That an appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States shall be allowed on behalf of the United States from all the final judgments of the said Court of Claims adverse to the United States, whether such judgments shall have been rendered by virtue of the general or any special power or jurisdiction of said court un-der the limitations now provided by law for other cases of appeal from said court. Pro-vided, That the United States shall, if they see cause, have the right to examine such see cause, have the right to examine such plaintiff, claimant, or person as a witness under the regulations and with the regulations provided in section eight of the act passed March third, eighteen hundred and sixty three, entitled "An act to amend an act to establish a court for the investigation of the court for the investigation of claims against the United States," approved February twenty fourth, eighteen hundred and fifty five.

And be it further enacted, That faom and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty eight, the Attorney (tentro) the Urited States for the time being shall, with his assistants, attend to the pros-coution and defence of all matters and suits in the Court of Claims on behalf of the United States. There shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and con-sent of the Senate, two assistant Attorneys of the Senate, two assistant Attorneys ral, who shall hold their offices for four years respectively. unless sooner lawfully re-moved, and whose salaries shall be four thousand dollars each, per year, payable quer-terly and who shall be to lice of the solici tor, assistant solicitor, and deputy solicitor of the Court of Claims, and of the assistant Attorney General now provided for by law; and the existing offices of solicitor, assistant solicitor, and deputy soliciter, of the Court of Claims, and of assistant Attorney Houseal, are hereby abolished from and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty eight. The Attorney General shall have power to appoint two additional clerks of the fourth class, and one clerk at a salary not exceeding two thousand dellars, in his

office.

of the said department, burean, or officer; and
it shall be the duty of the said department,
bureau, or officer to whom such petition may be transmitted and such request preferred as aforessi, without delay, and within a reason able time, to furnish said Attorney General with a full statement of all the facts, infor-mation, and proofs which are or may be within the knowledge or in the possession of said department, bareau, or officer, relating to the claim aforesaid. Such statement shall also contain a reference to or description of all official documents or papers, if any, as may or do furnish proof of facts referred to in said statement, or that may be necessary and proper for the defence of the United States against the said claim, together with the deper for the defence of the United States against the said claim, together with the de-partment, office, or place where the same is kept or may be procured. And if the said claim shall have been passed upon and de-

prov del, s all succintly state the reasons and principles upon which un decision shall have been based. In all cases where such decision shall have been made upon any act of Congress, or upon any section or clause of such act, the same shall be cited specifically. And if any previous interpre-tation or construction shall have been given to such act, section, or clause, by the said department or bureau, transmitting such statement, the same shall be set forth succintly in said statement, and a copy of the opinion filed, if any, shall, be annexed to such statement and transmitted with the same to the Attorney General aforesaid. And where any decision in the case shall have been based upon any regulation of an executive department, or where such regulation shall or may, in the opinion of the department, bureau, or officer transmitting such state-ment, have any bearing upon the claim in suit, the same shall be distinctly referred to and quoted in extense in the statement trans mitted to said Attorney General: Provided howaver. That where there shall be pending in said court more than one case, or a class of cases. the defence to which shall rest upon the same facts, circumstances, and proofs, the caid department business. the said department, bureau, or officer shall enly be required to certify and transmit one states ent of the same, and such statement shall le held to apply to all such classes of cases as if made out, certified, and transmit

ted in each case respectively. SEC. 7. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the head of any executive department, whenever any claim is made upon said department involving disputed facts or controverted questions of law, where the amount in controversy exdecision will affect a class of cases or furnish a precedent for the future action of any ex scutive department in the adjustment of a class of cases, without regard to the amount involved in the particular case, or where any authority, right, privilege, or exemption is claimed or depied under the Constitution of the United States, he cause such claim, with all the vouchers, papers, proofs, and docu-ments pertrining thereto, to be (rahamitted ments pertaining thereto, to be transmitted to the Court of Claims, and the same shall be there proceeded in as if commenced by the voluntary action of the claimant. And all the cases mentioned in this section which shall be transmitted by the head of any executive department, or upon the certificate of any Austroior Comptroller, shall be proceeded in as other cases pending in said court and shall, in all respects, be subject to the same rules and regulations; and appeals from the final judgments or decrees of said court therein to the Supreme Court of the United States shall be allowed in the manner now provided by law. The amount of the final judgments or decrees in such cases so transmitted to said court, where rendered in favor of the claimants. shall in all cases be paid out of any specific appropriation applicable to the same, if any

And be it further enactee, That it shall be the duty of the clerk of the said Court of Claims to transmit to Congress, at the commencement of every December ses sion, a full and complete statement of all the nents rendered by the said court for the previous year, stating the amounts thereof and the parties in whose favor rendered.

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VIEWS OF MR. MORGAN HAMILTON.

Our readers will remember that the Convention appointed Messrs. Morgan Hamilton and Caldwell as a committee to proceed to Washington and attend to the pressing wants of the State of Tuxas. We take the following from a private letter to Mr. Newcomb from Mr. Hamilton; the letter has so much of public interest in it that Mr. Newcomb has taken the responsibility to allow it to be made public:-

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 26, 1868.

Ilon, James P. NEWCOMB.

Deur Sir :- We dispatched on yesterday to General Davis the results of our efforts in behalf of our friends in Texas Only time was wanted ; there is no want of disposition on the part of Republicans in Congress to give us anything we need officers. We will try and profit by their to enable us to organize government on a loyal basis.

We could probably have pressed our bill through the Senate yesterday, but by the President, and then upon the weight with the convention. meeting of Congress in September, the measure would of necessity have to be renewed; whereas it can now be taken up by the Senate as unfinished business as soon as the session commences. Not much is lost, we apprehend, by the delay, for it will take all the time intervening to ascertain who it will do to put into office. Ir will not do to act in this important matter without great caution, for much will depend upon the success and fidelity of officers. We have seen how prope many of them have in the past been to trim. Intelligence and capacity are certainly requisit qualifications for any responsible position, but in our actual situation in Texas, these are by no means the first qualifications -integrity and back-bone are the first, for settlement-Even a stupid man, if honest and bold, will acquit bimself better and do more. f r his country in these times than the best informed man who yields his convictions to he case or his interests. Let the convention be prepared with the proper list of names in the several counties when authority is granted to remove and appoint.

I hope our friends will not give up the division of Texas, but continue to trading post near the frontier of aggitate the subject. We shall carry it Cochin, China, twenty-five men were yet; but no one need expect that Congress will force it upon us-we must do it ourselves, Congress will sanction whatever may be done by the people of Texas-of this I have the fullest assurances-and it is just as I expected.

After coming so far and in such uncomfortable dust and heat, I do not intend to go back to Texas without the rehef we ask; I hall therefore find some

repair my wasted strength until Congress meets in September, when I shall return here and look after our bill.

From all I can see and hear there is no serious fears felt in the minds of Rpublicans of Grant's election. The copperheads have overdone the thing in order to please the rebels. There is not a particle of enthusiasm as yet on either side, nor will it be possible in my opinion to get up much, so confident do people feel that the Republican party must be successful. The excitement will be entirely throughout the South where elections are held. The Democracy are preparing to carry the lately reconstructed States, and will likely do so. In Mississippi, as in Texas, they expect to hold the election, and, unless prevented by military order or by the bill now pending, I believe they will do so. There is no limit to their addacity,

I was much interested coming through Mississippi to notice the activity displayed by the chivalry in bunting down carpet-baggers and Radicals. They will not suffer one to remain in the State if known. On more than one occasson parties were examining the cars to see if any such characters were occupying the seats. It is monstrous after all that has happened that these bloodhounds are permitted to carry on their old game of intunidation

Whatever other States may do, after September we shall try to deal with such scamps in Texas. That it can be done successfully I feel cure; that it must be done, if we are ever to have peace, is certain There is but one way now to accomplish it-and that is by force : I am in favor of applying it without stint or reserve; it is necessary and will be found wholesome.
