**The Convention.**

**ONE HUNDRED AND NINTH DAY.**

**EVENING SESSION.**

CAPIVOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS, January 15, 1899.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment, and called; quorum present.

Mr. Carter from Special Committee, appointed at the morning session, to enquire into the cause of absence of certain delegates, reported as follows:

**REPRESENTATIVE HALL,**  
Jan. 15, 1899.

Hon. E. J. Davis, President Convention:

Sir: Your Special Committee appointed to enquire into the circumstances of the absence of Messrs. Mills, Yarborough, Coleman, and Foster, have had that matter under examination, and have made such enquiry, and received such evidence as satisfied the committee that Mr. Yarborough's health and age have hitherto prevented, and will continue to prevent his attendance upon the convention at the present session; that Messrs. Coleman and Foster are either not in the State, or if in it, their places of habitation is not known to those residing in the Districts represented by said delegates; and other evidence not proper to embody in this report, has satisfied the committee that said Coleman and Foster will not attend the present session of the convention, and cannot be brought in by the Sergeant-at-arms, or a special Messenger. The committee believe that Mr. Mills has purposed attending this session of the convention, but has hitherto probably been kept away by urgent private business, by the difficulty and danger of travel from El Paso to the Capital at this time, and probably by stress of weather. That letters have been received from him by his friends here, indicating that he would arrive in Austin about that time.

Under all the circumstances of the case, your committee venture to suggest a modification of Rule 53 of the convention, and have instructed me to report the accompanying resolution, which is respectfully submitted with the recommendation that it be adopted by the convention.

Resolved, That Rule 53 of the convention shall hereafter be and read as follows:

53. Fifteen members shall be necessary to sustain a call of the convention; and upon a call of the convention the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by the Secretary, and the absentees noted; after which the names of the absentees shall be called again. If they do not answer, the Sergeant-at-arms, or a special messenger, may be sent for them, and the question pending shall be without a motion, laid on the table until such of the absentees as have been in attendance upon the convention within five days next preceding the day on which such call is made, shall appear on the call be suspended.

Mr. Patten moved a suspension of the rules to put resolution on its passage, upon which the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:

So the convention refused to suspend the rule.

Mr. Buntington moved the convention adjourn till to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

**Texas Stock men, are they killed!**

Ever since the close of the war it is asserted, there has been a system of blackmailing and murdering of Texas drovers as they pass through Missouri and Kansas. In Missouri, on the 28th October last, five young men, drovers, were fired upon by banditti, who occupied on Burkhardt, Prairie, Jasper county, two of them instantly killed, one mortally wounded—since dead. Two or three days afterwards, the remaining two, who escaped on the first attack, were captured, robbed, and after being kept several days under guard were again shot at—one being mortally wounded, as was supposed at first accounts, the other getting away. It is well known that he was or was not hit. Oh, the lawlessness and crime! Texans are concerned in. The account from which we learn these facts represents the battle "driven" by the young men, from the sale of which they derived the funds of which they were relieved by the robbers, were purchased from our fellow citizen Col. John C. McCoy and others in and around Dallas, and that the young man McCoy, who was last shot is a nephew of Colonel McCoy. Each of these representations is destitute of foundation in truth. Col. McCoy has no blood relation in this State; and we understand, never owned but one bovine brute, in Texas, in his life—a wild buffalo calf he covered and impounded many years ago, but which in the language of a grandiloquent Tennessean, in a few days after, impounded the impound, scatterloped all over the equanimity of the forest, and bade the Colonel "Farewell, Brother Crawford," forever.

OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

By the President of the United States of America. A PROCLAMATION. ARTICLE XI.

For the better security of commerce between the citizens of the United States and the citizens of Nicaragua, it is agreed, that if at any time any interruption of friendly intercourse, or any rupture, should unfortunately take place between the two high contracting parties, the citizens of either, who may be within the territories of the other, shall, if residing on the coast, be allowed six months, and if in the interior, a whole year, to wind up their accounts, and dispose of their property; and a safe conduct shall be given them to embark at any port they themselves may select.

ARTICLE XII. The citizens of the United States and the citizens of the republic of Nicaragua, respectively, residing in any of the territories of the other party, shall enjoy in their houses, persons, and property, the protection of the government, and shall continue in possession of the same, which shall not be liable to seizure or confiscation, nor to any other change of ownership than those which may be made upon the like effects or property belonging to the native citizens of the country.

ARTICLE XIII. Whenever a citizen of either of the contracting parties shall be forced to seek refuge or asylum in the rivers, bays, ports, dominions of the other with their vessels, whether merchant or war, public or private, through stress of weather, pursuit of pirates or enemies, or want of provisions or water, they shall be received and treated with humanity, and given all favor and protection for repairing their vessels, securing provisions, and placing themselves in all respects in a condition to continue their voyage without obstacle of any kind.

ARTICLE XIV. The Republic of Nicaragua hereby grants to the United States, and to their citizens and property, the right of transit through the Atlantic and Pacific oceans through the territory of the said Republic, by any route of communication, natural or artificial, whether by land or by water, which may now or hereafter exist, and which may be used and enjoyed in the same manner and upon equal terms by both Republics and their respective citizens.

ARTICLE XV. The United States hereby agree to extend their protection to all such routes of communication, natural and artificial, and to guarantee the same, and to employ their influence with other nations to induce them to guarantee such neutrality and protection.

ARTICLE XVI. The Republic of Nicaragua, on its part, undertakes to establish one free port at each extremity of one of the aforesaid routes of communication between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. At these ports no transit or other duties shall be imposed or levied by the government of Nicaragua, or on any effects or merchandise belonging to citizens or subjects of the United States, or upon the vessels of either of the other country intended, bona fide, for transit across the said routes within the Republic of Nicaragua.

ARTICLE XVII. The Republic of Nicaragua concedes the right of the Postmaster General of the United States to enter contracts with any individuals or companies to transport the mails of the United States along the said routes of communication, or along any other routes across the isthmus, in its discretion, in closed bags, the contents of which may not be intended for distribution within the said Republic, free from the imposition of all taxes or duties by the government of Nicaragua, but this liberty is not to be construed so as to permit individuals to monopolize the same, by means of their own property or freight.

Another Chapter in Beef. - Mr. Childers brought fat beavers to town one day last week, to sell; it was impossible to get any of the butchers to purchase of him, until finally two of them came and offered seven dollars a head.

We hope the authorities will take some action to break this "trick of the trade," so effectually, that in future, we will be guarded against it.

The Butchers' Card. - We have read the lame and weak article, in defense of what appeared in our columns concerning the infamous combination now existing in this city among the Butchers.

When the best of citizens complain of being imposed upon by having exorbitant prices charged for their necessities, they tell them that they cannot have any more dog-meats without paying for it; and upon being asked, why is this? they are answered that it is against the law.

Formerly the Butchers sold steaks from five to ten cents and a roast from twenty-five to forty cents - but did not weigh the same. They now propose to weigh the meat now sold. Why? Because their scales have not been sealed, or tested for the last twelve months, and they now stand out of the way from one-half to one pound.

The writer of the Card says there is no combination or Association. We know that there is, and will now give some of the leading names controlling this Association: G. Rehman, President; Captain Penulosa, Secretary; George Dashiell, Big-Dog; C. Bergstrom, Big-Bug.

These gentlemen have taken an oath not to open the Market before five in the morning, upon penalty of being discharged - from what? The Butchers' Association. Now, the city ordinance says the Markets shall be open at five in the morning. Is it done? Working men have to go to work without their meat in the morning. If you wish to find out the indignation of the citizens, you can do so by calling around at the "People's Meat Association," now in existence, caused from your combination.

We return our thanks to you for kindly proposing to place us upon your "free" list. When we want to eat dog-meat, we will choose it elsewhere. As to seeing you sport kid gloves and a cane, would be like the monkey dressed up.

What do you do with all that sour meat, and the sour meat that was in your stalls yesterday morning? That you sell to the poor at five cents, or they get nothing. Can you deny this?

Refugia Garza, a Mexican woman, using profane and indecent language, throwing stones and smashing things up in general, fined \$5 and costs.

Drunk and Disorderly. - Isaac Robinson, drunk and very disorderly upon the streets, fined \$3 and costs.

In speaking of the public meeting of our citizens held at the court-house, upon the subject of division and railroads, on Friday and Saturday last, the Tyler Reporter uses the following very conclusive, and, we think, unanswerable arguments in favor of immediate division: Entertaining these views, we have not hesitated to participate in the meeting which passed these resolutions.
