This combination of the butchers is an outrage against the public, and a high and open handed piece of injustice to the welfare and good of our people and city, and the sooner it is crushed the better. Now if this meat monopoly is not immediately stopped, a meet association will quickly spring into existence which will become

spring into existence which will become a permanent and lasting institution in the city of San Antonio.
