Since then, Andrew Johnson and the Democratic party have been endeavoring to prevent the organization of these new gavernments. Congrees in the further execution of its especial power in such case, has provided that no State which retains its old rebel organization, constitution and officers, and refuses to remodel its constitution PUMPS, STOVES, ARMS, &c. and laws in order to be recognized by July7dtf Congress, shall be doemed to have lawful government, and, consequently, as not entitled to participate in the elec-tion of President. Two things must al-ways be remembered as fundamental truths in this matter of reconstruction: 1; That Congress is by the constitution made the exclusive and absolute authority to determine whether a State constitution or government is legitimate and in consonance with the constitution of the United States; and that it has the authority to enforce its decision by overturning the condemned, and permitting the people to organize a new State goverbment 2. Congress has the power to accept it or reject it; and that until it is recognized by Congress such govern-ment has no legitimate or legal vitali-
