UNITED STATES Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

[Public-No. 42.]

As Act making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine. (Concluded.)

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the number of persons authorized to be enlisted into the navy of the United States, in-cluding seamen, ordinary seamen, landsmen, and mechanics, and including apprentices and boys, is hereby fixed and established at eight thousand five hundred, and no more. Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That all unexpended appropriations existing on the first day of July next, for any of the several

heads of appropriation provided for in this act, shall be carried to the surplus fund, unless the same is necessary to pay expendi-tures made during the current uscal year, or unless the rame is necessary to execute tracts made before said date.

SEC. 4. And be it further exacted, That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby di-rected in his next annual estimates of appropriations to state all the balances of appr oriations made prior to the present session Congress, for each branch of the public ser vice, and remaining unexpended on the first day of July next, and designate the amounts necessary to execute contracts or pay expet ditures properly obargeable to each of suc

"The Fruits of Radical Teaching."

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. New ORLEANS, Aug. 1st. 1868. o His Excellency Andrew Johnson President of the United States:

Sia: -I have the honor to forward to you, by Lieut. Col. J. F. Dean, of my staff, a joint resolution adopted the General Assembly of this State on the first day of August, 1858. I also enclose with it a petition from a number of prominent and influential citizens of North Louisiana, setting forth the horrible outrages that are daily being perpetrated in that portion of the state, together with a let-ter from Hon G. W. Hudsheth, Attorney for 8th Judicial District, showing the state of affairs that exists there; also, I send other letters and papers showing clearly that in many of the pari-hes there exists no pro tection for citizens in courts, and that men are s o down on the roads, in their house and elsewhere, without a question being asked or any steps

taken to bring offenders to justice.
The Judge of the Twelth Judicial Di-trict refuses to go to the Parish of Feanklin unless a force is sent with im to protect him from violence, and he is not obnoxious on personal, or for political grounds. The general assembly is obnoxious to them.

There are military organizations on foot in this city; under the auspices of the so secret organizations, they declare openly in the streets at night

or in halls, easy to be seen in court.

I fully b lieve there is med tated a bloody revolution, the certain fruits of which would be long continued, if not hopeless confusion, disaster and ruin to the State. The presence of United States troops in my judgment, is necessar: to prevent this organi zation of mili ia, and a very ques tionable expediency, in as much as it will be under the present excited state of the mind on politics, parties armed to support the movements another, I wish to avoid, if possible, and respectfully request your Excellency to put two regiments of Caval ry, a regiment of Infantry and a bat tery of Artillery, under command of ome competent officer, with orders to cooperate with me in repressing disorder and violence; arresting criminals and protecting the officers of the law in trying the. ii; the breaking up of secret political organizations, and a few examples of condign pun-ishment of offenders will to ure peace in the State. As soon as the great excitement on the part of 'those men who adhered to rebellion, to either kill or drive away Union white men so as to be able to terrify the masses of colored people into voting as they shall dictate.

There is a secret organization throughout the State known as the K. W.
