**THAT AFFRAY.**  
*A Freedman Murdered*—K. K. Lee's Spectics.

The fracas between drunken soldiers and some negroes, which occurred Wednesday last, ended in the murder of an innocent negro, as is always the case in encounters brought on against poor freedmen.

Ransom Clark, an innocent, hard working colored hostler at Sappington's stable, was attacked while engaged in moving buggies from out of the water of the freshet and sudden rise of the river; his assailants, (members of company F, 35th U. S. Infantry, led by Corporal Hoberly,) made a murderous attack, cutting several severe gashes in the head of their victim, hitting him with rocks and finally staking him in the abdomen with a bayonette, from which wound it is feared he will die.

The outrage commenced thus: parties were on the upper bridge securing lumber for the boat.

ing down the stream. Dallas Davis, a colored boy reached over and caught a new government shoe that was floating down, whereupon, a party of soldiers belonging to company F, commenced an abusive attack, using foul language, striking Davis with their fists, pieces of planks and bayonets cutting several holes in his clothing, in their efforts to stab him. Davis ran and took refuge in a store on the corner of Soledad and Paseo streets, where two well dressed young Conservatives urged the soldiers to kill the "damned black dog." The police arrived on the ground in time to prevent the murder of Davis and the soldiers were sent to camp.

The bayonette wound was inflicted by Corporal Hoberly, who said he had served four years in the Confederate army and swore he would kill the damned nigger or burn the town. He succeeded in raising a posse of his comrades, returned to the work, attacking and mortally wounding Clark, who was in no ways connected with the first assault; at this juncture, Capt. Eckles, of Gen. Mason's Staff accidentally arrived on the grounds, and although unarmed, sprang to the rescue of the negro, with one blow knocked the Corporal down and following up vigorously, scattered the party of the Corporal and succeeded in stopping the riot in its very incipiency. There is no question but the timely arrival and fearless gallantry of Capt. Eckles, prevented a serious and premeditated riot. The soldiers engaged in the affair were led by an ex rebel soldier.

The grounds for the assertion that it was a premeditated riot are based upon the fact that Doctor Cupples, one of the most respectable Conservatives of this city, but an intense partisan, was on the grounds and exerted himself with great energy in circulating the story among the soldiers, that the negroes were arming on the other side of the river. This old dodge of circulating false, sensation stories, to stir up bad blood, is known to be in conformity with the rebel plans inaugurated since the 'Bryan convention, and precisely similar to the "Millican riot" tactics.

The men who delude the rabble into making unprovoked attacks upon a race of innocent men, that political capital may be made, cannot be aware that the North is possessed of common sense, or they would certainly know that as the white's invariably escape, and negroes are murdered in every instance, it is hardly reasonable to suppose the masses there will sympathise with the victors.

Induplicate bids will be received at this office until Tuesday the 23rd day of October next, at 12 o'clock, M., for transportation of Military supplies, from the date of the contract to the first day of January, 1870, on the following route, viz:—

Route No. 6.—From Marshall Texas, Galveston Texas, and from Bryan or Courtney, or the then terminus of the Texas Central Railroad, to either any points in Texas, East or North-east of the Brazos river, and South of the Red River or between any points in said district.
