[Public-No. 65.]

An Acr to incorporate the Connecticut Avenue and Park Railway Company, in the District of Columbia.

Sec. 14 And be it further enacted, That the directors shall have full power to make and prescribe such by laws, rules, and regulations as they shall deem nee ful and pro-per, tending the disposition and manage-ment of the stock, property, estate, and effects of the company, not contrary to the charter, or to the laws of the United States and the ordinances of the city or county of Washington: Provided, That the directors of said corporation shall have power quire the subscribers to the capital stock to pay the amount by them respectively sub-scribed at such time, after the first instal-ment, in such manner and in such amounts as they may deem proper; and if any stook as they may deem proper; and if any stock-holders shall refuse or neglect to pay any in-stalments, as required by a resolution of the board of directors, after reasonable notice of the same, the said board of directors may sell at public auction, to the highest bidder, so many shares of said stock as shall pay said instalments, (and the highest bidder shall be taken to be the person who offers to purchase the least number of shares for the assessment due,) under such general regula-tions as may be adopted in the by laws of said corporation, or may sue for or collect the same in any court of competent jurisdic-

Any one not accustomed to the excitement and literature of a Presidentia campaign in our Republican Government, would naturally infer that at every election we were to have war. THE REPUBLICAN PLAT-FORM.

The National Republican party of the United States, assembled in National Convention in the city of Chicago on the 20th day of May, 1868, make the ollowing declaration of principles;
Fits — We congratulate the country

on the assured success of the reconstruc tion policy of Congress, as evinced by the adoption, in a majority of the States lately in rebellion, or constitutions so curing equal civil and political rights to all, and regard it as the duty of the Goverument to sustain these institutions, and to prevent the people of such States from being remitted to a state of an-

Second-The guarantee of Congress of equal suffrage to all loyal men at the South was demanded by every consideration of public safety, of gralitude and of justice, and must be maintained, while the question of suffrage in all the loyal States properly belongs to the people of

Third-We denounce all forms of reudiation as a national crime, and the national honor requires the payment of the public indebtedness in the utmost good faith to all creditors, at Bome and abroad, not only according to the letter but the spirit of the laws under which it was contracted.

Fourth-le is due to the labor of the nation that taxation should be equalized, and reduced as rapidly as the national faith will permit.

Fifth-Tie national debt, contracted as it has been for the preservation of the Union for all time to come, should be extended over a fair period for redemption, and it is the duty of Congress to reduce the rate of interest thereon whenever it can possibly be done.

Sixth- That the best policy to dimin ish our burden of debt is to so improve our credit that capitalists will seek to loan us money at lower rates of interest than we now pay, and must continue to pay so long as repudiation, partial or total, open or covert, is threatened or suspected.

Seventh-The Government of United States should be administered with the strictest economy, and the corruptions which have been so shamefully nursed and fostered by Andrew Johnson call loudly for radical reform.

Eighth-We profoundly deplore the Lincoln, and regret the accession of Andrew Johnson to the Presidency, who has acted treacherously to the people who elected him and the cause he was pledged to support; has usurped legislative and judicial tunctions; has refused to execute the laws; has used his high office to induce other officers to ignore and violate the laws; has employed his executive power to render insecure the prosperity, peace, liberty and life of the citizens; has abused the "pardoning power; has denounced the National Legislature as unconstitutional; has persistently and corruptly resisted, by every means in his power, every proper atlately in rebellion; has perverted the public patronage into an engine of wholesale corruption, and has been justly impeached for high crimes and misdemeanors, and properly pronounced guilty

Ninth-The doctrine of Great Brita's and other European powers, that because a man is once a subject Le is always so, must be resisted at every bazard by the United States as a relic of the fendal times, not authorized by the law of nations and at war with our national bonor and independence. Naturalized citizens are entitled to be protected in all their rights of citizenship as though they were native-born, and no citizen of the United States, native or naturalized, must be liable to arrest and imprisonment by any foreign power for acts done or words spoken in this country. And if so arested and imprisoned, it is the duty of the Government to interfere in his be-

Tenth-Of all who were faithful in the trials of the late war there were none entitled to more especial honor than the brave soldiers and seamen who endured the hardships of campaign and cruise, and imperiled their lives in the service of the country. The bounties and pensions provided by law for these brave defenders of the nation are obligations not to be forgotten. The widows and

Eleventh-Foreign emigration, which in the past has added so much to the wealth and development of the resources and the increase of power of this nation, "the asylum of the oppressed of all nas ould be fostered and encouraged by a liberal and just policy.

Twelfth-This convention declares its sympathy with all the oppressed people who are struggling for their rights.

On motion of General Carl Schurz, the following additional resolutions were unanimously adopted as part of the plat-

Resolved, That we highly commend the spirit of magnanimity and forbearserved in the rebellion, but now frankly and honestly co-operate with us in restoring the peace of the country and reconstructing the Southern State governments upon the basis of impartial justice and equal rights, are received back into the communion of the loyal people; and we favor the removal of the disqualifications and restrictions imposed upon the late rebols in the same measure as the'r spirit of loyalty will direct, and as may be consistent with the safety of the loyal people.

Resolved, That we recognize the great principles laid down in the immortal Declaration of Independence as the true foundation of democratic government, and we hail with gladness every effort toward making these principles a living reality on every inch of the American
