## OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

[PUBLIC—No. 45.]  
AN ACT to provide for appeals from the Courts of Claims, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That an appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States shall be allowed on behalf of the United States from all the final judgments of the said Court of Claims adverse to the United States, whether such judgments shall have been rendered by virtue of the general or any special power or jurisdiction of said court under the limitations now provided by law for other cases of appeal from said court.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That said Court of Claims, at any time while any suit or claim is pending before or on appeal from said court, or within two years next after the final disposition of any such suit or claim, may, on motion or behalf of the United States, grant a new trial in any such suit and stay the payment of any judgment thereon, upon such evidence (although the same may be cumulative or other) as shall reasonably satisfy said court that any fraud, wrong, or injustice in the premises has been done to the United States; but until an order is made staying the payment of a judgment, the same shall be payable and paid as now provided by law.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That whenever it shall be material in any suit or claim before any court to ascertain whether any person did or did not give aid or comfort to the late rebellion, the claimant or party asserting the loyalty of any such person to the United States during such rebellion, shall be required to prove affirmatively that such person did, during said rebellion, constantly adhere to the United States, and did give aid or comfort to persons engaged in said rebellion; and the voluntary residence of any such person in any place where, at any time during such residence, the rebel force or organization held sway, shall be prima facie evidence that such person did give aid and comfort to said rebellion and to the persons engaged therein.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That no plaintiff or claimant, or any person from or through whom any such plaintiff or claimant derives his alleged title, claim or right against the United States, or any person interested in any such title, claim, or right shall be a competent witness in the Court of Claims in supporting any such title, claim, or right, and no testimony given by such plaintiff, claimant, or person shall be used. Provided, That the United States shall, if they see cause, have the right to examine such plaintiff, claimant, or person as a witness under the regulations and with the regulations provided in section eight of the act passed March third, eighteen hundred and sixty three, entitled "An act to amend an act to establish a court for the investigation of claims against the United States," approved February twenty-fourth, eighteen hundred and sixty five.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That from and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty eight, the Attorney General of the United States for the time being shall, with his assistants, attend to the prosecution and defence of all matters and suits in the Court of Claims on behalf of the United States. There shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, two assistant Attorneys General, who shall hold their offices for four years respectively, unless sooner lawfully removed, and whose salaries shall be four thousand dollars each, per year, payable quarterly, and who shall be in lieu of the solicitor, assistant solicitor, and deputy solicitor of the Court of Claims, and of the assistant Attorney General now provided for by law; and the existing offices of solicitor, assistant solicitor, and deputy solicitor, of the Court of Claims, and of assistant Attorney General, are hereby abolished from and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty eight. The Attorney General shall have power to appoint two additional clerks of the fourth class, and one clerk at a salary not exceeding two thousand dollars, in his office.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That it shall also be the duty of the said Attorney General and his assistants, in all cases brought against the United States in said Court of Claims founded upon any contract, agreement, or transaction with any executive department, or any bureau, officer, or agent of such department, or where the matter or thing in which the claim is based shall have been passed upon and decided by any department, bureau, or officer, or officer in law or department regulations with the settlement and adjustment of such claims, demands, or accounts, to transmit to said department, bureau, or officer, as aforesaid, a printed copy of the petition filed by the claimant in such case, with a request that the said department, bureau, or officer to whom the same shall be transmitted as aforesaid, will furnish to said Attorney General all facts, circumstances, and evidence touching said claim as is or may be in the possession or knowledge of the said department, bureau, or officer; and it shall be the duty of the said department, bureau, or officer to whom such petition may be transmitted and such request preferred as aforesaid, without delay, and within a reasonable time, to furnish said Attorney General with a full statement of all the facts, information, and proofs which are or may be within the knowledge or in the possession of said department, bureau, or officer, relating to the claim aforesaid. Such statement shall also contain a reference to or description of all official documents or papers, if any, as may be required, or that may be necessary and proper for the defence of the United States against the said claim, together with the department, office, or place where the same is kept or may be procured. And if the said claim shall have been passed upon and decided by the said department, bureau, or officer, the statement or answer to be transmitted

to said Attorney General, as hereinbefore provided, shall succinctly state the reasons and principles upon which such decision shall have been based. In all cases where such decision shall have been made upon any act of Congress, or upon any section or clause of such act, the same shall be cited specifically. And if any previous interpretation or construction shall have been given to such act, section, or clause, by the said department or bureau, transmitting such statement, the same shall be set forth succinctly in said statement, and a copy of the opinion filed, if any, shall be annexed to such statement and transmitted with the same to the Attorney General aforesaid. And where any decision in the case shall have been based upon any regulation of an executive department, or where such regulation shall or may, in the opinion of the department, bureau, or officer transmitting such statement, have any bearing upon the claim in suit, the same shall be distinctly referred to and quoted in extenso in the statement transmitted to said Attorney General: Provided, however, That where there shall be pending in said court more than one case, or a class of cases, the defence to which shall rest upon the same facts, circumstances, and proofs, the said department, bureau, or officer shall be held to apply to all such classes of cases as if made out, certified, and transmitted in each case respectively.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the head of any executive department, whenever any claim is made upon said department involving disputed facts or controverted questions of law, where the amount in controversy exceeds three thousand dollars, or where the decision will affect a class of cases or furnish a precedent for the future action of any executive department in the adjustment of a class of cases, without regard to the amount involved in the particular case, or where any authority, right, privilege, or exemption is claimed or denied under the Constitution of the United States, he cause such claim, with all the vouchers, papers, proofs, and documents pertaining thereto, to be transmitted to the Court of Claims, and the same shall be there proceeded in as if commenced by the voluntary action of the claimant. And the Secretary of the Treasury may, upon the certificate of any Auditor or Comptroller of the Treasury, direct any account, matter, or claim of the character, amount, or class described or limited in this section to be transmitted, with all the vouchers, papers, documents, and proofs pertaining thereto, to the said Court of Claims, for trial and adjudication: Provided, however, That no case shall be referred by any head of a department unless it belongs to one of the several classes of cases to which, by reason of the subject matter and character, the said Court of Claims might, under existing laws, take jurisdiction on such voluntary action of the claimant. And all the cases mentioned in this section, which shall be transmitted by the head of any executive department, or upon the certificate of any Auditor or Comptroller, shall be proceeded in as other cases pending in said court and shall, in all respects, be subject to the same rules and regulations; and appeals from the final judgments or decrees of said court therein to the Supreme Court of the United States shall be allowed in the manner now provided by law. The amount of the final judgments or decrees in such cases so transmitted to said court, where rendered in favor of the claimants, shall in all cases be paid out of any specific appropriation applicable to the same, if any such there be; and where no such appropriation exists, the same shall be paid in the same manner as other judgments of said court.

Sec. 8. And be it further enacted, That no person shall file or prosecute any claim or suit in the Court of Claims, or an appeal therefrom, for or in respect to which he or any assignee of his shall have commenced and has pending any suit or process in any other court against any officer or person who, at the time of the cause of action alleged in such suit or process arose, was in respect thereto acting or professing to act, mediate or immediately, under the authority of the United States, unless such suit or process, if now pending in such other court, shall be withdrawn or dismissed within thirty days after the passage of this act.

Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the clerk of the said Court of Claims to transmit to Congress, at the commencement of every December session, a full and complete statement of all the judgments rendered by the said court for the previous year, stating the amounts thereof and the parties in whose favor rendered.

Sec. 10. And be it further enacted, That all provisions of any act incompatible herewith be, and the same are hereby repealed.

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Views of Mr. Morgan Hamilton.

Our readers will remember that the Convention appointed Messrs. Morgan Hamilton and Caldwell as a committee to proceed to Washington and attend to the pressing wants of the State of Texas.

Washington, D. C., July 26, 1868.

Dear Sir:—We dispatched on yesterday to General Davis the results of our efforts in behalf of our friends in Texas.

We could probably have pressed our bill through the Senate yesterday, but all knew it would have been pocketed by the President, and then upon the meeting of Congress in September, the measure would of necessity have to be renewed.

Belief is current that the Cabinet decided not to interfere with the Southern States only in cases of palpable insurrection, details will transpire Monday.

A careful reading of section second of fourteenth amendment of Constitution, shows that the people must vote for Presidential electors or lose their representation in Congress.

Rosecrans leaves for Mexico middle of September.

London, August 8.—At a French trading post near the frontier of Cochis, China, twenty-five men were massacred by Chinese rebels.

Washington, August 8.—Grants recommendation for general jail delivery, in the Southern States, heretofore telegraphed, was formally presented to the Cabinet yesterday, but produced no action.

After coming so far and in such uncomfortable dust and heat, I do not intend to go back to Texas without the relief we ask; I shall therefore find some quiet place North or East where I can repair my wasted strength until Congress meets in September.

From all I can see and hear there is no serious fears felt in the minds of Republicans of Grant's election.

The copperheads have overdone the thing in order to please the rebels. There is not a particle of enthusiasm as yet on either side, nor will it be possible in my opinion to get up much, so confident do people feel that the Republican party must be successful.

I was much interested coming through Mississippi to notice the activity displayed by the chivalry in hunting down carpet-baggers and Radicals.

On more than one occasion parties were examining the cars to see if any such characters were occupying the seats.

Whatever other States may do, after September we shall try to deal with such scamps in Texas. That it can be done successfully I feel sure; that it must be done, if we are ever to have peace, is certain.

There is but one way now to accomplish it—and that is by force; I am in favor of applying it without stint or reserve; it is necessary and will be found wholesome.

Mr. Hamilton and Judge Calwell found the Virginia and Mississippi committees in Washington asking relief of Congress, and it is due to the Texas delegation that Congress agree to come together in September.

Our friends in Congress urge us not to yield the hold which the Government now has through the Convention.

Mississippi is suffering just now from the folly of trusting to their ability to carry their constitution, and elect loyal officers.

Coming, as these views do, from a gentleman for whose opinions the loyal people of Texas have the most profound respect, we hope they will have due weight with the convention.

New Orleans, August 7.—In the House yesterday a protest from the two democratic members last ousted, was offered with a motion to speak ten minutes, protest returned to those offering it by a vote of 45 to 14.

Warmouth's letter to the President has completely eradicated good feeling towards him on the part of the Conservatives, which his speech to a crowd on Canal street created.

To-day Senator Jewell offered a resolution that a committee of three be appointed to wait on Gov. Warmouth to ascertain from him the time and place the hundred and fifty murders which he said had been committed in the last six weeks; also to obtain letters of District Attorney Hudspeth, attended to which charges indiscriminately murder of men, women and children in that Judicial District.

Jewell followed his resolution with an intensely bitter speech upon the action of the Governor; in course of which he stated, while five hundred stand of arms were known to be in the building opposite the State house, occupied as headquarters of the Republicans party.

Warmouth in his guernization of secret military, but ostensibly political organizations, neglected to mention the Loyal League, and the Grand Army of the Republic, the latter of which he is head in this State.

Jewell's resolution was referred to Joint Committee on Civil Affairs, where it will die.

London, August 10.—Farragut is at Constantinople on S'seamer Frolic. Steamer Franklin stopped at Syria to investigate the alleged firing on American ships by some Greeks.

Washington, August 10.—Summary by Steamer Monitor says the French trans Atlantic Cable was completed August 6th.

New York Working Men's Association arrived at Paris on tour to Europe to study the situation of the laboring classes and development of co operation system.

Resolved, Be it unanimously resolved by the stock-raisers of Atascosa and surrounding counties, in mass meeting assembled, that we bind ourselves jointly and severally to aid and assist each other in the enforcement of the above resolutions by employment of counsel to prosecute offending parties, and by all other lawful means.

Resolved, That we request the Secretary of this meeting to make out three correct copies of the above resolutions, and forward to the San Antonio Express, San Antonio Herald and El Mexicano de Texas, with a request that they give them a place in their columns.
