The Convention.

ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTH DAY.

CAPITOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS, January 12, 1869.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present; prayer by the chaplain; journal of yesterday read and adopted.

Mr. Flanigan moved a suspension of the rules to take up declaration respecting the Southern Pacific Railroad company, upon which the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:

Previous question seconded.

Mr. Buffington moved a call of the house.

Call sustained.

Mr. Flanigan moved a suspension of the rules.

Call suspended.

Mr. Buffington moved a call of the house.

Call sustained.

By permission of the convention the previous question was withdrawn to allow Mr. Board to speak on the merits of the declaration.

The President announced the hour of 11 o'clock had arrived, fixed by the convention to go into committee of the whole upon the report of the special committee on the condition of the State.

Mr. Flanigan moved the rules be suspended to allow the further consideration of the declaration before the convention.

The convention refused to suspend.

On motion, the convention resolved itself into committee of the whole upon the report of the special committee on the condition of the State.

Mr. Armstrong of Lamar, in the chair.

Committee rose, reported progress, and asked leave to sit again at 7 o'clock to-night.

Leave granted.

Mr. Gray introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, 1st That a committee of eleven be appointed, and that the constitution, so far as amended, be referred to said committee for correction and revision, and the supplying of parts omitted. That said committee be instructed to act on and report said constitution as a whole, and with the least possible delay, and to enable said committee to act promptly, the members thereof, during the deliberation, are authorized to absent themselves from this House, unless when a roll of the House is made.

2nd. That said committee be further instructed to prepare and report an ordinance, providing for an election to be held on the question of the adoption of the Constitution, to be submitted by this Convention, such election to be held at the earliest convenient time.

Mr. Sumner moved the rejection of the resolution, upon which the yeas and nays were demanded, and resulted thus:

So the convention refused to reject.

Mr. Patten moved a suspension of the rules to put the resolution on its passage.

Mr. Bryant of Grayson offered the following amendment:

Amend by inserting eighty-five instead of eleven.

Mr. Patten moved the previous question.

Previous question seconded.

The question recurred: "Shall the main question be now put?"

Main question ordered.

The question recurred upon the adoption of the resolution.

It was adopted.

Mr. Armstrong of Lamar gave notice that he would move a reconsideration of the vote adopting the declaration of Mr. Newcomb, in regard to the forfeiture of valid land certificates.

On motion the Convention adjourned till 7 o'clock this evening.

The Grand Orient of France and the Supreme Council of Louisiana.

The generous and truly Masonic action taken by Mr. Chassaing, Grand Commander of the Supreme Council of the Scotch Rite Masons, for the State of Louisiana, of making no distinction as to race or color in the admission of members or in the recognition of Masons, has received the applause and official sanction of the Grand Orient of France. All the Masonic heads of Europe have acted likewise, and many of the friends of progress and humanity have sent letters of felicitation to Mr. Chassaing for his noble action. This great and highly progressive initiative, which is destined to unite thousands of men into a true brotherhood, is not yet fully appreciated. Time only will show its beneficial influence and its power to accomplish good. We are inclined to believe, however, that it will not be long before it will be appreciated to its full value.

The following is the decree addressed by the Grand Master of the Grand Orient of France to the M. Ill. B. Eugene Chassaing, Grand Commander and Grand Master of the Supreme Council of Louisiana:

T. T. G. O. G. A. O. T. U.:

GRAND ORIENT OF FRANCE, SUP. COUN. OF FRANCE AND THE FRENCH TERRITORIES.

ORIENT OF PARIS, Nov. 23, 1868, A. D.

We, Grand Master of the Masonic order of France:

Considering the report on the proposition which the Supreme Council of the State of Louisiana have addressed us, with the object of establishing official and fraternal relations between that Masonic power and the Grand Orient of France;

Wishing to present to the said Supreme Council a testimonial of our fraternal sympathies and encourage it in the very humane course which it has been following by opening its temple to every man considered worthy of being initiated into the secrecy of Freemasonry, without distinction as to nationality, race, or color;

Considering that among the Masonic powers of the world the Grand Orient of France has made itself the apostle of this great act of justice, and that it has always promptly given its support and concurrence to all Masonic powers that have been willing to follow its path and practice the same principles;

Considering Art. 24 of the Constitution:

We have decreed and do decree:

ART. I.

Friendly and official relations are from this day established between the Grand Orient of France and the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scotch Rite, for the State

of Louisiana, sitting at the Orient of New Orleans.

The fraternal relations which now unite the two Masonic powers shall be strengthened by the appointment of mutual representatives.

ART. II.

Our Deputy Grand Master, the Ill. B. Alfred Blanche, is empowered to give notice of the present decree.

DIVISION TRIUMPHANT.

Stormiest day in History of Convention.

Jack Hamilton and other Refractory Members Arrested.

[SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXPRESS.] AUSTIN, Texas, January 16, 3 P. M., 1869. To the Editor of the San Antonio Express:

This is the stormiest day in the history of the convention. Rule 56 was changed so as to excuse absentees. The anti-divisionists tried to break a quorum by refusing to vote. Several members were put under arrest for contempt, among them Jack Hamilton. One of the members resigned. At last the anti-divisionists gave way, and a vote was taken, which resulted in a victory to the divisionists.

The question recurring upon the adoption of Davis' Division substitute and a delegation to Washington, a vote was taken, which stood 38 for and 33 against—which resulted in a victory for the divisionists. The resolution passing to its third reading, the convention adjourned until Monday. Hereafter there will be no difficulty on account of a call of the House.

TELEGRAPHIC

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 15.—General Rousseau having died poor, a number of citizens moving in wealth, offered a testimonial to his widow. Two meetings have been held, and last night a committee of influential citizens were appointed to conduct the matter. His horses were raffled off by members of his Staff.

A bill came up yesterday in the House abolishing present city government, and creating a new or Provisional one, the officers of which are to be appointed by the Governor. Two bills are also in progress for abolishing present public schools. The Government providing for appointment by Governor, of School Directors.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—After many conferences between Virginia and individual members of Senate and House committee, it seems the following definite arrangement has been substantially agreed to: Following the precedent of the Missouri Compromise, at the proceedings upon admission of Oregon, Kansas and Nebraska, a bill will be proposed authorizing admission of Virginia upon the adoption of the proposed constitution, with certain obnoxious clauses in regard to disfranchisement, and probably other objectionable features to be stricken out. When the bill is passed, it is believed that it will be followed by an Amnesty bill, either universal or with few exceptions, to take effect upon ratification of constitution.

It is understood that this agreement meets the approbation of General Grant, Schofield and large numbers of prominent members of both Houses. Gilman concluded his testimony in Mississippi case, he admitted the defeat of constitution of its prescriptive features. The white people nearly all opposed and many negroes who generally was appealed to, voted against it. Gilman thinks if constitution was submitted with the understanding that provisions be governed by reconstruction laws, it would be adopted.

SENATE.—Judiciary Committee reported adversely to a joint resolution making President and Vice President ineligible for office the second term. Sen. Murphy's case (for heaven's sake tell us who she is) resumed, whole matter re-committed.

HOUSE.—Election committee reported on 6th Georgia District, substantially as heretofore stated, namely: Wimpy was not elected, Christie elected, but not entitled to a seat, having voluntarily aided the enemy.

Number of private bills reported: The Major's Fifty Canal appropriation of twelve millions in aid of enterprise, resumed. Among matters of discussion, General Sypher of Louisiana, spoke in opposition, said grain is now being shipped from St. Louis to New York via New Orleans, at 17 cents per bushel less than via Chicago and Buffalo, and to Liverpool at 20 cents less per bushel via New Orleans than via New York, and third less time. Transportation via New Orleans is made with perfect safety to the commodity, and a cost of about one cent per bushel, for transferring at New Orleans, besides navigation on Niagara canal would be froze four months of the year, whereas, the Mississippi was constantly navigable. Bill finally referred to Committee of the Whole, which amounts to a defeat this session. Adjourned.

FOREIGN NEWS.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Rio Janeiro advices by mail reports that the allies, after a desperate battle, carried Villa. Lopez's army is utterly routed and destroyed. The allies captured 3,000 prisoners. Lopez with two thousand followers barely escaped.

Reports represent that Valmar, after several victories, formed a junction with Colonel Louis and united forces and were moving on Besancon.

AUSTIN CORRESPONDENCE.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, January 12, 1869. Editor of the San Antonio Express:

On Sunday morning a despatch was received at Military Headquarters to the effect that Major Davis, of the 4th Cavalry, had arrived in Jefferson with the body of Cullen Baker, and another one of his desperadoes. This killing of Baker and the arrest of Crump, who no doubt was the leader of the assassins of Smith, is the beginning of reform.

Numerous reports of outrages reach the Capital, but it is evident General Canby's presence is being felt; quietly but firmly the new Commander is gathering the reins of government into his hands. I learn of an outrage which I have not seen in the public prints. The Bureau Agent at Richmond was assaulted on the 1st day of January in the most outrageous manner; his office was entered by some desperadoes, who with drawn pistols compelled a negro to brutally beat Mr. Rock, the Agent. Comment is unnecessary. The civilized world must revolt at such a cowardly outrage.

Austin, though a small village, is not without its scandal. I have heard of an event which has become part of the common history of the Courts, which admits of considerable dressing up. A colored man, named Daniel Johnson, makes affidavit that he was recently arrested by the military and taken to camp near the city, where he was subjected to great severity and threatened with bodily punishment if he did not divulge the name of the sender of a note to an officer's lady, which note had been intercepted on the way. The colored man declared his ignorance of the sender, but through fear was compelled to acquiesce in the name of the person suggested by the officer, and then was released. The next morning after the arrest of the man Johnson, six cavalrymen dashed up to a party of gentlemen on the avenue, and leveling their carbines, demanded that — give himself up. This gentleman passed on while a member of the convention parleyed with the cavalrymen. The victim applied to General Canby, asking a fair show, at the same time denying any complicity in the intrigue. Several threats passed, but so far no blood has been shed. The gentleman accused is an ex-Confederate officer, fine looking, and at present said to be a Republican,—having been one of Longstreet's staff. The action of the military in this affair was very mysterious and incomprehensible—not to be explained by the usual rules of gallantry. I notice that the Austin "Ring" has extended itself and taken in the San Antonio Herald. A leader in a recent number of that paper, upon division, in which the "ring" are praised and all other Republicans abused, proves that if it was not produced here the items were furnished from this place. The attempt to get up a scare in the West that the Guadalupe will be the line is a poor trick of the "ring." The assertion that the ability of the State opposes division shows the ignorance of the Herald in regard to this question, and that its proprie-

Of the advocates of division from the Eastern portion of the State, are L. D. Evans, one of the ablest men in the State, although a Democrat; J. W. Flanagan, an able legislator, and an able debator; Judge J. R. Burnett, Monroe, Judge Pedigo, and others. From the Middle of the State are Judge Evans of Waco, Smith of Galveston, Ruby, Bryant of Harris, and others. From the West are General Davis, the President of the Convention; Morgan Hamilton, Degener, Newcomb, and others.

The only man of any note who opposes division is ex-Governor Hamilton, who represents the city of Austin. The best minds and the men of the widest experience in the convention favor division. The Colorado as a boundary line for the Western State is settled beyond doubt; the only difficulty about lines is with the eastern and northern sections.

It is apparent that the "ring" have taken in the San Antonio Herald and will publish their underhanded articles through that sheet and then copy them in the Republican at this place in order to weaken your delegates; but their plan will fail.

Judges Caldwell and Lindsay have gone to Galveston to attend to the Supreme Court. It is rumored that Caldwell has a full list of Federal appointments in his pocket, and that he will slip off from Galveston at the proper time to Washington, and, being fortified by letters from the "ring," will steal a march upon the "outsiders." Should a Commission sit to try the murderers of poor Smith, Judge Caldwell's presence in the State would be indispensable, and no doubt Crump and his accomplices will require his evidence to blacken their victim's character.

Among the strangers in the city I notice the genial face of Colonel Terrel, Paymaster at your city. Mr. Hunt, the delegate from Comal and Hays counties, has arrived, in a most opportune time, to the great delight of his friends.

Among the legislative schemes now hovering over the convention is an Immigration project, which proposes to take five hundred thousand dollars out of the Treasury, and five hundred thousand acres of public land in consideration of landing two thousand five hundred immigrants on the shores of Texas. This money and land is to be given to a corporate company. For the same money and land twenty thousand immigrants can be brought into Texas. Legislation is accumulating at a fearful rate, and if a stranger were to visit the lobby he would be certain that he was listening to the deliberations of a Legislative body.

The discussion on the condition of the State was resumed last night. Mr. Morgan Hamilton occupied the floor to-day, and in a most able manner reviewed the whole ground. During the time Mr. Hamilton was speaking, the following telegram was circulated among the members:—

Republican Extra. AUSTIN, JAN. 12, 1869. [Special to the Austin Republican.]

San Antonio, January 12th, 1869. The Mass Meeting called by those favoring a division of the State, to express the sentiments of San Antonio on Division, voted down the resolutions favoring Division, by a large majority, and adjourned sine die.

This telegram is said to have been despatched by Judge Stridling. As a part of the tactics of the "ring" and its little "ring" in San Antonio it is perfectly understood by the delegates from Bexar. It is well known that one of the issues upon which Messrs. Degener and Newcomb were elected was a division of the State, and steadily they have worked up to this point. It would be gratifying to know the exact facts of that meeting.

A resolution was passed this morning creating a Special Committee, to take in hand the Constitution and report it back to the Convention a completed instrument. This is the most sensible move, suggested during this session, and is likely to bring to a conclusion the labors of this body.
