Sir—The special committee appointed to enquire into the most practicable mode of publishing the journals of the convention, beg leave to submit the following report and resolutions agreed upon by the com-

Your committee find that the journals of this convention are the most voluminous ever made by any similar or rather legislative body in this State. The journals as pub-lished give but a portion of the real matter which properly belongs to the proceedings, and should be pub-lished to make them complete. These journals will make a volume or volumes of over one thousand pages, brevier type, and over two thousand pages of pica type, 44 lines long and 26 m's wide; this is a low estimate. The 1st Assistant Secretary, who is thoroughly acquainted the matter, makes the esthuate double this number of pages. One establishment has offered to do the work on an estimate of one thonsand pages pica type at 4-10 of a cent per page, or \$4000.

Your committee is confident this is an incorrect estimate, and that if the work is given out on this basis it will cost at least \$12,000. The sum usually paid by the State for collating and publishing the journals of the legislature is from \$10,000 to \$12,000, and at least this amount would be necessary for printing the journals of this convention if done n accordance with the laws of the State, and in the State. If econmy and good work are to be considered, your committee would advise that this matter be left to the care of the President of the convention and the other delegates to Washing-ton giving them the authority to have the work done at the north, which would save at least one-half which would save at least one-said the money it would take to have the work done in the State, besides the advantage of having the work done under the supervision of the Presi-dent of the body, who is thoroughly acquainted with the proceed-

The collating of the journals is also a work that should be entrust-ed to capable hands and should be considered by the convention.

It might be well to wait the publication of the journals until the fact is known that the labors of the convention are at an end; but as the convention may desire to act on the matter now, your committee bega leave to submit the following resolution as suggesting the best and the most economical plan for having the journals published:
