, and shall construct, equip, furnish, and complete the whole road by the fourth day of July, anno Domini, eighteen hundred and seventy-seven.

[PUBLIC RESOLUTION No. 37.] A RESOLUTION donating certain captured or finance for the completion of a monument to the memory of the late Major General John Sedgwick. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of War be, and he is hereby, authorized and required to place in charge of Major General H. G. Wright, Major General Frank Wheaton, Major General George W. Getty, and Major General Truman Seymour, three bronze cannon, captured by the sixth army corps in battle, for the construction of a statue of the late Major General John Sedgwick, to be placed on a monument erected to his memory by the sixth corps of the army of the Potomac.

[PUBLIC RESOLUTION—No. 38.] JOINT RESOLUTION relative to the pay of the assistant librarian of the House. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That for the present Congress commencing therewith, the Clerk is directed to pay from the contingent fund of the House, to assistant librarian in charge of the hall library, the difference between his present pay and the pay of the file, printing, and engraving clerks.

[PUBLIC RESOLUTION—No. 39.] JOINT RESOLUTION to correct an act entitled "An act for the relief of certain exporters of rum." Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the word "and" where it occurs in said act after the word "export" and before the words "actually contracted" be changed to "or" so that the corrected act shall read "intended for export or actually contracted for."

[PUBLIC RESOLUTION—No. 40.] Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Navy shall detail two competent and impartial officers of the navy, and the Secretary of War shall detail a competent and impartial officer of the engineer corps who shall compose a commission, whose duty it shall be to make careful examination of the harbor of Boston, and shall report to Congress at its next session, in what manner the commerce of said harbor and the interests of the United States in the navy yard at Charlestown will be affected by the construction of a bridge over the water between the main land in the city of Boston and East Boston, in the manner provided in an act of the legislature of the State of Massachusetts, entitled "An act to incorporate the Mysterick Bridge Company" and no bridge shall be erected across said water until the assent of Congress shall be given thereto.

A WAR OF RACES.—Mr. Mullins, a talkative Conservative of the convention, in a speech on Thursday last, spoke of a "war of races," and declared himself a straight-out Caucasian, and said he would change his opinion when the leopard changed his spots and the Ethiopian his skin. The leopard part of Mr. Mullins' declaration is all that saves him. The capacity of the Ethiopian to change his skin has been thoroughly demonstrated in this country. And it is our opinion that a "war of races" has always raged in the United States, particularly in the South, and now we have a pie-bald race as the result; Mr. Mullins' Caucasian has some other vicious; and should this "war of race" continue another generation with the same fervor that it did during the painful days of slavery,

there would not be a black man left to tell the tale. This talk of a "war of races" has been worn thread-bare, it has taken the place of the cry of "negro insurrection" which was the harmless bugaboo of the South for half of a century, and was the capital stock of just such orators as Mr. Mullins. What, we ask, is to become of the mixed bloods; to which side will they gravitate? There is no reason or sense in this talk about a "war of races." —Freed Man's Press.

Since the outrageous and unprovoked massacre at Millies, it is out of the question for Union men to open their lips in defense of their rights of citizenship, or political standing.

Without the curse of slavery we do not believe these conflicting ideas of government would ever have led to a conflict of arms; but while the free States were improving by their free schools, manufactories, &c., the slave States were left in almost a state of barbarism.

The same spirit of selfishness is illustrated in the moral part of man. The very selfish man cares nothing, only for himself, or possibly for his family as a part of himself.

The spirit of State Sovereignty is not only selfish but increasing and wicked, their talk of "Constitution" &c., is a lie. Who does not know that previous to the rebellion it was a common thing in slave States to buy and feather and mob and hang a citizen from a sister State...

THE CONVENTION.

FIFTIETH DAY. CAPITOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS. July 29, 1868. Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present. Prayer by the chaplain. Journal of yesterday read and adopted.

Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention: A majority of your committee on State affairs, to whom was referred the following declaration of the Hon. A. J. Evans, locating the Capital of the State of Texas after the year 1870 at the city of Waco, Texas, and dividing and increasing the university fund of Texas, and locating one branch thereof at San Antonio, Texas, and the other at Tyler, Smith county, Texas, ask permission to make the following report to your Honorable body:

1st. We find that the city of Waco, if not in the exact centre, is nearly so, of both the territory and population of Texas, is a fine, eligible and healthy place, surrounded by a fine farming country. Said city is second in point of size and business importance only to the cities of Galveston and San Antonio, and surrounded by a highly intelligent and enterprising people.

2. Our university fund, now amounting at least one million six hundred thousand dollars, lies idle and unexpended; say, more, is being rapidly squandered. All efforts to locate a university in Texas, for the last fifteen years have proved in vain, from the very fact that the locality could not be agreed upon by the Legislature of the State, and, judging the future by the past, we think it safe to say, that if this convention does not now locate the same, it never will be done.

A division of the State of Texas having failed for the present, and the time for which the present act of government of Texas expires in 1870; it is nothing but natural in the people of Texas to desire that the Capital thereof shall be in the centre, and that the eastern part of the State have one branch of the university, and the West the other, we therefore report back the declaration, and ask its passage.

Be it declared, That the following shall be a section of the new constitution of Texas: Sec. — From and after the year 1870, Waco, McLennan county, Texas, shall be the capital of the State of Texas, and that the university fund of Texas shall be equally divided, and increased double its present amount by the Legislature of Texas, and two universities established, the one at Tyler, Smith county, Texas, the other at San Antonio, Bexar county, Texas.

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the President to inquire into the facts and report by resolution or otherwise.

Resolved, That any person charged with having committed a capital offense, shall not be discharged or admitted to bail by a Justice of the peace, after examination by such Justice of the peace.
