An act providing for the sale of the lands, tenements, and water privileges belong-ing to the United States at and nearHarest Virginia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United State of America in Congress assembled. That the America in Congress assembled. That the Secretary of War be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to make sale at public anction of the lands, tenements, and water privileges belonging to the United States at and near Harper's Ferry, in the county of Jefferson, West Virginia, except as hereinafter provided, in such parcels as shall, in his opinion, be best adapted to secure the greatest amount of money therefor, on a credit of one and two years, taking bond and security from the purchaser or purch sers for the payment of the purchase money; and that the proceeds of such sale shall be applied by him as follows: Provided, That no such sale shall be made until the time, terms, and place there lows: Provided, That no such sale shall be made until the time, terms, and place there-of shall have been published in one of the priveipal newspapers in each of the cities of Washington, New York, and Cincinnati for sixty days prior to the day of sale: First, in defraying the expenses of ma-king said sale.

That the provisions of an act entitled "an act relating to habeas corpus, and regulating judicial proceedings in certain cases," approved March third, eighteen hundred and sixty-three; so far as the same is hereby, declared to extend to any suit or action at law or prosecution, civil or criminal, which has been or shall be communed in any State court against the owner or owners law or prosecution, civil or criminal, which has been or shall be commenced in any State court against the owner or owners of any ship or vessel, or of any railway, or of any line of transportation, firm, or corporation engaged in business as common carriers of goods, wares, or merchandise, for any loss or damage which may have happened to any goods, wares, or merchandise whatever, which shall have been delivered to any such owner or owners of any ship or vessel, or any railway, or of any ship or vessel, or any railway, or of any line of transportation, firm or corporation, engaged in business as common carriers, where such loss or damage shall have been occasioned by the acts of those engaged in hostility to the government of the United States during the late rebellion, or where such loss or damage shall have been occasioned by any of the forces of the United States, or by any officer in command of such forces: Provided, That this act shall not be construed to affect any contract of insurance for war risks which may have been made with reference to any goods, wares, or merchandise, which shall have been so deatroyed.

The Supreme Court in the Texas Convention.

We have presented to us the anomaly of the Supreme Court of this State, trying to make an organic law for the government of the peo ple of Texas. We say Suprem ple of Texas. We say Supreme, be-cause we find a majority of that court piously(!) seated in that body. First, we shall notice "Colossa Jack," the great modern Texas Bo anerges, than whom we recognize ter orator in our State al Jack" is the recognized leade of this Supreme Triumvirste, and he evidently feels that his brethren of the bench look upon him as the embodiment of legal and political perfection. When heavily laden with "Austin whisky," Jack is rather "Quixotic," and sometimes in his hallucinations he takes up the idea that he, Jack, is the republican par-ty of Texas, and this leads him to suppose that inasmuch as he pitches into his past record, he is demolishng the republican party. If Jack does not make as great an ass of himself as "Don Quixote" in his famous attack on the wind-mill, he is at least like him in one thing-he makes use of an immense quantity of wind. If "Colossal Jack" could be induced to leave Austin long enough to forget the influence of "Austin whisky," no doubt he would be himself again.

Judge Lindsey is an able jurist, but he is a stale politician, far be-

hind the progress of the age. Judge bindsey worries himself hunting up precedents and technicalities and thrusting them upon the Conven-tion; and the "solous" of that body, though they become restless and im-patient under these terrible inflic-tions, are compelled by force of cirtions, are compelled by force of cir-cumstances to submit; whilst the Judge, thinking that three are a majority and should rule the court, thinks he has but to write out his opinion and it becomes law, "Colos-sal Jack" and C. Caldwell concur-

ring. Judge Colbert Caldwell, the oth er member of the Supremes in the Convention, is perhaps the most spicy, cunning, political trickster in the "Lone Star" domain; and of all men calculated to bring into con-tempt any party to which he may profess to belong, providing that party remains quietly passive to his use, Judge Caldwell is certainly best qualified. If we have said that Jack is sometimes "Quixotic," we might also say that Judge Caldwell is a real "Sancho Panza" in his relation to Jack; indeed, no plebian ever acknowledged the superiority of his master with a more ridiculous grace than he. Judge Caldwell reckons himself, next to Jack, not only the most important man in Texas, but effects to believe that whatever of virtue, patriotism or vitality belongs to the republican party of Texas, not embodied in "Colossul Jack," belongs to himselfas Jack's "Squire." Judge Caldwell is possessed of one virtue at least. It is that virtue which attaches to Andy Johnson, and like Andy he possesses this one virtue in an extraordinary degree. Now, we never object to ambitious men; in fact we like to see a man aspire to be something, but we do object to any one rising to position or place by pandering intrigue or

running hypocrisy.

Judge Caldwell so often contradicts himself or misrepresents others that he must frequently interrupt the proceedings of the convention by rising to a "question of privilege" to try to explain away some of his glaring inconsistencies. On these occasions, Judge Caldwell spouts and raves "like mad." His egotism vituperation and grandiloquence is truly majestic; but like any other imitator, Judge Caldwell makes ri-diculous blanders, and he would no doubt improve faster if Jack would give him a little more private prac-

These Supreme triumeiri incline to the belief that the republican party in Texas, means the "Austin

ring."
We are not sure, but we believe, these Supreme gentlemen favor the idea that the convention has plena the time for reconstruction has not arrived. Now, if the State should be divided, it would be very questionable who would pocket the gentlemen finds himself in possession of. But if the State is not reconstructed, and the convention resolves itself into a legislative body, they will each continue to draw mileage and per diem to that insti-tution. More than this, they will also be entitled to all railroad and

AUSTIN COMMESPONDENCE.

Exciting Adjourned by the President.

Austin, Texas, February 5, 1869 Editor San Antonio Express :

The closing hours of the convention are marked with confusion and excitement.

This morning a protest was presented against the constitution on the part of a number of delegates. The ordinance submitting the constitution and providing for the election of State officers was finally massed.

A declaration was then introduced providing for the publication of the constitution in the different loyal papers in the State. This brought up McCormick's substitute for the original report of the Committee on Printing; this substitute was to give the printing to the Austin Relitt stripe to give free vent to their publican, and to provide an easy place for the Secretary for several months to come. This job would have taken \$30,000 out of the State Treasury, simply to build up an unprincipled newspaper, but the only organ of the Jack Hamilton magnanimity party. The friends of the Republican had the game entirely stocked to suit themselves, as many of the Radical delegates had left; and what made the thing more apparent, the majority of the conservative members supported this job, and it was current that their support was a part of the bargain on the suffrage question.

The previous question was sprung by Jack Hamilton, cutting off all amendments. This move called forth some not very complimentary remarks from Radical members. which excited the wrath of Bryant of Grayson, who requested his friend Jack to withdraw his previous question a moment, while he pitched into the opposition; which Jack did, and which was the fatal blow to the grand pap scheme.

Bryant is a violent, malignant man, and made outrageous charges against the division men of the different sections. He attempted to renew the "previous question" when he had finished his tirade, but twenty members were on their feet claiming the floor; the President recognized Colonel Flanigan, the polished old orator, and the old gentleman began to comb the fiery Bryant down in splendid style, despeech that he rose from his seat but he had found his match; the old man lost his polish, and advancing upon his threatening opponent shook his fist in his face and called him a "lying puppy!" A general row ensued; Bryant was taken out of the Hall; the Radicals ryshed to Flanigan's side and defied the "con-glomerates." In this fierce confusion the President in vain brought down his gavel, and finally ad-journed the body until the regular evening hour.

The Radicals had their hats on and, stepping to the center of the Hall, announced that they could not be buillied or whipped into measures, and that the convention was at end so far as they were concerned. Jack Hamilton attempted to declare the convention not adjourned; but he failed; and thus was the fat kicked into the fire by an intemperate speech,-and this was really the last

nicefing of the convention.

Third—Whether in the whole ase, taking the action of Georgia, both before and since the pretended ratification of the Fourteenth Amendment, a civil government has been established in that State which Congress ought to recognize.

These questions must be answered by the law and the facts.

The committee then proceeded to quote the proclamation of General leade, calling the Legislature to gether, and his correspondence relative to the eligibility of certain of its members, and also reviews at some length the action of the Legis lature itself on the same subject, and expresses the opinion that no doubt exists that the number of disqualified members was large, but all of these members were allowed to retain their seats in direct violation of the Fourteenth Amend ment. At the election of Senator. Mr. Hill received 110 votes, Mr. Brown 94, and Alexander H. Stephens 3; and it is extremely possible that this majority received by Mr. Hill was made up of members who were disqualified by the Fourteenth Amendment.
