The Fruits of Radical Teaching.

This is an expression that is being used throughout the State of Texas by every rebel paper to designate what by any other class of people would be called cold-blooded murder.

Since the war we have had a free press, and their wicked deeds are being ventilated; this they cannot endure, and set up one continual howl over the State that it will hurt our reputation.

This practice of murdering Union men is altogether too common and systematic not to show that there is some controlling power back which causes these wicked deeds—then the systematic practice of calling it the "fruits of radical teaching," shows it to proceed from some centre; and this centre is the same that in 1861 manufactured the stories of "negro insurrection."

That it is a systematic effort to rid the State of loyal men is evident from the fact that these victims never have murdered.

In Millican the colored men had the audacity to come into town actually on horseback, and one of them actually had a pistol—unbearable insolence—hence the "war of races;" but we notice not a single white man shot in this "war of races."

This subject is too heinous to write calmly about. We will defy any of these murderers' apologists to show where is a single instance a Union man ever murdered a rebel because he was a rebel; but, oh! for how many years have loyal men been murdered on account of their loyalty!

Our readers will see by the telegraphic despatches from Governor Warmouth, of Louisiana, that this diabolical spirit of murder is not confined to Texas, but is as universal as was secession at its commencement, and the same leaders that were responsible for the crime of secession are responsible for these murders.

"The fruits of radical teachings," indeed! when these poor victims are being slaughtered like sheep, and never even yet have raised their hand in retaliation,—merely submitting to their lot, and pleading in vain for mercy—honest, sober, industrious and harmless victims—suffering all things, yet in anger doing nothing. If this be the "fruit of radical teaching," we have a most illustrious example of it set in the New Testament.

WASHINGTON, August 6.—Gen. Kilpatrick, Minister to Chili, has 1 day of absence to return home the first of September.

The President accepted Rollins' resignation without any remark, on conditions which still hold. The acceptance is mere formality it is said, and does not change the situation.

Gen. Burbridge is pressing for the office, and it is said he has the assurance from several Senators that they will protect the President in dealing promptly with Rollins.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 1st. 1868. To His Excellency Andrew Johnson, President of the United States:

Sir:—I have the honor to forward to you, by Lieut. Col. J. F. Dean, of my staff, a joint resolution adopted by the General Assembly of this State on the first day of August, 1858.

I also enclose with it a petition from a number of prominent and influential citizens of North Louisiana, setting forth the horrible outrages that are daily being perpetrated in that portion of the State, together with a letter from Hon. G. W. Hudsheth, Attorney for 8th Judicial District, showing the state of affairs that exists there; also, I send other letters and papers showing clearly that in many of the parishes there exists no protection for citizens in courts, and that men are set down on the roads, in their houses and elsewhere, without a question being asked or any steps taken to bring offenders to justice.

The Judge of the Twelfth Judicial District refuses to go to the Parish of Franklin unless a force is sent with him to protect him from violence, and he is not obnoxious on personal, or for political grounds. The general assembly is obnoxious to them.

There are military organizations on foot in this city; under the auspices of these secret organizations, they declare openly in the streets at night or in halls, easy to be seen in court.

I fully believe there is meditated a bloody revolution, the certain fruits of which would be long continued, if not hopeless confusion, disaster and ruin to the State. The presence of United States troops in my judgment, is necessary to prevent this organization of militia, and a very questionable expediency, in as much as it will be under the present excited state of the mind on politics, parties armed to support the movement another; I wish to avoid, if possible, and respectfully request your Excellency to put two regiments of Cavalry, a regiment of Infantry and a battery of Artillery, under command of some competent officer, with orders to cooperate with me in repressing disorder and violence; arresting criminals and protecting the officers of the law in trying them; the breaking up of secret political organizations, and a few examples of condign punishment of offenders will insure peace in the State. As soon as the great excitement on the part of those men who adhere to rebellion, to either kill or drive away Union white men so as to be able to terrify the masses of colored people into voting as they shall dictate.

There is a secret organization throughout the State known as the K. W. C., the full details of which, with questions, oath, &c., &c., Colonel Dean will explain to you; it is founded for the purpose of placing and keeping colored people in a condition of inferiority, and with a view to this end, contemplate and design to precipitate a conflict between the two races. Many prominent citizens of the State are leaders in it. Its members are sworn under oaths of a most binding character, to carry out the purposes of the organization, at all costs, hazards, and sacrifices, and by measures, however desperate that the leaders may adopt. It has no transparent that the mob which threatened the Legislature some weeks since, were on your prevention of enacting the scenes of 30th July, 1866, by the presence of United States troops.

The deliberations of this secret organization to assassinate the Lieut. Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives, for having decided questions preliminary to the organization; in politics he is opposed to the new constitution, he is a life long citizen of the State.

The Sheriff of the Parish of Franklin, a democrat, has resigned, confessing his inability to make any arrests, or discharge the duties of his office, on account of the condition of affairs.

Prominent Union men in the Parish of Caddo wrote me that their homes were beset by desperadoes and their lives and property thus far has been saved from destruction, only by armed men who volunteered to guard them. As you will see by letters of Mr. Hudsheth, District Attorney for the 8th District, men, women and children have been recently murdered in the Parish of St. Landry, by bands of armed men, who remain thus far unpunished and uncollected.

The enclosed newspaper, a democratic journal published in Madison Parish, shows clearly the condition of affairs there, in corroboration of statements contained in the petition of Judge Crawford, Judge Aylie and

others, gentlemen of North Louisiana. From the very best information Mr. President, I have no doubt that one hundred and fifty men have been murdered in Louisiana, in the last month and a half. Starting as this statement is, letters of most reliable character fully confirm it. There seems to be a settled determination attending the present political campaign.

I have the honor to be very respectfully, your obedient servant, (Signed.) H. C. WARMOUTH, Governor of Louisiana.

VIENNA, August 7.—Baron Von Benst made a speech at Chusenfest, declaring Austria would not interfere in German affairs, and disavowing the policy of vengeance.

LOUISVILLE, August 7.—Democratic Majority will reach 80,000.

NEW ORLEANS, August 6.—Two more Democratic members of the House have been ousted, and Radical opponents seated. The seats of those ousted were originally contested on the ground of ineligibility, but the ground was abandoned and fraud substituted.

Among the published evidence in the case are two affidavits proving that the Radical contestants committed more frauds than was charged against the Democrats.

The Radical contestants were seated forty-three to twenty-five. Presiding officers of Democratic Clubs denounced the statements that their organizations, professing to be political, are really military, as unmitigated falsehoods.

WASHINGTON, August 6.—General Grant will be absent until the middle of September; he will probably accompany the Indian Peace Commission, which Sherman has summoned together Westward.

Evarts returned unexpectedly. He had a prolonged interview with the President.

Revenue receipts to-day is five hundred and thirty-three thousand dollars. Customs for the week ending the 31st of July, is two millions and seventy-three thousand dollars.

The Democratic majority in Kentucky rules seventy thousand.

NEW YORK, August 6.—There are several cases of yellow fever in the hospital ship at the quarantine. Captain Reed, from Cienfuegos, and one of his boatmen, died of the black vomit yesterday.

ST. LOUIS, August 6.—General Grant responded to a serenade to-night as follows: Gentlemen and fellow-citizens: I can scarcely find words enough to thank you for this very hearty and warm reception. It is particularly gratifying to me to meet so many friends in St. Louis, a place which has arisen since I have been a man grown, and where I intend to become a resident at some future day. Thanking you again, I will bid you good night.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 6.—Japanese advices to the 4th represent the season unusually wet.

The tea and silk markets are dull. The tycoon is generally successful in military operations against the Mikado.

LIVERPOOL, August 6.—Mr. Davis arrived last night. Paris, August 6.—Spanish advices represent the whole power of the Government necessary to prevent an outbreak generally.

CINCINNATI, August 6.—The steamers Delaware, Portsmouth, Pine Grove, Porter, and a barge, were burned at the wharf.

WASHINGTON, August 6.—An interview between the President and Colonel Dean of Warmouth's staff, was pleasant and confidential. During the interview the President gave no indication of questioning the legality of Louisiana's present government, and expressed to Colonel Dean the opinion, not decision. He wished it to be understood that the same course would be followed by the Secretary of War towards Louisiana and Florida that prevails in Tennessee—that is, in effect, that there are sufficient troops in those States to suppress disorders, and that they would be used for that purpose upon proper application from the State, under the direction, however, of United States officers.

With this unofficial expression of the opinion, the matter was referred to the War Department, and remains in abeyance until Schofield's return on Saturday.

A Picture for Patriots to Ponder.

The Chairman of the Tammany Convention at the time Horatio Seymour was nominated, was the rebel General Price, of Missouri, whose State never pretended to secede from the Union.

North Carolina delegation, which cast its first ballot for Seymour, and hastening to follow Ohio's lead, returned to its first love—declared during the war that he was going to fight the Yankees until hell was frozen over, and then he would fight them on the ice." He subsequently addressed the rebel soldiers in the trenches, and urged them to "pile hell so full of Yankees that their feet would stick out of the windows." This same unrepentant rebel, who was so enthusiastic for Seymour, halted at Richmond en route home from the convention, and declared that, in his opinion, what the Confederacy had fought for would be secured by the election of Seymour. Henry A. Wise, another of the letter's enthusiastic friends, declared upon the same occasion that he did not like the platform, because it said secession was dead, whereas it was more alive than ever. The nominees were, however, unobjectionable, inasmuch as they would restore the "lost cause."

The gentleman who nominated Blair for the Presidency was none other than the rebel General Preston, of Kentucky, who, if possible, deserved a severer punishment than the other insurgent leaders, inasmuch as he had not the excuse of State secession. He, in conjunction with Breckenridge, seduced thousands of the young men of Kentucky into the Confederacy. Preston's nomination was seconded by Fort Pillow Forrest and Wade Hampton, who said in his recent address before the alumni and undergraduates of Lee's College, "The cause for which Jackson (Stonewall) fell, can not be vain; but, in some form, will yet triumph," who declared in his New York ratification speech that the disfranchisement of the South should cast their ballots, and the bayonet must force an entrance for them into the ballot-box.

Is it as all surprising that the nominations have fallen upon the Northern Democracy? In spite of the "gasconade" of their newspapers they do not fail to see that Lee's prediction has been verified, and the late insurgents have captured the democratic party.
