Abatement of a Nuisance.

The little river that winds through our city was once the pride of Western Texasit was once the leveliest of streams, its maters always clear; delighting the stranger and inviting the song of the poet. But of late years it has become an intolerable nuisance. Its waters are muddy and every rain that falls, threatens the city with an inundation, and the whole character of the San Antonio has has become anything but saintly.

The recent flood was but a repetition of others which have happened almost every year for the past 12 years. Property along the river has depreciated, in consequence of these floods, and each season the danger and damage of these floods seem to increase. The banks of the stream have become anything but romantic, looking more like the ranging ground of some demon of despair. Besides the horrid look, each flood gives our city, great loss is sustained by our citizens.

The time when this change took place in commenced with the building of the dam tleman. This factory will consume the just above Liffering's mill, intended to surplus oils of the large Beef Packing esturn the waters of the river into the old Conception ditch. By this dam the waters were backed up, and we distinctly remember that it was complained of as a nuisny years ago, by Capt. Beck, who contended that it was the cause of chills and fevers, unknown before. This dam was the beginning of the obstructions in our river. Mr. Rhoads, whose residence is beautifully situated near the Casino Hall. sued Whitehead in 1863, and the case being sent up to the Supreme Court, it was plainly laid down that the dam was a nuisance and any parties injured by high water above it, should be entitled to damages. and the dam removed as a nuisance.

Many others have tresspassed upon' the river in their greed to increase the size of their lots, until now it has become a positive necessity for the city authorities to take the river in charge, declare all obstructions nuisances, and remove them, or have them removed. The crippled financial condition of the city is a great draw-back, but we hope this work will not be neglect-
