This report provided that every loyal man should be entitled to registry and that the Legislature could relieve vided un oath of registry embracing in its terms an oath of allegiance and a pledge to maintain the equal civil and political rights of all men. Jack Hamilton proposed a substitute, which he claimed disfran-THE MEETING TO-NIGHT.—The disfranchisement. This was denied, and amendments offered, adopting the reconstruction disfranchisement, which were voted down. In this confusion and perplexity the substitute of Jack Hamilton was adopted by a vote 30 year to 26 nays. Thus was this great question run through with thirty-four empty sents-thirty of whom were Republicans.
